

### Introduction

The purpose of this report is to provide relevant information for the assessment of applications for international protection, including refugee status and subsidiary protection, and in particular for use in updating EUAA's country guidance document on Syria.

In order to support the assessment of the application of Article 15(c) of the Qualification Directive on a serious and individual threat to a civilian's life or person by reason of indiscriminate violence in situations of international or internal armed conflict, the security situation report examines the nature of armed conflicts taking place in the territory, the nature of the violence and presence of armed actors in different areas, and the impact on civilians, for example in terms of casualties/fatalities and conflict-linked displacement.

The report covers the period of September 2023 – August 2024, and provides an update of previous EUAA COI reports documenting the security situation in Syria, particularly: <a href="Syria">Syria</a> – Security situation (October 2023).

### Methodology

This report was jointly drafted by EUAA and ACCORD and reviewed by EUAA and national COI departments in EU+ countries, as mentioned in the Acknowledgements section.

This report is produced in line with the EUAA COI Report Methodology (2023)<sup>1</sup> and the EUAA COI Writing and Referencing Style Guide (2023).<sup>2</sup>

### Defining the terms of reference

The terms of reference (ToR) of this report were defined by EUAA based on discussions held and input received from COI experts in the EUAA COI specialist network on Syria and from policy experts in EU+ countries appointed to EUAA Country Guidance network. The ToR also builds on previous EUAA COI reports on Syria covering the same topics. The Terms of Reference for this report can be found in Annex 2 of this report.

### **Collecting information**

The information gathered is a result of research using public, specialised paper-based and electronic sources until 30 August 2024. Some limited additional information was added during the finalisation of this report in response to feedback received during the quality control process, until 17 September 2024.

### **Quality control**

To ensure that the authors respected the EUAA COI Report Methodology and that the Terms of Reference were comprehensively addressed, a review was carried out by COI specialists from the countries and organisations listed as reviewers in the <u>Acknowledgements</u> section. All comments made by the reviewers were taken into consideration and most of them were implemented in the final draft of this report, which was finalised on 17 September 2024. EUAA also performed the final quality review and editing of the text.

### Sources

In accordance with EUAA COI methodology, a range of different published documentary sources have been consulted on relevant topics for this report. These include COI reports by governments; information from civil society, advocacy groups, humanitarian organisations, and NGOs; international and NGO human rights reports; reports produced by various bodies of the United Nations; Syrian and regionally-based media and social media; academic publications and think tank reports and specialised sources covering Syria. All information from these sources was consulted within time constraints and within the research constraints posed by Syria's challenging information-gathering environment.

### Sources on security incidents

For data on violent incidents, publicly available curated datasets from the organisation <u>Armed Conflict Location and Event Data Project (ACLED)</u> have been used. ACLED is a project collecting, analysing and mapping information on crisis and conflict in Africa, south and southeast Asia and Middle East and provides datasets on conflict incidents. It collects data on violent incidents in Syria, coding each incident with the time and place, type of violent incident, the parties involved and the number of fatalities. The information is collected in a database that is openly accessible, searchable and kept continuously up to date. The data primarily come from secondary sources such as traditional media reports, but also from reports by international institutions and non-governmental organisations, targeted new media platforms, and data provided by local partners of ACLED.<sup>3</sup> On Syria, ACLED incorporates data from a number of partners, including the Syrian Network for Human Rights (SNHR), Airwars, the Carter Center, Liveuamap, Syria Direct, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights (SOHR), the London School of Economics' Conflict and Civil Society Research Unit, the International Security and Development Center and Clingendael Institute.<sup>4</sup>

ACLED codes security incidents as follows:

• **Battles**: violent clashes between at least two armed groups. Battles can occur between armed and organised state, non-state, and external groups, and in any

- combination therein. Sub-events of battles are armed clashes, government regaining territory and non-state actor overtaking territory.
- Violence against civilians: violent events where an organised armed group deliberately inflicts violence upon unarmed non-combatants. It includes violent attacks on unarmed civilians such as sexual violence, attacks, abduction/forced disappearance.
- **Explosions/remote violence**: events where an explosion, bomb or other explosive device was used to engage in conflict. They include one-sided violent events in which the tool for engaging in conflict creates asymmetry by taking away the ability of the targets to engage or defend themselves and their location. They include air/drone strikes, suicide bombs, shelling/artillery/missile attacks, remote explosives/landmines/IEDs, grenades, chemical weapons.
- Riots: are a violent demonstration, often involving a spontaneous action by unorganised, unaffiliated members of society. They include violent demonstration, mob violence.
- **Protests**: public demonstration in which the participants do not engage in violence, though violence may be used against them. It includes peaceful protests, protests with intervention, excessive force against protesters.
- **Strategic developments:** information regarding the activities of violent groups that is not itself recorded as political violence, yet may trigger future events or contribute to political dynamics within and across states. It includes agreements, changes to group/activity, non-violent transfers of territory, arrests.<sup>5</sup>

For the purpose of providing information for the assessment of serious and individual threat to a civilian's life or person by reason of indiscriminate violence in situations of international or internal armed conflict (Article 15(c) of the Qualification Directive), only the following type of events have been included in the analysis: battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians.

Additionally, ACLED codes actors involved in security incidents as follows: Actor1 is the 'named actor involved in the event' and Actor2 is the 'named actor involved in the event, while "[i]n most cases, an event requires two actors, noted in columns 'ACTOR1' and 'ACTOR2'". However, event types 'Explosions/Remote violence', 'Riots', 'Protests', and 'Strategic developments' can include 'one-sided events'. The ACLED coding of Actor1 and Actor2 does not necessarily indicate that one is the aggressor (e.g Actor1) and the other one (e.g. Actor2) the target or victim. When focusing on the involvement of specific actors within certain regions, the drafters based their analysis on all those incidents, where ACLED coded the relevant actor either as 'Actor1' or as 'Actor2'. This approach aims to illustrate the general level of involvement of the respective actors in the conflict without distinguishing between Actor1 and Actor2, as these categories, according to ACLED's methodology, do not indicate any differentiation in terms of content/semantics.

Characteristics and potential limits for COI use of ACLED data are:

- Data primarily come from secondary sources such as media reports. Lack of or underreporting might critically affect the depiction and the assessment of the situation on the ground.
- Geographical precision is variable: the provincial capital will represent the region if no further precisions are available and may be over-represented.

Security incidents numbers and associated graphs/maps at country and governorate level are based on a publicly available ACLED dataset for Middle East.<sup>8</sup> Whenever other sources on security incidents were available over the reference period, ACLED's data have been corroborated/contrasted with other data.

#### Sources on civilian casualties

The main source on civilian fatalities in Syria used in this report is the Syrian Network of Human Rights (SNHR). The Syrian Network of Human Rights (SNHR) is a non-profit human rights organisation founded in 2011 which works on documenting human rights violations in Syria. SNHR relies on a network of volunteers in each governorate to compile lists of civilian fatalities and verify victims' identities by photo or video and by speaking with family members, witnesses, and hospitals. SNHR reports fatalities by gender, age, perpetrator, governorate, and other classifications. It only records civilian fatalities — with the exception of the death toll among victims who died due to torture, which includes armed combatants and civilians. Where available, information from other sources documenting civilian casualties in the Syrian conflict (Office of the High Commissioner on Human Rights, the Syrian Human Rights Committee, Action on Armed Violence, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, Uppsala Conflict Data Program) has been included.

Additionally, data on civilian deaths collected by the Uppsala Conflict Data Program (UCDP) has been also included. UCDP is a 'data collection project for civil war'. <sup>10</sup> UCDP provided EUAA with a Georeferenced Event Dataset (GED) covering the reference period of the report. UCDP's methodology is explained on its website as well as its GED Codebook. <sup>11</sup> The unit of analysis of UCDP is the 'event' <sup>12</sup> which is defined as '[a]n incident where armed force was used by an organised actor against another organized actor, or against civilians, resulting in at least 1 direct death at a specific location and a specific date. <sup>13</sup> This leads, among other things, to 'seemingly low estimates' because 'a number of factors can preclude a potential conflict event from inclusion in the UCDP GED', for example, unclear actors or uncertainty about whether fatalities occurred. <sup>14</sup> UCDP provides three estimates for fatalities for each event – a low estimate, a best estimate, and a high estimate. In addition, UCDP provides an estimate of the

number of civilian deaths.<sup>15</sup> According to UCDP, 'it is quite likely that there are more fatalities than given in the best estimate, but it is very unlikely that there are fewer'.<sup>16</sup>

The stricter definition of an event of UCDP excludes violent incidents that are recorded by ACLED. This includes ACLED's option to assign violent events to 'unidentified armed groups'. The difference in definitions is one explanatory factor to why the number of events recorded by ACLED can be significantly higher than events recorded by UCDP.<sup>17</sup> In this report, UCDP data have been used to contrast ACLED data and to provide figures on civilian deaths. To reflect the security dynamic in Syria, where the actor behind many security incidents is unknown, EUAA not only includes events that meet all UCDP's set criteria (codified as 'clear' events in the UCDP dataset), but also include events codified as 'unclear' and 'not applicable'.






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## General description of the security situation

### 1.1. Overview of conflicts

The country has de facto been partitioned into four main areas controlled by different parties to the conflict:

The Government of Syria (GoS), supported by Iran and pro-Iranian militia as well as
Russian troops, controls around two thirds of the country including Damascus and its
surrounding governorate, the country's south, the central governorate Homs, the
coastal governorates as well as parts of Aleppo, Raqqa, Deir Ez-Zor, Idlib and Hama
governorates<sup>20</sup> (areas represented in orange red in Map 2).

- The Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF), backed by the US, control about a quarter of Syrian territory comprising most of Hasaka governorate in the northeast as well as parts of Deir Ez-Zor, Raqqa and Aleppo governorates<sup>21</sup> (areas represented in light blue in Map 2).
- Pro-Turkish forces control two stretches along the Turkish border, from Jarabulus to Afrin in Aleppo governorate (the result of the Turkish military operations Euphrates Shield and Olive Branch<sup>22</sup>) and between Tall Abyad and Ras Al-Ayn in Raqqa and Hasaka governorates (Operation Peace Spring area)<sup>23</sup> (areas in northern Syria represented in green and yellow in Map 2).
- In the country's northwest, Hay'at Tahrir Al-Sham (HTS) and other allied opposition groups control parts of Idlib governorate and small strips of Aleppo, Hama and Latakia governorates<sup>24</sup> (areas in northern Syria represented in green in Map 2).

