Its aim is to help learners achieve a common understanding of EU and international standards in the field by equipping them with the skills needed to ensure fast and fair procedures.

The curriculum training modules also form the basis for training delivered in an operational context that prepares national administrations to implement their obligations under the Common European Asylum System or to effectively manage disproportionate pressure from migratory flows. By providing common vocational training, the EUAA strives to bring greater conformity to national asylum and reception practices.

In this training catalogue, you will find a comprehensive summary of all the training modules and the languages they are available in. It also includes essential information on each module, such as the target learners, duration, learning outcomes, overview and aim.

The EUAA is introducing voluntary assessments as a first step toward being able to offer specific qualifications for practitioners working in the field of asylum and reception. Successfully passing the assessments demonstrates that a learner has achieved the intended learning outcomes and gives their employer the confidence that their officials have the knowledge and skills which will prepare them to implement the Common European Asylum System in Member States. You will find information on the assessment strategy on the pages of training modules for which assessments are already available.

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Introduction to the European Asylum Curriculum

The European Asylum Curriculum has a comprehensive range of modules covering the entire area of international protection. The curriculum includes:

- core modules covering the essential knowledge required by asylum officials;
- a range of modules for reception officials;
- foundation and introductory modules aimed at persons starting to work in the area of international protection or persons from other sectors who deal with asylum matters on a regular basis, such as registration officers;
- advanced and specialised modules which enable experienced officials to consolidate skills or specialise in a particular area of competence such as vulnerability;
- courses for trainers we use a train-the-trainer methodology to support the
 development of skills, knowledge, and competencies of trainers who then train
 personnel in national administrations, thus creating a multiplier effect.

The modules have been developed within the framework of the Common European Asylum System's (CEAS) legal instrument – the Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees (the Refugee Convention) of 1951 – and its Protocol and other relevant international and European law. The European Union Agency for Asylum (EUAA) incorporates expertise from its Asylum Knowledge Centre and Operational Support Centre, and works in close collaboration with experts from Member States and external experts with extensive knowledge and experience on the specific topics. Training modules are reviewed by the EUAA Reference Group, whose members include experts from the European Council on Refugees and Exiles, the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and the European Commission.

The EUAA's goal is to place learners and their administrations firmly at the heart of everything it does. It makes sure the training it offers is authentic and corresponds to the actual day-to-day tasks of target learners by using an asylum and reception competency framework, known as the European Sectoral Qualifications Framework (ESQF) for asylum and reception officials. The <u>educational standards</u> matrix defines what asylum and reception officials should know or be able to do at the end of a training sequence in order to achieve a qualification. These learning outcomes are aligned with the tasks identified in the corresponding <u>occupational</u> <u>standards</u>. This same matrix is also used to define the level of learning as it is aligned with the





levels of the <u>European qualifications framework (EQF)</u>¹. This learning-outcome-based approach ensures that each training module focuses on the knowledge, skills, and/or responsibility and autonomy required for Member State officials² to perform their duties efficiently and effectively.

Training modules are delivered via different media. Most are delivered through a blended-learning methodology (face-to-face sessions facilitated by a trainer, combined with online and independent learning). Some just have an online component, thereby enabling self-paced learning, while others are delivered through webinars.

Article 8(4) of the <u>EUAA regulation</u> stipulates that the agency has to ensure that the training it delivers is of high quality. In other words, EUAA training identifies key principles and best practices with a view to guaranteeing greater convergence of administrative methods, decisions and legal practices. The EUAA is therefore fully committed to upholding the highest standards of quality, efficiency and transparency as reflected in its <u>Training and Learning Strategy</u>, which is implemented through its training quality assurance framework. This framework aligns the EUAA's training activities with European standards and guidelines for quality assurance in the field of education and vocational training. The agency works closely with Member States to ensure that these standards are maintained wherever training is delivered.

Training modules are developed in English, with the possibility to translate them into other languages.

How to request a translation for a European Asylum Curriculum training module

Twice a year, the Training and Professional Development Centre issues an open call to Member States that would like the EUAA to fund translations of training modules into their language.

Translation requests are evaluated by an internal committee and ranked according to various criteria, such as the version of the module requested, the number of participants per module in relation to the size of the Member State's asylum authority, historical data on the implementation and use of the European Asylum Curriculum, and budget. When a training module is translated, all components are translated and videos or animations (if any) are subtitled.

It takes between 6 and 8 months to translate all the components of a training module, depending on the length of the training module, whether previous versions have been translated, workload, the time of year and other resources. After translation, it takes another 8 to 10 weeks to build the module online. Urgent requests are dealt with on a case-by-case basis.





