The Agency's flagship report presents a comprehensive overview of key developments in asylum in 2023. It summarises changes to policies, practices and legislation, with examples of case law.

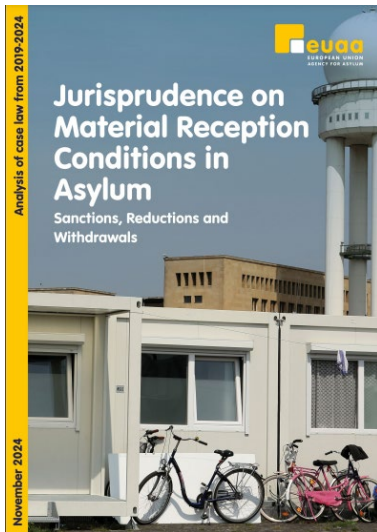
The report is accompanied by various, user-friendly tools which can be used to filter information that is presented in the report.

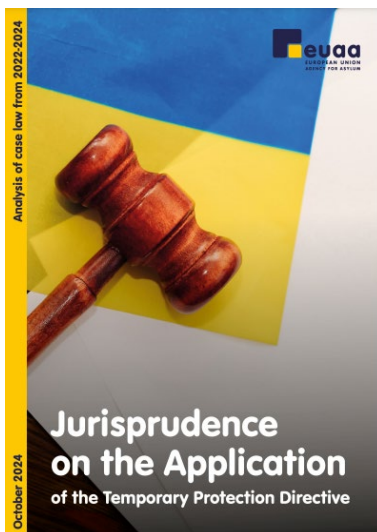
Jurisprudence on Material Reception Conditions in Asylum – Sanctions, Reductions and Withdrawals: Analysis of Case Law from 2019-2024

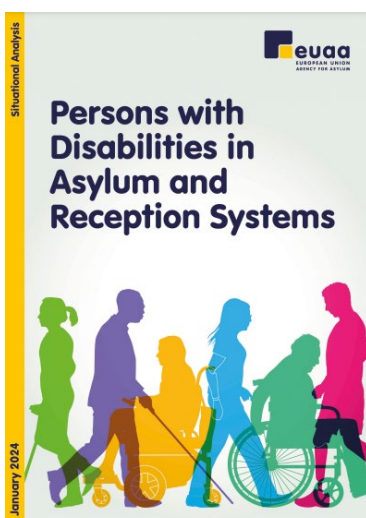
Jurisprudence on the Application of the Temporary Protection Directive: Analysis of Case Law from 2022-2024

Victims of human trafficking in asylum and reception

Trafficking in human beings is a serious crime and a violation of fundamental rights, explicitly prohibited by the [Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union](#). Human trafficking includes sexual exploitation, forced labour, forced criminal activities (such as drug trafficking and pickpocketing) and slavery or servitude.
EU legislation contains provisions which address asylum applicants with special needs who may be considered particularly vulnerable, including victims of human trafficking. These provisions ensure that vulnerable applicants receive adequate support to benefit from their rights and comply with the obligations, which are defined under the Common European Asylum System (CEAS).
Several factors contribute to making asylum seekers, refugees and other forcibly-displaced people an easy target for traffickers, who prey on their precarious situation. As such, victims of human trafficking in the asylum procedure require due attention and procedural safeguards.

Displaced Ukrainians with Disabilities Seeking Temporary Protection in Europe

Situational Update No 20 serves as an additional resource to the comprehensive report on ["Persons with Disabilities in Asylum and Reception System: A Comprehensive Overview"](#).
This update is based on the same methodology used in the main report by including desk research and summarising the findings of two surveys which were disseminated by the EUAA in August and September 2023. The surveys were completed by national authorities and other stakeholders, including civil society and non-governmental organisations, academia and international organisations.

The Russian invasion of Ukraine led to one of the largest displacements of people since World War II. Most people travelling from Ukraine towards EU+ countries were particularly vulnerable throughout their journey, including women, children, the elderly and persons with disabilities or serious medical conditions.

Based on a survey of families in neighbouring countries of Ukraine (including Hungary, Moldova, Poland, Romania and Slovakia), UNHCR found that one in five families interviewed (22%) had a family member with a specific need, disability or serious medical condition and they generally faced greater difficulties to meet their basic needs.¹

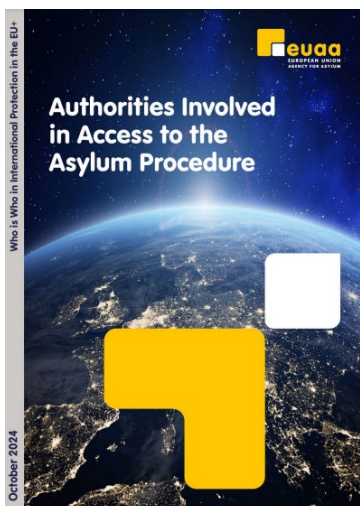

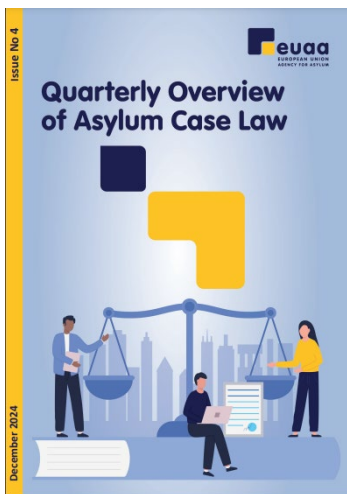