According to Jusoor for Studies, a Türkiye-based research organisation focusing on developments in Syria, <sup>25</sup> the frontlines between the zones of control were essentially frozen, without any side being able to bring about a decisive development in the conflict. <sup>26</sup> The Independent International Commission of Inquiry on the Syrian Arab Republic (UNCOI) noted, for the period from July to the end of December 2023, 'increased confrontation and infighting among the various authorities and forces controlling areas in the country'. <sup>27</sup> For the months from January to June 2024, the UNCOI reported a decrease in civilian casualties along the Idlib frontline, while Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL) attacks reportedly almost doubled across Syria and Iraq. <sup>28</sup> Sources further reported an increase of attacks carried out by Israel and Iran-backed groups in Syria since the 7 October attack in Israel and the subsequent outbreak of war in Gaza. <sup>29</sup> Kristin Helberg, political scientist and journalist with a focus on the Middle East, in a March 2024 publication identifies several types of conflict in Syria, of which several are internal and others motivated by external powers. <sup>30</sup> Among the internal conflicts are Russian and GoS air strikes on Idlib since October 2023 causing hundreds of civilian casualties. <sup>31</sup> ISIL attacks on military and civilian targets in the centre of the country as well as in



Deir Ez-Zor and Hasaka governorates,<sup>32</sup> clashes between SDF and Arab tribes in Deir Ez-Zor<sup>33</sup> and internal power struggles and human rights violations in SNA-controlled areas in the north and northwest of the country.<sup>34</sup> As for the conflicts motivated by external powers, the author lists Turkish drone strikes on SDF positions and infrastructure in the northeast, Israeli airstrikes on Iranian and Syrian military positions, rockets fired by pro-Iranian militia on US military bases in the northeast with retaliatory strikes carried out by the US on pro-Iranian militia, and lastly, Jordan's military campaign against drug smuggling networks in the south.<sup>35</sup> For more information on these conflicts motivated by external powers, please refer to section 1.3.

The heat map below shows the level of intensity of the conflict in the country from January to June 2024, with the highest incident intensity recorded in Idlib governorate, in the northern

### 1.2. Political developments

From October 2023 onwards, the country witnessed the largest escalation of violence since 2020, prompting Paulo Pinheiro, Chair of the UN Syria Commission of Inquiry, to urge a ceasefire. In a March 2024 press release, Pinheiro stated that in Syria '[m]ore than 90% now live in poverty, the economy is in freefall amid tightening sanctions, and increased lawlessness is fuelling predatory practices and extortion by armed forces and militia'.<sup>37</sup>

Multilateral attempts for a political solution to the Syrian conflict yielded no results: in January 2024, the 21st round of the Astana talks, a forum bringing together the Syrian government and opposition delegations,<sup>38</sup> as well as Russia, Iran and Türkiye,<sup>39</sup> did not bring about significant advancements regarding important issues. 40 In the wake of the political standstill of the Geneva talks following Russia's objection to the talks being held in Switzerland in 2022, UN special envoy for Syria Geir Peterson in March 2024 urged the Syrian government to rejoin the Geneva talks to rewrite or amend the Syrian constitution.<sup>41</sup> The normalisation process with the Syrian government envisaged by the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) similarly showed no developments, as the GoS failed to implement demands made by the GCC, such as an amnesty decree for Syrian refugees and combating the production of narcotics.<sup>42</sup> However, developments in bilateral relations, such as the resumption of regular flights between Saudi Arabia and Syria after a more than ten-year hiatus<sup>43</sup> and the state visit by Bashar Al-Assad to China, pointed towards an ease of diplomatic isolation. 44 Turkish president Erdogan in a June 2024 statement signalled openness to reestablish ties with the Syrian government, 45 affirming the change of his government's previous objective of overthrowing Bashar Al-Assad which had already been renounced in 2022.<sup>46</sup> In this vein, an official crossing between SNAcontrolled and GoS-controlled areas in Aleppo governorate was opened.<sup>47</sup>

In December 2023, the General Council of AANES adopted a new social contract<sup>48</sup> that included changing its name to DAANES (Democratic Autonomous Administration of North and East Syria) and renaming the 'General Council' to 'Peoples' Council of North and East Syria'.<sup>49</sup> After the ratification of the social contract, municipal elections were planned by DAANES for May 2024. They were later postponed to June and then to August 2024, following local criticism, including by the opposition-aligned Syrian Kurdish National Council (KNC),<sup>50</sup> as well as international pressure,<sup>51</sup> before being finally cancelled.<sup>52</sup> The DAANES region continued to be confronted with external destabilisation efforts, by neighbouring Türkiye,<sup>53</sup> Iran together with its affiliated militia on its southern flank as well as internal disputes between Kurdish parties.<sup>54</sup>



Jusoor for Studies noted a slight decrease of foreign military presence in Syria compared to mid-2023, from 830 to 801 locations.<sup>56</sup>

### 1.3.1. Iran and pro-Iranian militias

A June 2024 policy brief by the European Council on Foreign Relations (ECFR) describes Iran's strategy in Syria, stating that its goal is to ensure the survival of the Al-Assad government and to use Syria as a partner in its axis of resistance against Israel. Moreover, it indicates how Iran has sought influence not just via the Syrian government, but also on a local level by supporting Shia communities and other minorities and promoting the values of the Islamic Revolution, especially west of the Euphrates River in Deir Ez-Zor, described as its 'core zone of influence'. It has further managed to make inroads into SDF-controlled territory by supporting local Arab tribes frustrated with the Kurdish-led SDF, in preparation of a potential withdrawal of US forces from the region. Iran reportedly maintained an 'operational hub south of Damascus' near the airport which was extensively targeted by Israeli airstrikes.

The Iranian government, mainly through the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corp (IRGC), reportedly directly supported the GoS and continued to recruit Shia fighters of Afghan, Pakistani and Iraqi origin to fight in Syria. There were believed to be hundreds of IRGC officers in the role of military advisers in the country. Jusoor for Studies in mid-2024 noted a decrease in positions held by Iranian and Iran-backed groups in Syria from 570 in mid-2023 to 529, comprising 52 military bases and 477 outposts. All Syrian governorates reportedly had such Iranian or Iran-backed positions, with the highest concentration in Aleppo and Rural Damascus governorates with over 100 each. The reduction of Iranian presence was attributed to Iran withdrawing troops from southern Syria near the Golan heights following purported Israeli airstrikes on its positions. Jusoor for Studies analysed that the partial withdrawal was likely the result of a request made by Israel to Russia due to fear of Iranian presence on its borders and that Russian and GoS forces took up the vacated positions. However, two experts interviewed by Al-Monitor argued that this did not represent a substantial shift in Iran's overall strategy, but rather meant a temporary withdrawal of several high-ranking IRGC officers.

### 1.3.2. Türkiye

The Turkish government in an official statement made its presence in Syria dependent on two conditions: the elimination of terrorist organisations and an agreement between the Syrian government and the opposition to draft a new constitution and hold elections.<sup>66</sup> Türkiye

classifies the Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK) as a terrorist entity<sup>67</sup> and considers the SDF controlling northern Syria as an extension of the PKK.<sup>68</sup>

As of mid-2024, Turkish military forces had 12 military bases and 114 military outposts in Syria, 58 of them located in Aleppo governorate and 51 in Idlib governorate in the country's northwest as well as 10 military installations in Raqqa governorate.<sup>69</sup> From these bases, Turkish forces carried out ground and aerial reconnaissance using drones, allowing them to target government as well as SDF positions.<sup>70</sup> During the reference period, Türkiye in several instances launched airstrikes on SDF positions, claiming they were carried out in retaliation for attacks by the PKK on Turkish military positions in Iraq,<sup>71</sup> with escalations registered in October<sup>72</sup> and December 2023<sup>73</sup> as well as in January 2024.<sup>74</sup> The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights (SOHR) further reported Turkish forces shelling villages in Hasaka governorate from inside Operation Peace Spring area.<sup>75</sup> Airwars<sup>76</sup> continued to monitor Turkish airstrikes in Syria, which, between September 2023 and January 2024, were documented in northern Aleppo and Hasaka governorates and reportedly lead to 45 civilian deaths during that period. The organisation did not record any airstrikes between February and July 2024.<sup>77</sup> The air and drone strikes targeted SDF military positions but also vital infrastructure such as oil fields and electricity generation facilities.<sup>78</sup> One such attack in October 2023 on a power plant reportedly

led to 1 million people in Amuda and Qamishli having no access to water for weeks.<sup>79</sup> According to DAANES authorities, the airstrikes also led to civilian casualties.<sup>80</sup>

#### 1.3.3. Russia

As of mid-2024, Russia had increased its military presence compared to a year prior, establishing nine new positions and putting the total at 21 bases and 93 outposts, scattered across GoS-held territory as well as the Democratic Autonomous Administration of North and East Syria (DAANES) region.<sup>81</sup> Russia's main military assets are located in the coastal provinces, namely the navy base in the port of Tartous and the Hmeimim airbase in Latakia governorate.<sup>82</sup> There were widely diverging estimations regarding the size of the Russian troops, from 4 000<sup>83</sup> to 60 000.<sup>84</sup> AFP reported that, according to the Russian government, 63 000 troops had served in Syria, but that the actual number of soldiers stationed in the country as of October 2023 was unclear.<sup>85</sup>

Having first reduced its presence in the country in 2022 due to forces being needed for the invasion of Ukraine, Russian positions in the first half of 2024 reportedly increased due to Russian forces being deployed in southern Syria. Several sources reported that Russia established new military positions in Quneitra governorate along the buffer zone bordering the Israel-occupied Golan Heights. These new military positions were manned by Russian military police and reportedly aimed to prevent an escalation between Syria and Israel and monitor the ceasefire line between the two countries. In a July 2024 article, Enab Baladi, a Syrian oppositional media organisation registered as a nonprofit in the US, describes how Russia's tactic in Syria relied on drones for surveillance and reconnaissance, followed by airstrikes and use of suicide drones which also affected residential areas. Sources reported a rise in bombardments carried out by GoS forces with Russian support between October and December 2023 focusing on northwest Syria.

civilian facilities and caused civilian casualties.<sup>92</sup> Further Russian airstrikes in the northwest were reported for the first half of 2024 as well.<sup>93</sup> Airstrikes in April 2024 which according to the Russian Defence ministry targeted 'militants and extremists' reportedly struck close to US bases.<sup>94</sup>

### 1.3.4. US-led Coalition against ISIL

The US forces comprise about 900 personnel deployed in the northeast of the country. The US leads a joint task force from 25 countries with the aim of fighting ISIL in Iraq and Syria and advising and assisting local partner forces in maintaining the territorial defeat of ISIL. As of mid-2024, the US-led Global Coalition had 17 military bases and 15 outposts in Syria, most of them in the territory under Kurdish administration, Including bases in the country's largest oil field Al-Omar as well as Conoco gas field. Al-Omar as well as Conoco gas field. Maintained a garrison at Al-Tanf near the borders of Iraq and Jordan, which also housed about 500 fighters from local revolutionary factions. While, according to Jusoor for Studies, the official goal of the Global Coalition was to prevent an ISIL resurgence, in practice it was also there to prevent the Syrian government and its ally Iran from taking over SDF-controlled areas and seizing oil and gas resources there. In US forces stationed in Syria have come under attack from Iran-backed forces and have launched counterattacks, with several such retaliatory attacks being reported during the reference period.