Am I eligible to register for European Asylum Curriculum training modules?

If you are an asylum or reception official working for a national authority, you should contact your training national contact point. They will inform you about upcoming training organised both by the EUAA and nationally. If you are not an asylum or reception official working for a national authority, you may still be eligible to register for training if the tasks you perform are covered by the <u>occupational standards</u>.

Introduction to communication for asylum and reception practitioners

The aim of this module is to provide asylum and reception practitioners with the necessary set of soft skills to ensure effective interpersonal communication.

This module focuses on the core principles of communication theory and questioning techniques in intercultural asylum contexts. It also deals with the principles of interpersonal communication, the impact of non-verbal communication and the most effective types of questions to elicit information. The module describes how cultural diversity can impact the communication process and introduces techniques that lower the risk of miscommunication in a multicultural environment.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Identify effective communication techniques to deliver and elicit information in asylum contexts
- 2. Identify communication interventions relevant to asylum contexts that minimise miscommunication deriving from intercultural differences

The module is delivered online, enabling self-paced learning.

The assessment strategy is based on one assessment at the end of the module. Questions are multiple-choice, with some being scenario based, and assess the elements of both learning outcomes.

Introduction to ethical and professional standards

The aim of this module is to help asylum and reception officials explore the principles of confidentiality and accountability, along with behaviours to ensure professional and respectful service in the workplace.

This module focuses on the fundamental principles of professional standards, ethical codes and values in the asylum and reception contexts.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Recognise ethical and professional standards, including confidentiality, in asylum and reception contexts
- 2. Recognise aspects of cultural diversity and sensitivity in asylum-related professional contexts
- Recognise breaches of asylum-related ethical codes and values and their potential consequences
- Identify behaviours that promote a professional and respectful service in multicultural asylum and reception contexts

The module is delivered online, enabling self-paced learning.

The assessment strategy is based on case studies from the asylum and reception field that present ethical or professional challenges that are authentic to the workplace. Questions are multiple-choice and scenario-based, and assess the elements of all learning outcomes.

Introduction to the legal framework on fundamental rights & international protection in the EU

The aim of this module is to provide asylum and reception practitioners with basic knowledge on the key legal provisions relating to international protection in the European Union and the most relevant fundamental rights in the context of access to asylum procedure, namely *non-refoulement* and the right to asylum.

This module focuses on the two key fundamental rights relevant to access to the asylum procedure and the five pillars of the CEAS. It also presents the key definitions of applicants for and beneficiaries of international protection and the main steps of the asylum process.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Recognise the key fundamental rights relevant to the access to the asylum procedure
- 2. Identify the main objectives of the legal instruments of the Common European Asylum System

The module is delivered online, enabling self-paced learning.

The assessment strategy is based on one assessment at the end of the module. Questions are multiple-choice, with some being scenario based, and assess the elements of both learning outcomes.

Introduction to vulnerability

The aim of this module is to provide asylum and reception practitioners with the necessary knowledge and skills for the early identification of applicants for international protection who may be vulnerable and may have special needs to be addressed.

This module focuses on the concept of vulnerability in the asylum context and the main categories of potentially vulnerable applicants for international protection in line with the EU legal framework. It also addresses the most common indicators of special needs of applicants for international protection, how to identify these needs and the consequences of not identifying them.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Recognise how the concept of vulnerability applies in asylum contexts
- 2. Recognise the categories and the main indicators of vulnerability in asylum contexts
- 3. Identify persons with potential special needs in asylum contexts

The module is delivered online, enabling self-paced learning.

The assessment strategy is based on two assessments. The first assessment is knowledge based and is made up of multiple-choice questions. The second assessment is scenario based and is made up of a case study where learners need to identify the relevant indicators from a check list.



Interpreting in the asylum context

The aim of this module is to acquire the necessary knowledge and skills to perform assignments professionally, efficiently and in accordance with international standards.

This module provides a general overview of the asylum context from the perspective of interpreters and the main interpretation techniques needed in asylum processes.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Describe and explain the general asylum context and procedures
- 2. Explain the role of an interpreter in general terms and, in particular, in the asylum procedure
- Apply the principles of and the necessary skills for interpreting in general terms and in the asylum context

Introduction to international protection

The aim of this module is to introduce asylum and reception practitioners to the field of international protection.