#### 1.3.5. Israel

Israel's main strategy in Syria was reportedly to contain Iranian influence and stop the Iranian military support to Hezbollah<sup>104</sup> also by targeting Syrian government infrastructure such as airports and military facilities.<sup>105</sup> Haid Haid of Chatham House assessed that, from the end of 2023, Israel, prompted by the 7 October attacks by Hamas, reportedly employed a tactic of

escalation by directly targeting Iranian leadership in Syria, first marked by the killing of a high-ranking Iranian general in Damascus in December 2023.<sup>106</sup> The UN documented at least 22 Israeli airstrikes in Syria between 10 October and 31 December, including at Aleppo and Damascus airports which were temporarily put out of service.<sup>107</sup> Jusoor for Studies documented 20 Israeli airstrikes between September and December 2023, mostly in Rural Damascus but also in six other governorates across the country.<sup>108</sup> Further airstrikes were reported in 2024,<sup>109</sup> among which targeted strikes killing leading IRGC officials.<sup>110</sup> According to RFE/RL, suspected Israeli air strikes killed at least 18 IRGC members in Syria between December 2023 and April 2024.<sup>111</sup>

#### 1.3.6. Jordan

Since March 2023, Jordan has used its air force to target drug traffickers in southern Syria, especially in Sweida governorate. Airstrikes undertaken in December 2023 and January 2024 reportedly caused civilian casualties. 113

#### 1.4. Armed actors

### 1.4.1. Syrian Arab Army and affiliated armed groups

The Syrian armed forces consist of the Syrian Arab Army (SAA) (which includes the Republican Guard), the Naval Forces, Air Forces, Air Defence Forces, as well as pro-government militia<sup>114</sup> like the National Defence Forces (NDF) and Local Defence Forces (LDF). The Local Defence Forces (LDF), an auxiliary force established by Iran, was deployed throughout Syrian cities and governorates with a focus on Aleppo countryside; the Palestinian militia Liwa Al-Quds, affiliated with the Military Intelligence Directorate and Russia, was present in Aleppo city and the Syrian desert. The Syrian military was further supported by the Russian military, the

Lebanese Hezbollah and the Iranian Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC).<sup>117</sup> According to estimated figures provided by the International Institute for Strategic Studies (IISS) Military Balance of 2024, the Syrian armed forces comprised 169 000 active military personnel, 130 000 of whom formed the SAA, with its main and best trained fighting groups being the Fourth Division, the Republican Guard, the Special Forces (including the former Tiger Forces<sup>118</sup>) and the Fifth Assault Corps. A further estimated 100 000 persons belonged to state-allied paramilitary militia, such as the NDF (50 000<sup>119</sup>), sectarian militias as well as foreign militias of Afghan, Pakistani and Iraqi origin.<sup>120</sup>

The Iranian influence in Syria was described by Jusoor for Studies as falling into two categories: firstly Iranian-backed militias directly commanded by the IRGC Quds Force and made up of Syrian, Iranian, Iraqi, Afghan, and Pakistani fighters and secondly Lebanese Hezbollah and its local affiliates operating with the support or supervision of the IRGC.<sup>121</sup> Afghans and Pakistanis were reportedly making up the main contingent of the first category, with the Afghan Fatemiyoun Brigade estimated to have several thousand fighters in Syria and the Pakistani Zainabiyoun Brigade believed to have less than 1 000 fighters. <sup>122</sup> As for the second category, the Lebanese Hezbollah was estimated to have between 7 000 and 8 000 fighters in the country. 123 According to Jusoor for Studies, the Iran-backed militias, while present in almost all governorates, were unable to launch major military operations on their own due to lack of air force and other necessary military infrastructure, sometimes using the government's military facilities to compensate for this lack. Following Israel's military offensive in the Gaza strip, attacks by Iran-backed militia on US-led Coalition Forces in Syria and Iraq resumed in October 2023.<sup>125</sup> The policy research institute, Washington Institute for Near East Policy (TWI), in a continuously updated overview, keeps track of attacks carried out by the Islamic Resistance, an umbrella term for various Iran-backed militia. From mid-October 2023 until the mid-August 2024, TWI documented over 100 attacks by the Islamic Resistance on targets in Syria, mostly drone and missile attacks on US bases or allied SDF positions. 126

GoS troops, as well as pro-government fighters, continued to be deployed in the central Badia desert to fight ISIL cells, <sup>127</sup> leading to soldiers killed in ISIL attacks, <sup>128</sup> with a high death toll of

government troops noted in November 2023.<sup>129</sup> They were further repeatedly engaged in hostilities with HTS and its allied groups along the frontlines in northwest Syria.<sup>130</sup>

Civilian areas and infrastructure such as hospitals, schools and IDP settlements were affected by GoS and pro-GoS aerial bombardment and shelling.<sup>131</sup> The UNCOI report documented several rocket attacks and artillery shelling carried out by GoS forces in northwest Syria between September and December 2023, wounding and killing civilians.<sup>132</sup> In one incident in October 2023, the use of cluster munition was documented.<sup>133</sup> SNHR documented 62 civilian deaths (about 14 percent of the overall number of civilian deaths)<sup>134</sup> attributed to government forces and Iranian militias in the first half of 2024, among which 26 deaths due to torture.<sup>135</sup> GoS forces reportedly increased their use of suicide drones, carrying explosives and steered by remote control, to shell civilians in Idlib.<sup>136</sup> In a February 2024 article, researcher Haid Haid argued that local militias operated outside of government control and due to economic decline turned to illicit activities to generate income, such as smuggling, looting and kidnappings for ransom.<sup>137</sup> The Fourth Division for example was reportedly involved in systematic looting, imposing tolls at checkpoints and running protection rackets.<sup>138</sup>

#### **1.4.2.** The Syrian National Army

The Syrian National Army (SNA) is an umbrella of non-state armed groups operating in the north of the country in areas that were established as a result of Turkish-backed military operations between 2016 and 2019.<sup>139</sup> The SNA controls two areas adjoining the Turkish border: the first covers the northern countryside of Aleppo from Afrin to Jarablus, <sup>140</sup> and the second one spans from Tall Abyad to Ras Al-Ayn, in the north of Ragga and Hasaka

governorates.<sup>141</sup> SNA factions, while officially operating under the command of the Ministry of Defence of the Syrian Interim Government, 'receive financial, logistical, operational support, and in some instances instructions, from Türkiye and often operate in coordination with Turkish armed forces while engaged in military operations mainly against pro-government forces and the SDF'. <sup>142</sup> According to estimated figures provided by the IISS Military Balance of 2024, the SNA comprises 70 000 fighters. <sup>143</sup> It contained more than 35 factions from various governorates and affiliations and lacked a unitary structure of command. Human Rights Watch noted that SNA factions under Turkish oversight 'haphazardly' exercised their rule, with control of individual towns, villages and even certain neighbourhoods divided up between factions. The different factions 'often merge into legions, blocs, and divisions only to split or defect and merge into different structures. <sup>144</sup> According to Enab Baladi, the Sultan Murad Division was considered one of the most prominent SNA factions. <sup>145</sup> The military police, a force reportedly answering directly to Turkish intelligence and military officials, had subbranches in SNA-controlled cities and operated prisons and detention facilities across the Turkish-occupied zone, including in Afrin and Al-Bab. <sup>146</sup>

During the reference period, mutual shelling was reported between SNA and SDF positions around the Operation Peace Spring area,<sup>147</sup> as well as shelling and clashes in northern Aleppo governorate.<sup>148</sup> Several sources reported further clashes between different factions within the SNA.<sup>149</sup> In the first half of 2024, SNHR documented 12 civilian deaths (about 2.8 percent of the overall number of civilian deaths recorded by SNHR)<sup>150</sup> attributed to the SNA, among which 5 deaths due to torture.<sup>151</sup> In February 2024, Human Rights Watch published a report based on interviews with survivors and witnesses of abuses committed by SNA factions. The report documents 'abductions, arbitrary arrests, unlawful detentions, including of children, sexual

violence, and torture' perpetrated by various factions of the SNA, as well as looting, property seizures and extortion.<sup>152</sup> During the reference period, various sources reported such cases of abuse, including civilians killed in shootings,<sup>153</sup> arbitrary arrests,<sup>154</sup> kidnappings<sup>155</sup> and property seizures.<sup>156</sup> The UN Secretary-General report on children in armed conflict noted cases of child recruitment by the SNA.<sup>157</sup>

### 1.4.3. Syrian Democratic Forces

The Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) are a 'Kurdish-led coalition of non-state armed groups' which control Hasaka, eastern Deir Ez-Zor as well as parts of Raqqa and Aleppo governorates, <sup>158</sup> the region governed by the civilian Democratic Autonomous Administration of North and East Syria (DAANES). <sup>159</sup> They are comprised of the Kurdish People's Defense Units (YPG) as well as other groups of Kurdish, Arab, Assyrian/Syriac and Armenian origin. <sup>160</sup> According to estimated figures provided by the IISS Military Balance of 2024, the SDF consists approximately 50 000 fighters. <sup>161</sup> The Internal Security Forces (ISF), also referred to as Asayish, are the police force of the DAANES. <sup>162</sup> Both SDF and ISF have received funding from the US military to train, equip and pay their members. <sup>163</sup>

The United States Department of Defense (USDOD) noted that Turkish airstrikes, attacks by Iran-backed groups as well as tensions with Arab tribes in Deir Ez-Zor caused multiple SDF personnel losses and stretched the force's capacities which also impacted the anti-ISIL operations. The Rojava Information Center (RIC), an independent media organisation based in northeastern Syria and founded in 2018 by international journalists and researchers similarly described these challenges for the SDF in its annual report on ISIL sleeper cells throughout 2023. RIC stated that between September and December 2023, SDF and Asayish carried out 32 counter-ISIL raids and arrested 78 suspects while being confronted with Turkish

airstrikes on regional infrastructure, attacks by Iranian militia on US targets, ISIL sleeper cell attacks as well as the fallout of tribal unrest in Deir Ez-Zor. Even though US as well as Russian troops were deployed in DAANES according to military agreements to prevent further Turkish military aggression, in January 2024 a Kurdish official denounced the silence of both countries regarding Turkish military strikes on civilian infrastructure in the region. During the reference period, mutual shelling was reported between SNA and SDF positions around the Operation Peace Spring area, as well as shelling and clashes in northern Aleppo governorate. In July 2024, an increase of attacks and infiltration by SDF in SNA-controlled areas was reported in northern Aleppo governorate. The SDF were further confronted with tribal unrest in Deir Ez-Zor governorate, were local Arab tribes loyal to the government attacked the SDF several times during the reference period.