This module provides a general overview of international protection, the key legal asylum-related instruments and the main terminology used in this domain. It explains the right to asylum, the principle of non-refoulement, the notion of international protection and the main stages of the asylum procedure.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Understand the importance of the right to asylum and the principle of non-refoulement
- 2. Explain the notion of international protection derived from the EU acquis
- 3. Explain the main stages of the asylum procedure and the asylum official's role within the procedure
- 4. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the eligibility criteria and of the evidence assessment

Professional well-being

The aim of this module is to help learners recognise the main potential psychosocial hazards in professional environments and identify strategies to protect professional well-being.

This module focuses on the fundamental elements of professional well-being, self-care strategies and the implementation of measures to address the most common professional well-being concerns in asylum and reception contexts.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Identify the basic elements of professional wellbeing and factors that can lead to stress and burnout
- 2. Identify signs of poor well-being and understand the impact of poor well-being in asylum-related contexts
- 3. Identify the main strategies to protect ones' own professional well-being

The module is delivered online, enabling self-paced learning.

The assessment strategy is based on two online written tasks at the end of the module. Questions are open ended and scenario based, and assess the elements of all learning outcomes.

Working with an interpreter

The aim of this module is to provide asylum and reception officers with the necessary knowledge and skills to communicate effectively through an interpreter. It also aims to offer tips and follow-up actions to address potential breaches of conduct by the interpreter.

This module focuses on the criteria for selecting an interpreter, the skills needed to communicate through an interpreter and how to handle challenging situations when communicating through an interpreter. It also addresses the interpreter's code of conduct and gives tips on how to address possible breaches of conduct by the interpreter.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Apply basic communication skills to enable effective communication through an interpreter in the asylum contexts
- 2. Identify potential follow-up measures in cases of potential breaches of conduct by the interpreter

The module is delivered online, enabling self-paced learning.

The assessment strategy is based on one assignment, consisting of three scenarios. Each scenario is divided into two parts. The first part is about the skills needed to communicate through an interpreter, while the second part focuses on possible follow-up measures relating to potential breaches of conduct by the interpreter.

Asylum interview method

The aim of this module is to prepare asylum officials to conduct a personal asylum interview using the asylum interview method to gather sufficient, relevant and reliable information to assess an application.

This module focuses on the asylum interview method – the structured interview protocol put forward by EUAA that is based on research relating to structured interview protocols in other domains, such as psychology, law and social studies. This module adapts these protocols to the specific characteristics of the personal interview and the asylum procedure. The focus is on the five stages of the EUAA Asylum Interview Method (prepare; open; free narrative; explore; and closing) and how to manage the psychological, cultural and environmental factors that may influence the interview process. The module reflects the requirements set out in the Qualification Directive and focuses on cases that do not rely on complex applications of interviewing skills.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Analyse factors that may influence the personal asylum interview and identify strategies to address them
- 2. Analyse an asylum case to plan and prepare a personal asylum interview
- 3. Apply and adapt interview techniques to ensure that the relevant information is gathered from an applicant for international protection

This module is delivered through a blended learning methodology (online, face-to-face and independent learning). Online learning uses learning activities that assess progress toward the learning outcomes and face-to-face sessions focus on complex elements that require discussion and physical practice.

The assessment strategy is based on two assessments at the end of the module. The first assessment measures the broad range of knowledge

and skills needed for performing an interview, including the psychological, cultural and environmental factors that may influence the personal asylum interview. The second assessment follows a simulation of the five phases of the asylum interview method and is based on a case study to ensure that the assessment is representative of the job tasks.





Evidence assessment

The aim of this module is to outline the knowledge, skills and attributes needed to apply the EUAA's structured method of evidence assessment when assessing an application for international protection so that the risk of subjectivity in individual cases is reduced.

This module explores how the material facts of a case are established through gathering, examining and comparing available pieces of evidence. It outlines the theoretical aspects and the relevant legislation from a practical perspective and applies the evidence assessment methodology that builds around the three different steps of information gathering, credibility assessment and risk assessment.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Identify the material facts and the pieces of evidence within an asylum claim according to the EUAA's structured method of evidence assessment
- Conduct the credibility assessment to decide whether to accept or reject each material fact within an asylum claim according to the EUAA's structured method of evidence assessment
- Conduct the risk assessment for an asylum claim according to the EUAA's structured method of evidence assessment

This module is delivered through a blended learning methodology (online, face-to-face and independent learning). Online learning uses learning activities that assess progress toward the learning outcomes and face-to-face sessions focus on complex elements, providing a comprehensive overview of the evidence-assessment methodology.

The assessment strategy is based on one assessment at the end of the module. It consists of a case scenario where the learner needs to conduct the evidence assessment of a claim for international

Inclusion

The aim of this module is to provide asylum officials with the knowledge and skills necessary to apply the refugee and subsidiary protection criteria in standard cases to determine whether an applicant is in need of international protection.

This module focuses on the competencies required to carry out the tasks of asylum officials by analysing all the requisites of refugee status and their application in accordance with the 1951 Refugee Convention and the qualification directive, along with all the requisites laid down in the qualification directive for subsidiary protection status. The module reflects EU and international case-law and focuses on cases that do not rely on complex interpretation of the elements of both definitions.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Analyse each requisite for refugee status in accordance with the Refugee Convention and the Qualification Directive in standard cases
- 2. Analyse each requisite for subsidiary protection according to international law and the qualification directive in standard cases

This module is delivered through a blended learning methodology (online, face-to-face and independent learning). Online learning contains learning activities and interactive content, and face-to-face sessions focus on the application of the acquired knowledge and skills through different learning activities and case studies.

The assessment strategy is based on one assessment at the end of the module. Questions are scenario based and assess the elements of both learning.

Asylum core

This course aims to provide trainers of the EUAA core modules with best practices, additional techniques and didactic strategies.

This course focuses on the main cross-cutting challenges faced by learners in the core modules *Inclusion*, *Asylum Interview Method* and *Evidence Assessment*. The course reflects principles set out in the *EU asylum acquis* and provides trainers with practical examples and strategies to address complex issues. This course is also an opportunity for trainers of the EUAA core modules to practice and discuss common challenges and share common solutions.



- Identify and apply strategies to address and correct the most common challenges faced by learners of EUAA core modules
- 2. Present the trainer's module of specialisation as an organic part of a larger decision-making process
- Apply the principles of and the necessary skills for performing the duties and tasks of a core module trainer

Becoming an EUAA assessor

The aim of this module is to provide future assessors with the knowledge and skills necessary to conduct fair and robust assessments in the context of EUAA training.

This module focuses on the various elements of assessments and verification. It is composed of learning activities and simulations that mirror parts of the assessor's tasks and complement the learning journey.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Grade and verify assessments of learning against marking criteria
- 2. Justify the grade awarded to learners with formative feedback
- 3. Identify the assessor's role in ensuring the quality of assessments

This module is delivered online and is a mandatory part of the programme to become an EUAA-certified trainer. The module is also available as a face-to-face workshop of 1.5 days including a one-hour summative assessment.

The assessment strategy is divided into two parts. The first part is an open-book examination with multiple-choice questions and the second part is a practical assessment. Both parts directly assess the elements of the three learning outcomes.

This module is delivered, as a rule, together with BET under the name of: Becoming an EUAA Trainer and Assessor (BETA)



Becoming an EUAA trainer

The aim of this module is to prepare future EUAA trainers to apply a learner-centred approach, explore training techniques and manage common challenges that occur during training.

This module focuses on the applied storytelling narrative, real branching scenarios and game-based elements (i.e., point scoring, learning badges) found in several European Asylum Curriculum modules. Using case studies and practical examples of successful good practices, it also addresses realistic scenarios that EUAA trainers encounter in their role.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Describe the learner centred approach in the context of EUAA training
- 2. Prepare for training delivery in the context of EUAA training and in line with a learner centred approach
- Explain techniques to facilitate and motivate vocational learning, in a range of learning environments
- 4. Manage challenges during the learning process
- 5. Identify the role and responsibilities of the trainer in ensuring the quality of training

This module is delivered through a blended learning methodology (online, face-to-face and independent learning). Online learning uses a gamified learning approach that assess progress toward the learning outcomes, and face-to-face sessions focus on complex elements that require discussion.

Inclusion - advanced

The aim of this module is to provide asylum officials with structured and detailed guidance on complex interpretative issues relating to qualification for international protection.

Interviewing vulnerable persons

Dublin III Regulation

Identification of potential Dublin cases

Trafficking in human beings

The aim of this module is to prepare officers who come in contact with victims or potential victims of human trafficking with the knowledge and skills required to detect and handle signs of human trafficking and to prepare and conduct an asylum interview with a victim or potential victim of human trafficking.

This module is composed of two levels. The first level raises awareness of victims or potential victims of trafficking and explores the knowledge and skills needed to identify potential victims of trafficking, along with how to handle an initial encounter. The second level focuses on victims of trafficking who may be in need of international protection. It explains how to prepare and conduct an asylum interview with a victim or potential victim of human trafficking and how to approach decision-making in a protection claim involving such a person.

- 1. Detect signs of human trafficking
- 2. Explain how to handle an initial encounter with a victim or potential victim of human trafficking