In the first half of 2024, SNHR documented 35 civilian deaths (about 8 percent of the overall number of civilian deaths documented in that period)<sup>172</sup> attributed to the SDF, among which 7 deaths due to torture.<sup>173</sup> The organisation documented individual cases of civilians being shot by SDF patrolmen<sup>174</sup> as well as further cases of arbitrary arrest.<sup>175</sup> The UN Secretary-General report on children in armed conflict and DIS noted cases of child recruitment by the SDF<sup>176</sup> as well as children being detained by the SDF on suspicion of ties to ISIL.<sup>177</sup> Several sources

reported child recruitment practices of SDF affiliated organisations such as the Revolutionary Youth Movement (RY).<sup>178</sup>

# **1.4.4.** Hay'at Tahrir al-Sham and other anti-government armed groups in the northwest

As of early 2024, Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS) was the largest insurgent group in northwest Syria<sup>179</sup> and the dominant group in Idlib governorate,<sup>180</sup> reportedly controlling around 75 percent of its territory as well as parts of Hama, Aleppo and Latakia governorates.<sup>181</sup> Based on an estimate published by the UN Security Council in January 2024, HTS comprised around 15 000 fighters and administrative operatives<sup>182</sup> while the IISS Military Balance of 2024 estimated the size of HTS to be about 10 000 fighters.<sup>183</sup> The UN Secretary-General report on children in armed conflict noted cases of child recruitment by HTS.<sup>184</sup>

While beset with internal divisions,<sup>185</sup> HTS was leading a variety of armed groups such as Ahrar al-Sham and Ansar al-Tawhid,<sup>186</sup> Jaysh al-Izza, the National Front for Liberation (these last three groups are part of the HTS-led Fateh al-Mubin operations room),<sup>187</sup> while other groups, like the Eastern Turkistan Islamic Movement (ETIM/TIP), were allied to HTS.<sup>188</sup> A report

published by the UN Security Council noted that there was a high degree of mobility of individuals between armed factions. The HTS factions' conduct was reportedly overseen by Türkiye's military and intelligence agencies, although some factions refused dialogue with Turkish forces. Hurras al Din (HAD), an HTS breakaway group and rival, was seeking to reclaim its legitimacy by exploiting popular dissent against the HTS leadership. Is lad an estimated 2 500 fighters. According to information provided by the UN Security Council, the group was reportedly mainly active in southeastern Idlib and northern Latakia, where it was quietly reactivating itself'.

During the reference period, HTS as well as HTS-allied groups, such as the National Front for Liberation and Ahrar Al-Sham,<sup>196</sup> engaged in military operations against pro-GoS forces<sup>197</sup> along the frontlines in northern Latakia, southern Idlib and Aleppo countryside, leading to deadly clashes.<sup>198</sup> The opposition groups in their engagements with GoS forces reportedly employed artillery, snipers, guided missiles as well as suspected suicide drones.<sup>199</sup> SNHR

documented 18 civilian deaths (about 4 percent of the overall number of civilian deaths)<sup>200</sup> attributed to HTS in the first half of 2024, among which 15 deaths due to torture.<sup>201</sup>

HTS reportedly followed a strategy of expansion into SNA-controlled areas by backing allied SNA factions. Tensions between HTS and neighbouring SNA-controlled areas were reported during the referencing period, resulting in clashes in September 2023, with a ceasefire brokered by Türkiye later that same month. Internal divisions within HTS ranks reportedly increased, while HTS was also reportedly losing support among allies within the SNA factions to reinforce their presence along the crossing points between the two areas of control in order to prevent future HTS incursions.

A popular anti-HTS protest movement erupted in February 2024,<sup>208</sup> triggered by a number of arrests over alleged collusion within the HTS ranks<sup>209</sup> and revelations of torture and extrajudicial killing by members of the HTS security forces. By late May, the protests had spread across most of HTS-controlled northwestern Syria, with demonstrators expressing increasingly direct demands for the removal of HTS leader Abu Muhammad al-Jolani and the dissolution of the HTS General Security branch.<sup>210</sup> These demands merged with growing discontent over HTS's administrative and economic policies.<sup>211</sup> Etana Syria<sup>212</sup> assessed in June 2024 that these protests had evolved into a 'major threat' to al-Jolani and his inner circle.<sup>213</sup>

As the protests expanded, HTS responded in an increasingly heavy-handed manner.<sup>214</sup> An escalation occurred in April 2024 when Abu Maria al-Qahtani, a former HTS leader who had fallen out with al-Jolani, was killed in a suicide bombing outside Sarmada. This incident has been widely viewed as a warning to individuals considering to join the growing protest movement, according to Etana Syria.<sup>215</sup> The following month, HTS violently<sup>216</sup> dispersed protesters at the Idlib military court and suppressed protests in Jisr al-Shughur and on the

road connecting Idlib city and Binnish.<sup>217</sup> During this crackdown, security forces beat protesters, hit some with armoured vehicles, and used live ammunition to disperse crowds.<sup>218</sup> This was followed by an arrest campaign<sup>219</sup> targeting active figures in the protest movement in various localities across the governorate.<sup>220</sup>

#### 1.4.5. Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL)

The USDOD noted that, during the reference period, ISIL did not control any territory and did not manage to launch large, complex attacks within the country.<sup>221</sup> US intelligence reportedly estimated ISIL to comprise about 1 500 fighters in Syria<sup>222</sup> while UN figures for the combined strength of ISIL in Syria and Iraq were between 3 000 and 5 000 fighters.<sup>223</sup> For the months from January to June 2024, the UNCOI reported that ISIL attacks had almost doubled across Syria and Iraq.<sup>224</sup>

ISIL reportedly 'operated in small, clandestine cells in deserts and mountains'<sup>225</sup> and mostly made use of small arms and IEDs for its attacks.<sup>226</sup> As of December 2023, the group's activities were reportedly centred in the Syrian desert in areas outside of DAANES.<sup>227</sup> The UN Security Council described the forms of attack in the first half of 2024 as 'mostly unsophisticated', focusing on GoS military positions around Sukhna and Palmyra in Homs governorate as well as targeting civilians.<sup>228</sup> Accordingly, recurring attacks on pro-government

fighters were reported between September 2023 and July 2024, some of them exacting a high death toll among pro-government forces. Gregory Waters, research analyst at the Counter Extremism Project (CEP), publishes monthly overviews on the state of the ISIL insurgency in central Syria. Between September 2023 and June 2024, he recorded 292 ISIL attacks in Homs, Hama, Raqqa and Deir Ez-Zor governorates and, to a lesser extent, in Aleppo governorate, leading to at least 391 pro-government fighters and about 94 civilians being killed. Tactics of engagement included ambushes on government positions and patrols using small and medium arms, Captures and assassinations as well as deaths resulting from mines or IEDs. In several instances, tank trucks belonging to the SDF as well as to government forces were targeted. A surge of ISIL activity was noted in March 2024, Easturing two attacks on people collecting truffles in the desert, leading to at least 29 civilians killed. This surge in violent deaths was also noted in 2023 during truffle season which lasts from February to April. In June 2024, SOHR reported fatalities resulting from military operations against ISIL cells in the Syrian desert to have reached 437 since the beginning of the year, including 365 government-backed forces, 29 ISIL members and 43 civilians.

According to the UN Security Council report covering the first half of 2024, in the country's east in Deir Ez-Zor and Hasaka governorates ISIL employed hit-and-run attacks in attempts to

free imprisoned group members.<sup>239</sup> The RIC, which publishes monthly sleeper cell reports focusing on ISIL activities in the DAANES region, between September 2023 and June 2024 recorded 181 ISIL sleeper cell attacks in DAANES, mostly in SDF-controlled parts of Deir-Ez-Zor governorate, leading to 74 military personnel killed as well as 33 civilians.<sup>240</sup> RIC in several monthly overviews noted targeted assassinations of civilians working for the DAANES administration or being associated with it.<sup>241</sup> In the country's south, ISIL reportedly maintained around 20 cells with 250 to 300 fighters<sup>242</sup> and several sources reported on the group's activity in Dar'a governorate.<sup>243</sup>

#### 1.5. Impact of violence on the civilian population

#### 1.5.1. Tactics and weapons used

Between September 2023 and August 2024, sources reported ongoing hostilities and military operations that included air and ground attacks, clashes, killings, and attacks with various types of IEDs, resulting in civilians being killed and injured.<sup>244</sup> Especially areas of mixed or contested control along the frontlines witnessed artillery shelling and airstrikes.<sup>245</sup> During the reference period, the UNCOI reported all main parties to the conflict as having carried out actions that may amount to war crimes, such as GoS and allied Russian forces carrying out aerial and rocket attacks targeting civilian infrastructure or civilian targets such as medical

facilities,<sup>246</sup> factions of the SNA committing torture, cruel treatment and pillaging,<sup>247</sup> SDF shelling residential areas and potentially committing or not preventing child recruitment,<sup>248</sup> Turkish forces carrying out drone attacks on civilians and civilian infrastructure,<sup>249</sup> HTS committing acts of enforced disappearance and torture<sup>250</sup> and ISIL employing vehicle-borne IEDs against civilians.<sup>251</sup> According to Action on Armed Violence (AOAV),<sup>252</sup> in 2023 ground-launched weapons caused 47 percent of civilian casualties (210 killed, 627 injured), air-launched weapons killed 175 and injured 399 civilians, and IEDs caused 90 civilian deaths and 195 wounded civilians in Syria. Both the use of air-launched explosive weapons and the use of IEDs reportedly increased compared to 2022, the first by 53 percent, the latter by 29 percent. According to the same source, civilian casualties caused by air-launched explosive weapons increased by 93 percent compared to 2022, while civilian casualties resulting from IEDs increased by 88 percent.<sup>253</sup>

October 2023 saw a notable increase in hostilities, after an unclaimed drone attack on a GoS military academy in Homs that killed at least 120 persons led to retaliatory air strikes by GoS and Russian forces in the in areas controlled by HTS in Idlib area, 254 subjecting the region to the most intensive bombardment since the March 2020 ceasefire. Sources documented the use of cluster munition and incendiary weapons by the GoS in these airstrikes. The use of incendiary weapons against civilians is prohibited under international humanitarian law. From November 2023 onwards, tactics reportedly shifted from aerial bombardment to the use of guided missiles as well as suicide drones. The random nature of such attacks reportedly caused rising fear and uncertainty among civilians in southern Idlib, western Hama, northern Latakia and western Aleppo governorates. Sources noted the use of suicide

drones by several conflict parties, such as GoS forces, <sup>261</sup> HTS<sup>262</sup> and Turkish forces. <sup>263</sup> Such attacks affected civilians, among whom farmers tending to their land in the northwest of the country. <sup>264</sup> According to Syria Civil Defence (White Helmets), from the beginning of 2024 to mid-April, 11 people were killed and 32 injured in more than 60 suicide drone attacks in northwestern Syria. <sup>265</sup> Enab Baladi quoted a military analyst saying that this new tactic of using suicide drones allowed the government to target areas where fighter aircrafts and drones where banned from flying due to proximity to Turkish bases. <sup>266</sup> Carrying up to two kilos of explosives and relatively cheap to manufacture, <sup>267</sup> suicide drones could be guided towards specific targets via a remote control system. <sup>268</sup>

There were recurring reports of landmine blasts killing and injuring fighters as well as civilians, especially in the Badia desert, Deir Ez-Zor and Raqqa governorates.<sup>269</sup> SNHR recorded the killing of 68 civilians, including 10 children and 14 women by landmines in the first half of 2024<sup>270</sup> and 111 civilians killed in landmine explosions in 2023.<sup>271</sup>

The United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UNOCHA) recorded 25 attacks on health care facilities during 2023, describing it a 'significant increase' compared to 2022. Safeguarding Health in Conflict Coalition (SHCC), a US-based group of more than 40 organisations which monitors attacks on health care, noted an increase of violent incidents affecting health care, with 57 incidents of violence against or obstruction of health care during 2023 compared to 45 in 2022. The rise was reportedly due to the increased use of explosive weapons in October in Idlib and Aleppo governorates. During 2023, at least three health facilities were destroyed and 19 damaged, and several health workers were killed.

#### 1.5.2. Security incidents

According to ACLED data,<sup>275</sup> between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024 there were 11 932 security incidents recorded in Syria: 2 966 were coded as battles, 7 001 as explosions/remote violence, and 1 965 as violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 9 588 security incidents (2 317 battles, 5 396 explosions/remote violence and 1 875 events coded violence against civilians). Most security incidents recorded by ACLED between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024 took place in Aleppo (3 121), Idlib (2 299) and Deir Ez-Zor (2 140) governorates, which were also the top three governorates in terms of total security incidents between September 2022 – August 2023. The lowest security incidents figures were recorded in Sweida (112), Damascus (28) and Tartous (10) governorates.




Figure 1. Evolution of ACLED security events coded 'battles', 'explosions/remote violence' and 'violence against civilians' between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024.<sup>276</sup>

By contrast, for the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, the Uppsala Conflict Data Program (UCDP)<sup>277</sup> recorded 1 305 security events leading to fatalities in Syria. The largest number of events were recorded in Deir Ez-Zor (260), Aleppo (236), Dar'a (197) and Idlib (157) governorates. The lowest numbers of security events were recorded in Tartous (4), Damascus (6) and Sweida (11) governorates. For 21 of the events recorded by UCDP the exact location within a governorate was not specified.<sup>278</sup>




Figure 2. Number of security events recorded by UCDP between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by governorate.

#### 1.5.3. Civilian fatalities

For 2023, the UN Secretary General reported that at least 556 civilians were killed in Syria as a result of conflict violence.<sup>279</sup> According to UNOCHA, fatalities and injuries in the year 2023 were particularly caused by airstrikes, ground-based shelling, explosive ordnance, IEDs, as well as Explosive Remnants of War (EWR), especially in Dar'a, Homs, Aleppo, Idlib, Raqqa, Hasaka and Deir Ez-Zor governorates.<sup>280</sup>

In 2023, SNHR recorded 1 032 civilian fatalities, <sup>281</sup> a drop by 2 % compared to 2022. <sup>282</sup> Other sources recorded comparable figures despite using different methodologies for recording

civilian casualties.<sup>283</sup> In the first eight months of 2024, SNHR documented 539 civilian fatalities.<sup>284</sup>




Figure 3. Number of civilian fatalities recorded by SNHR (2022-2024). Breakdown by governorate.

During the reporting period (September 2023 – August 2024), the SNHR documented 930<sup>285</sup> civilian fatalities in Syria. Most fatalities were documented during this period in the governorates of Dar'a (214), Deir Ez-Zor (173) and Idlib (136). The lowest number of civilian

fatalities recorded were in Tartous (no civilian fatalities), Quneitra (1) and Latakia (3) governorates.<sup>286</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded 1 305 security events leading to 2 926 fatalities in Syria, out of which 568 were civilian fatalities. The largest number of civilian fatalities were recorded in Deir Ez-Zor (90), Dar'a (90), Homs (87), Aleppo (82), and Idlib governorates (76). The lowest numbers of security events were recorded in Tartous (1), Quneitra (1) and Latakia (2) governorates.<sup>287</sup>




Figure 4. Number of civilian fatalities by governorate (September 2023 – August 2024) based on SNHR and UCDP data.

## **1.5.4.** Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Hostilities during 2023 reportedly resulted in 'significant damage and destruction of vital civilian infrastructure' and affected residential areas in villages and cities. For 2023, the US Department of State (USDOS) reported 'attacks impacting and destroying schools, hospitals, places of worship, water and electrical stations, bakeries, markets, civil defence force centres, densely populated residential areas, and houses were common throughout the country'. UNOCHA noted 25 attacks on health care facilities as well as shelling on 27 schools and 20 water systems in 2023. <sup>291</sup>

Northeast Syria was repeatedly hit by a series of Turkish airstrikes in October and December 2023 as well as mid-January 2024<sup>292</sup> which, according to several sources, targeted civilian infrastructure.<sup>293</sup> According to the Northeast Syria (NES) NGO Forum, a coordination body for NGOs operating in SDF controlled areas,<sup>294</sup> more than one million people were reportedly cut

off from electricity, while the outage also disabled Alouk water station and threatened access to water for more than 610 000 people, with a further over 1.4 million people having limited access to safe water. Furthermore, the services of 38 health facilities were disrupted.<sup>295</sup> The airstrikes in northeast Syria reportedly affected the electricity infrastructure in Hasaka governorate, as well as Kobane (Aleppo) and Ain Issa (Raqqa).<sup>296</sup> Suwaidiya Gas Station, the only producer of cooking gas in northeast Syria, was hit in the round of airstrikes in October 2023, greatly reducing the availability of cooking gas and hiking up its price.<sup>297</sup>

Northwest Syria witnessed a series of airstrikes and artillery attacks in October 2023, reportedly targeting civilian infrastructure, including ten schools and educational facilities, five mosques, five medical facilities, three displacement camps and four markets.<sup>298</sup> The bombardments carried out by Syrian and Russian forces on HTS controlled territory reportedly also affected power and water plants.<sup>299</sup>

As of November 2023, UNOCHA estimated 11.5 million people, about 50 percent of the country's population, to be living in areas contaminated with explosive ordnance (EO), with a daily average of 17 EO-related incidents across the country. North Press Agency (NPA) reported 252 civilians killed and an additional 272 civilians injured by ERW in 2023, with governorates Deir Ez-Zor, Hama and Homs most affected as ISIL had planted mines there while it still controlled the area. According to figures released in August 2024 by the Syria Response Coordinators, an organisation describing itself as a humanitarian civil society organisation active in northern Syria, 229 civilians were killed by ERW explosions since the beginning of 2024 across the country, while the country's northwest was reportedly particularly affected by remnants of war caused by bombardment carried out by GoS and Russian forces. Syrian media sources frequently reported on civilian casualties as a result of ERW explosions, especially across the country's north.

In May 2024, several organisations active in the field of mine clearance release a joint report based on a survey of 1139 communities visited between June 2023 and January 2024 in

northeast Syria, according to which 127 communities reported being affected by ERW.<sup>305</sup> As for Aleppo governorate, Kobane community was reported to be 'highly impacted' by explosive ordnances and Ras Al-Ain and Markada communities in Hasaka governorate was described as 'severely impacted'. Raqqa governorate was reported as being overall 'extremely affected', while more than half (55 percent) of all surveyed communities in Deir Ez-Zor district was reported as being affected by explosive ordnances.<sup>306</sup>

#### 1.5.5. Displacement and return

According to UNHCR, at the end of 2023 there were about 6.5 million Syrian refugees and asylum-seekers,<sup>307</sup> about 5 million of which hosted by neighbouring countries Türkiye, Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq and Egypt.<sup>308</sup> As of the end of 2023, there were 7.2 million IDPs in the country<sup>309</sup> according to UNOCHA figures of July 2023, about 2 million of which living in camps, with the largest IDP population recorded in Idlib governorate (2.1 million), followed by Aleppo governorate (1.6 million) and Rural Damascus (986 000).<sup>310</sup> In 2023, there were reportedly about 174 000 displacement movements due to conflict and violence which represented a slight increase compared to 2022.<sup>311</sup> From September to December 2023, UNOCHA recorded 119 758 IDP movements across the country.<sup>312</sup> The UN organisation did not release any monthly figures for IDP movements in 2024.

In early September 2023, an increase in shelling in the country's northwest led to the displacement of 3 000 families, many of whom from the southern countryside of Jarabulus (Aleppo governorate).<sup>313</sup> Most of IDP movements in September 2023 were, however, registered in Deir Ez-Zor governorate with over 20 000<sup>314</sup> as fighting broke out between Arab tribesmen and the SDF in the governorate.<sup>315</sup> In October, GoS forces launched retaliatory airstrikes for an unclaimed attack on a military academy in Homs that targeted more than 2 300 locations.<sup>316</sup> These airstrikes and shelling in Idlib and western Aleppo governorates according to UNOCHA resulted in the displacement of more than 120 000 people, 60 000 of whom had reportedly returned to their former homes by 18 October 2023.<sup>317</sup> The Internal

Displacement Monitoring Centre (IDMC) registered about 79 000 displacement resulting from the airstrikes carried out in retaliation for the Homs military academy attack.<sup>318</sup>

In August 2024, renewed clashes broke out in villages along the Euphrates between SDF and Arab tribal forces backed by GoS and Iranian militias, reportedly forcing hundreds of civilians in both areas of control to flee.<sup>319</sup> The UN estimated around 3 500 families to have been temporarily displaced by the fighting.<sup>320</sup>

As of July 2023, UNOCHA recorded 155 325 returnees for that year, the most returns being recorded in Aleppo governorate (54 769) and Idlib governorate (33 244).<sup>321</sup> In the last four months of 2023, UNOCHA recorded 32 849 spontaneous IDP return movements across the country,<sup>322</sup> 25 500 of which within Idlib governorate in October 2023.<sup>323</sup> The UN organisation did not release any monthly figures for IDP return movements in 2024. According to UNOCHA, several factors were responsible for IDP return movements in 2023, among which 'challenges related to livelihoods, limited work opportunities, high rental costs in their former areas of residence, and the impact of the earthquakes'.<sup>324</sup>



# 2. Governorate-level description of the security situation

### 2.1. Idlib governorate

#### 2.1.1. General description of the governorate

Idlib governorate is located in northwestern Syria, bordering Türkiye to the north and the governorates of Hama to the south, Aleppo to the east, and Latakia to the west.<sup>326</sup> The governorate is divided into five districts: Al Ma'ra, Ariha, Harim, Idlib, and Jisr-Ash-Shughur.<sup>327</sup> The governorate's capital is Idlib city.<sup>328</sup> Both the M5 (Damascus-Aleppo) and M4 (Latakia-Aleppo) highways run through the governorate, converging in the strategic town of Saraqib.<sup>329</sup> Most of the humanitarian aid into northwestern Syria travels through the Bab al-Hawa border crossing between Türkiye and Syria. Following a closure declared in July 2023, deliveries later resumed after an agreement was reached between the UN and the Syrian government.<sup>330</sup>

According to UNOCHA, the population of Idlib governorate was estimated to be 3 104 168 as of July 2023, including 2 106 929 IDPs.<sup>331</sup> Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Idlib governorate had 1 208 154 inhabitants.<sup>332</sup> For information on the governorate's ethno-religious composition, see section 2.1.1 of the EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (July 2021).

#### 2.1.2. Conflict background and armed actors

Idlib is the last remaining stronghold of the Syrian rebel groups opposed to the GoS.<sup>333</sup> Türkiye's military presence in the governorate has so far prevented a successful military intervention by the GoS and Russian forces.<sup>334</sup> For further information on the governorate's conflict background, see section 2.1.2 of the <u>EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (July 2021)</u> and section 2.1.2 of the <u>EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (October 2023)</u>.

Anti-GoS armed groups controlled the northern and western parts of the governorate, which covered virtually all of its territory north and immediately south of the M4 highway, 335 while the southern and southeastern portions of the governorate were mapped as being controlled by the GoS.336

As of early 2024, HTS was the largest insurgent group in northwest Syria<sup>337</sup> and the dominant group in Idlib governorate,<sup>338</sup> reportedly controlling around 75 % of its territory.<sup>339</sup> Its political wing, the so-called Salvation Government, was exercising de facto control and administrative functions in this area.<sup>340</sup> The HTS central command was located in Idlib.<sup>341</sup> While beset with internal divisions,<sup>342</sup> HTS was leading a variety of armed groups such as Ahrar al-Sham and Ansar al-Tawhid,<sup>343</sup> Jaysh al-Izza, the National Front for Liberation (these last three groups are part of the HTS-led Fateh al-Mubin operations room),<sup>344</sup> while other groups like the Eastern Turkistan Islamic Movement (ETIM/TIP) were allied to HTS.<sup>345</sup> Since 2022, HTS's allies in Idlib have reportedly also included the Hamza Division and Sultan Murad Division, two factions affiliated with the SNA<sup>346</sup> (HTS's rival to the east)<sup>347</sup> that signed security agreements with HTS.<sup>348</sup> Further factions present in the governorate included Khatiba al-Tawhid wal-Jihad (KTJ), another HTS ally mainly active across southern Idlib, Latakia and Hama, and the group Ansar al-Islam (comprising 250 to 300 fighters).<sup>349</sup>

Hurras al Din (HAD), an HTS breakaway group deemed closer to al-Qaeda but weaker than HTS<sup>350</sup> and whose presence has been suppressed by HTS, was seeking to reclaim its legitimacy by exploiting popular dissent against the HTS leadership.<sup>351</sup> Ansar al-Islam shared resources and training facilities with HAD.<sup>352</sup>

Turkish forces maintained more than 100 military sites, including bases and observation posts, across Idlib and northern Syria.<sup>353</sup> As Enab Baladi indicated, 54 Turkish military sites were distributed across areas controlled by HTS.<sup>354</sup> As of July 2024, Turkish forces had 51 military positions in Idlib governorate, most of them located in areas of the rebel-controlled zone that lies adjacent to GoS-held territory in southern Idlib and Latakia, according to Jusoor for Studies.<sup>355</sup> Their presence in eastern Idlib was reinforced during the reference period amid military escalation in the governorate.<sup>356</sup> The SNA also continued to have a presence in the governorate.<sup>357</sup> Moreover, there was a reported presence of al-Qaeda and ISIL.<sup>358</sup> In the second half of 2023, ISIL transferred some of its leaders and operatives from the northwest to the central desert (Badia) to avoid attacks from HTS.<sup>359</sup>

The SAA forces present in Idlib governorate included the 14th Special Forces Division, tasked with combat missions and rapid interventions.<sup>360</sup> There was also a presence of Lebanese Hezbollah (LH) who in October 2023 were transferred from Kafriya and al-Fu'ah towns to al-Mayadin in Deir Ez-Zor governorate as part of LH's measures to redistribute fighters to more sensitive fronts.<sup>361</sup> The Palestinian Liberation Army (PLA) maintained infantry battalions and an artillery battalion at the Idlib frontline.<sup>362</sup> As of July 2024, there were 27 Iranian and 6 Russian

military positions in the governorate, located in the GoS-held southern and southeastern parts, according to Jusoor for Studies.<sup>363</sup>

#### 2.1.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

#### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

For information on security-related developments regarding the 2024 popular protests against HTS, see section 1.4.4 of this report.

Missile and artillery attacks by GoS forces on villages and towns in eastern and southern rural Idlib intensified in September 2023<sup>364</sup> and significantly<sup>365</sup> escalated further in October<sup>366</sup> following an unclaimed drone attack on Homs Military Academy, on 5 October 2023, that resulted in dozens of deaths.<sup>367</sup> October saw a significant rise in the number of ground attacks by GoS<sup>368</sup> targeting population centres.<sup>369</sup> According to the UNCOI, GoS and allied Russian forces struck some 2 300 sites in Idlib and western Aleppo.<sup>370</sup>

As the SNHR reported, some of these attacks deliberately targeted specific installations while others were of an indiscriminate nature.<sup>371</sup> The campaign eventually expanded to most opposition-held areas,<sup>372</sup> with concentrations of attacks recorded in Idlib city and several areas of northern, western, southern and eastern rural Idlib. The attacks affected both areas in the vicinity of the front lines<sup>373</sup> and areas located far from the front lines<sup>374</sup> (including Idlib city).<sup>375</sup> October 2023 also saw an increase in Russian airstrikes which were mainly concentrated in civilian areas in southern and western Idlib.<sup>376</sup> Amongst others, suspected Russian warplanes attacked Al-Masbah (Ahl Saraqib) Camp for IDPs<sup>377</sup> in rural Jisr-Ash-Shughur district (western Idlib), killing several civilians.<sup>378</sup> The UNCOI assessed that this escalation in hostilities in

apparent retaliation for the Homs Military Academy attack was the most significant escalation witnessed in the northwest since 2019/20.<sup>379</sup> Dozens of civilians, including children, were killed in the governorate as a result of these attacks.<sup>380</sup>

While attacks by GoS and allied forces decreased after October 2023,<sup>381</sup> regular attacks on opposition-held areas with machine-gun fire and missile and artillery strikes persisted.<sup>382</sup> These regular attacks, which continued throughout the reference period, targeted a variety of civilian sites<sup>383</sup> such as schools,<sup>384</sup> medical facilities,<sup>385</sup> marketplaces<sup>386</sup> and facilities sheltering IDPs,<sup>387</sup> as well as civilians harvesting crops and tending to livestock.<sup>388</sup> The attacks caused multiple civilian casualties,<sup>389</sup> although civilian deaths from fighting between pro-GoS and armed opposition groups were on a lesser scale than during the escalation seen in the second half of 2023.<sup>390</sup> As reported by the UNCOI, artillery and rocket attacks by GoS forces were presumably based in Saraqib and killed or injured civilians in Idlib city, Ariha and Sarmin in early 2024, while further civilian casualties were caused in April 2024 by Russian airstrikes targeting a factory site in western rural Idlib.<sup>391</sup>

Moreover, the last quarter of 2023 and January 2024 saw several instances of GoS forces using cluster munitions in Termanin (rural northern Idlib)<sup>392</sup> and around Idlib city, including

cluster munitions with incendiary materials.<sup>393</sup> These attacks resulted in a number of civilian casualties.<sup>394</sup> The use of suicide drones against military and civilian targets escalated in early 2024, as noted by the Omran Center for Strategic Studies,<sup>395</sup> and has become a key component of the GoS's military strategy in northwestern Syria.<sup>396</sup>

In one instance, in January 2024, Iranian military-affiliated media cited by the Institute for the Study of War (ISW) and the Critical Threats Project (CTP) stated that several IRGC missiles had been fired from Iranian territory targeting ISIL, HTS and ETIM in Idlib.<sup>397</sup> One of them targeted a medical facility in Talteta village<sup>398</sup> (northwest Idlib) that was reportedly no longer in use.<sup>399</sup> Regarding attacks by GoS forces recorded between September and December 2023, the UNCOI noted that it 'did not find any evidence of military objectives located in the immediate vicinity of the targets.'<sup>400</sup>

HTS-affiliated units carried out counter-attacks against GoS positions in response to GoS attacks in October 2023, albeit at a significantly smaller scale.<sup>401</sup> Their ground operations against GoS forces saw an escalation in March 2024<sup>402</sup> when they conducted multiple infiltration attempts and raids against GoS sites in rural Idlib and other parts of the northwest.<sup>403</sup> HTS's Fateh al-Mubin operations room also carried out regular artillery<sup>404</sup> and missile strikes<sup>405</sup> as well as sniper attacks against GoS troops.<sup>406</sup>

#### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 2 299 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Idlib governorate, of which 262 were coded as battles, 1 949 explosions/remote violence and 88 incidents of violence against civilians.<sup>407</sup> By comparison,

for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 1796 security incidents (198 battles, 1 495 explosions/remote violence and 103 events coded violence against civilians) in Idlib governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in Ariha and al Ma'ra districts. According to ACLED, GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were the main actors involved in security incidents (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') during the reference period, accounting for majority of security incidents coded as explosions/remote violence (around 70 %). Opposition armed groups, including HTS and affiliated armed groups were involved particularly in incidents coded battles and violence against civilians.








Figure 5. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Idlib governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.<sup>408</sup>

#### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 136 civilian fatalities in Idlib governorate. 409 For the same period, UCDP recorded 76 civilian fatalities. 410 The highest number of civilian fatalities were recorded in October 2023 (50 civilian deaths documented by

SNHR $^{411}$  and 35 by UCDP, respectively). $^{412}$  In Idlib governorate, SNHR documented 246 civilian fatalities in 2021, $^{413}$  147 in 2022 $^{414}$  and 145 in 2023. $^{415}$ 

#### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

During the reference period, there were multiple reports of bombardments by GoS and Russian forces causing destruction or damage to educational facilities, <sup>416</sup> residential buildings, <sup>417</sup> market facilities, <sup>418</sup> mosques, <sup>419</sup> hospitals, <sup>420</sup> facilities sheltering IDPs, <sup>421</sup> and industries. <sup>422</sup> According to UNCOI, the attacks by pro-GoS forces in October 2023 on sites in Idlib and western Aleppo 'critically affected' 43 medical facilities, seven schools and more than 20 water systems. <sup>423</sup> Some destruction of infrastructure was reportedly also caused by HTS attacks on GoS positions. <sup>424</sup>

Idlib remained one of the governorates with the highest levels of unexploded ordnance contamination.<sup>425</sup> During the reference period, several civilians, including children, were

reported to have been killed or injured in landmine detonations, 426 including in southern Idlib427 and the Jisr-Ash-Shugur area.428

#### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023 there were 2 106 929 IDPs in Idlib governorate. As of February 2024, the same source indicated that some 2 020 000 IDPs were living in the rebel-controlled part of the governorate. Data published by the Syrian NGO Assistance Coordination Unit (ACU) indicated that there were 1 696 256 IDPs in the governorate as of June 2024. During the surge in hostilities in Idlib and western Aleppo in October 2023, some 120 000 individuals were displaced from these two areas within a two-week period. Around 12 000 remained displaced at the end of 2023, according to the UNCOI. Between September and December 2023, UNOCHA recorded some 86 900 IDP movements in Idlib governorate, by far the highest number among all governorates. Most of these movements (around 74 900, or 86 %) took place in the month of October. Around 76 500 of the IDP movements recorded in the last four months of 2023 occurred within the governorate, while 10 400 IDP movements took place from other governorates into Idlib. No comparable data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

Meanwhile, UNOCHA recorded around 27 000 IDP return movements between September and December 2023, the overwhelming majority of which (some 25 500, or 94 %) were likewise recorded in October. No comparable data could be found on numbers of IDP return movements in 2024. Almost all IDP return movements during the last four months of 2023 (around 26 900) occurred within Idlib governorate. The GoS has encouraged IDP returns from opposition-held areas to areas under GoS control in the Idlib countryside, including eastern Idlib. Many of those returning were motivated by the desire to return to their farmlands and

benefit from their produce, rather than staying in IDP camps, where conditions were harsh. 437 But many individuals returning to areas in Idlib found their houses destroyed, damaged beyond repair, looted or confiscated. 438



#### 2.2. Aleppo governorate

#### **2.2.1.** General description of the governorate

Aleppo governorate is located in northern Syria, bordering Türkiye to the north and the governorates of Idlib to the west, Hama to the south, and Raqqa to the east. The governorate is divided into eight districts: Jebel Saman, Afrin (or Efrin), A'zaz (or Azaz), Al-Bab, Manbij (or Menbij), Jarablus, Ain Al Arab (or Kobane), and As-Safira. The governorate's capital is the city of Aleppo. The M5 and M4 highways connect Aleppo city with Damascus and western Syria.

According to UNOCHA, the population of Aleppo governorate was estimated to be 4 749 350 as of July 2023, including 1 641 306 IDPs.<sup>444</sup> Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the

Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Aleppo governorate had 4 244 684 inhabitants.<sup>445</sup> Aleppo city's population was estimated by the CIA at 2 203 000 as of 2023.<sup>446</sup>

#### 2.2.2. Conflict background and armed actors

For information on the Aleppo governorate's conflict background, see section 2.2.2 of the EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (July 2021) and section 2.2.2 of the EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (October 2023). The governorate is divided into areas controlled by anti-GoS armed groups, the GoS, and the SDF. 447 Moreover, Iranian, Russian and Turkish forces operate multiple military sites. 448

The SNA controlled northern and eastern rural Aleppo. This area adjoining the Turkish border comprises Afrin and its countryside (Operation Olive Branch area) and the area between A'zaz, Al-Bab and Jarablus (Euphrates Shield area). The SNA reportedly operated 57 military sites in the region. According to Enab Baladi, the SNA's relationship with HTS has been marked by rivalry and hostility. During the first half of 2024, the SNA reinforced crossing points linking its territories with those held by HTS, with the likely aim of diminishing HTS's ability to deploy its forces against the SNA. As of mid-2024, there was an increased presence of military police in SNA-held territory along roads connecting HTS- and SNA-controlled areas.

According to a map published by Hevdesti-Synergy Association for Victims, a Syrian NGO aiming to document human rights abuses in northern Syria, in 2022 and still claimed to be current as of early 2024, a multitude of armed factions were present in the Operation Olive Branch (Afrin) area, including the Al-Hamza division, Ahrar Al-Sham, Ahrar Al-Sharqiya, the Sultan Murad Division, Jaysh Al-Islam, the Sultan Muhammad Al-Fateh Brigade, the Suleiman Shah Brigade, the 13th Division, the Northern Hawks Brigade, and Jaysh Al-Nukhba. 456

HTS controlled western rural Aleppo.<sup>457</sup> During the reference period, HTS continued to bolster its ties with the Eastern Division of Ahrar al-Sham, which managed the strategic Al-Hamran crossing<sup>458</sup> in the city of Jarablus linking SNA-held areas with those controlled by the Kurdish SDF.<sup>459</sup> The Eastern Division defected in September 2023 from its former SNA allies to join the HTS-affiliated Ahrar al-Sham proper, thus becoming a key HTS ally in the area.<sup>460</sup> Another HTS-aligned faction with a presence in the governorate was the ETIM/TIP.<sup>461</sup>

Türkiye maintained more than 100 military sites, including bases and observation posts, across northern Syria. According to Jusoor for Studies, Turkish forces had 58 military positions in Aleppo governorate as of July 2024, with particularly high densities found in Afrin district and along the Turkish-occupied zone's borders with GoS- and SDF-held territories. 463

The GoS, on the other hand, controlled the governorate's southern and central parts including the city of Aleppo. Aleppo. This zone also comprised 117 Iranian and 12 Russian sites which were concentrated around Aleppo city, with Iranian sites also clustered in areas bordering Idlib governorate and Afrin district and some Russian sites scattered around eastern Aleppo. GoS forces were also present around Tall Rifaat along with Iran-backed forces and Russian troops. Pro-GoS and Iran-backed forces and Russian forces were also present in SDF-controlled Manbij. The Russian-supported Fifth Corps of the SAA maintained a presence around Aleppo city and its countryside. The SAA's Fourth Division controlled crossings linking GoS-held territories with SDF-, SNA- and HTS-held areas, Ilhough several checkpoints belonging to the Fourth Division were removed around Aleppo city during the reference period.

The SDF controlled Tall Rifaat,<sup>473</sup> an area with a significant presence of Kurdish People's Protection Units (YPG) and Women's Protection Units (YPJ),<sup>474</sup> the Manbij and Ain Al Arab (Kobane) areas further east,<sup>475</sup> and Aleppo city's Sheikh Maqsoud and Ashrafieh neighbourhoods as well as towns and villages in the al-Shahbaa region. All these areas were administered by civilian entities affiliated with the Kurdish DAANES.<sup>476</sup> The PYD/YPG forces in the region, especially those in Tall Rifaat, were known to collaborate with the GoS and its allies.<sup>477</sup>

#### 2.2.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

#### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

Conflict between GoS forces and anti-GoS armed groups

Following an unclaimed drone attack on Homs Military Academy on 5 October 2023 that resulted in dozens of deaths, 478 ground attacks by GoS forces in the northwest significantly escalated in October 2023, with western rural Aleppo among the areas witnessing a concentration of attacks. 480 Simultaneously, Russian forces carried out aerial attacks. 481 As the SNHR reported, the attacks both targeted areas located close to the front lines and densely populated residential areas located far from them. 482 Incendiary weapons were used in attacks on schools and residential areas east of the city of Atarib, 483 while another bombardment targeted the Urum Al Soghra IDP camp (Jebel Saman district). 484 According to the UNCOI, GoS and allied Russian forces struck some 2 300 sites in western Aleppo and Idlib during that month. 485 These attacks resulted in a number of civilian deaths and injuries in Aleppo governorate, including in Darat Izza city (western rural Aleppo), which repeatedly came under attack in early October. 486

In the months following, GoS forces and their affiliated militias continued their regular attacks targeting various civilian sites in western Aleppo's armed opposition-held areas with machine gun fire and artillery and missile strikes, 487 albeit with significantly lower frequency than in

October. He targets again included Darat Izza city, He eastern outskirts of Atarib city, He and further areas of western rural Aleppo. Horeover, the use of suicide drones against opposition-held areas became a key component of the GoS's military strategy in northwestern Syria. These attacks by GoS and allied forces caused a number of civilian casualties. Regarding attacks by GoS forces investigated by the UNCOI between September and December 2023, the UNCOI noted that it 'did not find any evidence of military objectives located in the immediate vicinity of the targets.'

HTS's continuing ground operations against GoS forces escalated in March 2024<sup>495</sup> when it conducted multiple infiltration attempts and raids against GoS sites in western Aleppo and other parts of the northwest.<sup>496</sup> HTS's Fateh al-Mubin operations room carried out mortar attacks against pro-GoS forces in northern rural Aleppo<sup>497</sup> and sniper attacks targeting GoS troops in western Aleppo.<sup>498</sup> At least one HTS attack, on the towns of Al-Zahra' and Nebbel (western Aleppo), was reported to have resulted in civilian deaths and injuries.<sup>499</sup>

#### *Infighting between anti-GoS armed groups*

In late September 2023, repeated clashes erupted in northeastern Aleppo between HTS and the SNA<sup>500</sup> (Second Corps) over control of the strategic Al-Hamran crossing<sup>501</sup> (located in Jarablus, eastern Aleppo),<sup>502</sup> after Ahrar al-Sham's Eastern Section, responsible for securing the crossing defected from the SNA to join Ahrar al-Sham proper, a HTS affiliate.<sup>503</sup> Several

HTS and SNA fighters were killed or injured in the clashes.<sup>504</sup> HTS made some territorial advances in Afrin, Manbij,<sup>505</sup> and Jarablus during an eastwards campaign, but the SNA ultimately regained control over almost all of the territory it had lost. The fighting came to an end after Türkiye brokered a ceasefire agreement in early October 2023.<sup>506</sup> In January 2024, Military Police forces and Turkish military units unsuccessfully led a special mission targeting sites of the Ahrar al-Sham Eastern Section around the crossing.<sup>507</sup>

#### Conflict between Türkiye/SNA and SDF

The continuing conflict between Türkiye/SNA and the SDF recurrently<sup>508</sup> erupted into exchanges of attacks.<sup>509</sup> In September 2023, the SNA assassinated the head of the Manbij Military Council in an IED attack.<sup>510</sup> A further escalation was observed in October 2023 when Turkish planes launched airstrikes against Tall Rifaat and the Menagh Military Airbase, whilst attacking numerous other sites in Hasaka and Raqqa.<sup>511</sup> Meanwhile, SDF attacks on an IDP camp in eastern rural Aleppo and a village in the Manbij countryside the same month resulted in several civilians being killed or injured.<sup>512</sup> During the reference period of this report, Turkish and affiliated forces repeatedly launched drone strikes against sites with an SDF presence, including in northern Aleppo,<sup>513</sup> Ain Al Arab (Kobane),<sup>514</sup> and the Manbij countryside,<sup>515</sup> and carried out artillery strikes on SDF sites south of Afrin and in northeastern Aleppo,<sup>516</sup> where they also shelled villages in rural Manbij.<sup>517</sup> Meanwhile, the SDF carried out artillery strikes on the SNA-held towns of Al-Bab, A'zaz and Marea.<sup>518</sup> Attempts by the SDF and the SNA to infiltrate into each other's zones of control resulted in intense clashes.<sup>519</sup>

ISIL insurgency and attacks by unidentified actors

Sources noted that ISIL carried out several attacks targeting SDF and GoS forces in Aleppo governorate during the reference period.<sup>520</sup> According to Gregory Waters,<sup>521</sup> the group conducted one confirmed attack per month during the last three months of 2023<sup>522</sup> and in January,<sup>523</sup> March<sup>524</sup> and June 2024.<sup>525</sup>

Moreover, there were reports of detonations of bombs of unidentified source in public places which resulted in a number of casualties, including in the city of Al-Bab<sup>526</sup> and a busy marketplace in a A'zaz city.<sup>527</sup>

#### Israeli airstrikes

As Israel escalated its airstrikes in Syria from October 2023,<sup>528</sup> the reference period witnessed several Israeli attacks on military and logistical sites in the governorate, including on Aleppo airport (attacked four times in October<sup>529</sup> and again in November 2023<sup>530</sup>) and Iranian-linked sites around Aleppo city (March 2024). The March attack left dozens of GoS troops and Hezbollah members dead.<sup>531</sup>

#### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 3 121 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Aleppo governorate, of which 517 were coded as battles, 2 104 explosions/remote violence and 500 incidents of violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 2 623 security incidents (551 battles, 1 585 explosions/remote violence and 487 events coded violence against civilians) in Aleppo governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts,

with the highest number being documented in Jebel Saman, A'zaz and Afrin. By comparison, very few incidents were recorded in the district of As-Safira. According to ACLED, GoS forces and affiliated armed groups and military forces of Türkiye were (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') were involved in the majority of incidents coded as explosions/remote violence against opposition groups (HTS and affiliated armed groups, SNA) and SDF, respectively. The majority of incidents coded violence against civilians involved National Police forces, Turkish police forces and SNA factions, and unidentified armed groups.




Figure 6. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Aleppo governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.<sup>533</sup>

#### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 129 civilian fatalities in Aleppo governorate.<sup>534</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded 82 civilian fatalities in Aleppo

governorate.<sup>535</sup> SNHR documented 231 civilian fatalities in 2021<sup>536</sup>, 224 in 2022<sup>537</sup> and 153 in 2023<sup>538</sup> in Aleppo governorate.

#### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

During the reference period, there were several reports of bombardments by GoS and Russian forces causing destruction or damage to residential buildings, <sup>539</sup> religious, educational facilities, <sup>541</sup> and market infrastructure. <sup>542</sup> According to UNCOI, the attacks by pro-GoS forces in October 2023 on sites in Idlib and western Aleppo 'critically affected' 43 medical facilities, seven schools and more than 20 water systems. <sup>543</sup>

Aleppo remained one of the governorates with the highest levels of unexploded ordnance contamination.<sup>544</sup> During the reference period, several civilians were killed or injured in landmine explosions,<sup>545</sup> including in rural Afrin,<sup>546</sup> in the countryside of Souran city<sup>547</sup> (northern rural Aleppo),<sup>548</sup> and in the Manbij area.<sup>549</sup>

#### Displacement and return (e)

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023 there were 1 641 306 IDPs in Aleppo governorate. 550 As of February 2024, the same source indicated that some 850 000 IDPs were living in the rebel-controlled part of the governorate. 551 Data published by the Syrian NGO Assistance Coordination Unit (ACU) indicated that there were 1 255 234 IDPs in the governorate as of June 2024. 552 During the surge in hostilities in Idlib and western Aleppo in October 2023, some 120 000 individuals were displaced from these two areas within a two-week period. Around 12 000 remained displaced at the end of 2023, according to the UNCOI. 553 Around 11 500 of the IDP movements recorded in Aleppo over the last four months of 2023 occurred within the governorate, while 10 400 IDP movements occurred from Aleppo to other governorates.<sup>554</sup> No comparable data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

During the last four months of 2023, around 2 300 IDP return movements occurred within Aleppo governorate, while about 150 return movements occurred from Aleppo to other governorates. 555 No comparable data could be found on numbers of IDP return movements in 2024. Information on reasons for return could not be found within the time constraints of this report.



#### 2.3. Hama governorate

#### 2.3.1. General description of the governorate

Hama governorate is located in western-central Syria<sup>557</sup> and shares internal borders with Latakia and Tartous to the west, Idlib and Aleppo to the north, Raqqa to the northeast and Homs to the east, south and southeast.<sup>558</sup> The governorate comprises five administrative districts: Hama, Misyaf (Masyaf), Muhardah (Muhradah), Suqailabiyya (As-Suqaylabiyah), and Salamiyah (As-Salamiyeh).<sup>559</sup>

According to UNOCHA, the population of Hama governorate was estimated to be 1 522 898 as of July 2023, including 212 582 IDPs. <sup>560</sup> Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the

Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Hama governorate had 2 212 880 inhabitants.<sup>561</sup> Hama city's population was estimated by the CIA in 2023 at 996 000.<sup>562</sup>

#### 2.3.2. Conflict background and armed actors

For information on the governorate's conflict background, see section 2.3.2 of the <u>EUAA COI</u> Report Syria – Security situation (July 2021) and section 2.3.2 of the <u>EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (October 2023)</u>. During the reference period, almost all of the governorate's territory was under the control of the GoS, except for a strip of land on the governorate's northwesternmost edge bordering Idlib, which was controlled by anti-GoS armed groups. <sup>563</sup>

The Russian-backed<sup>564</sup> 25th Special Tasks Division (previously Tiger Forces)<sup>565</sup> maintained its presence in the governorate,<sup>566</sup> including in Hama's northwestern<sup>567</sup> and eastern countryside,<sup>568</sup> and have been involved in patrolling and securing the Khanasir-Ithriya axis against ISIL cells.<sup>569</sup> Hama city's Air Force Intelligence Directorate branch was headed by a former colonel of the 25th Special Tasks Division, appointed in May 2024.<sup>570</sup> National Defence Forces (NDF) militia were also present in eastern rural Hama.<sup>571</sup> Meanwhile, 2024 saw a relaxation of security measures, with increased reported efforts to remove non-essential checkpoints, including those previously linked to the Fourth Division.<sup>572</sup>

As of July 2024, there were 28 Iranian and 17 Russian military sites in the governorate, many of which were clustered around Hama city. Russian sites extended to areas north and northwest of the city towards the opposition-held areas bordering Idlib. Sites of Iranian/Iran-

backed forces were also found in southern and eastern Hama as well as in the governorate's west, <sup>573</sup> including at Masyaf, <sup>574</sup> where scientific research centres <sup>575</sup> and defence production facilities were located. <sup>576</sup> In early February 2024, it was noted that pro-Iranian militias had installed a system for suicide drones at Hama airport and started testing drones and training operators. <sup>577</sup> For further information regarding the presence of the SAA and affiliated armed groups and forces in the governorate, see section 2.3.2 of the EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (October 2023).

HTS was in control of parts of northern Hama<sup>578</sup> that bordered Idlib governorate,<sup>579</sup> with anti-GoS armed opposition factions controlling Ziyara sub-district of Suqailabiyya district<sup>580</sup>/ the northern parts of the Sahl Al-Ghab (Al-Ghab Plain).<sup>581</sup> Armed factions with reported activity in the governorate included Ansar Al-Tawhid,<sup>582</sup> Jaysh Al-Nasr,<sup>583</sup> and the Zaid bin Haritha brigade<sup>584</sup> (all three affiliated with the HTS-led Fateh al-Mubin operations room),<sup>585</sup> as well as Ansar Al-Islam (comprising 250 to 300 fighters across northwest Syria) and Khatiba Al-Tawhid wal-Jihad (KTJ), another group allied to HTS.<sup>586</sup>

ISIL remained active in Hama's desert areas.<sup>587</sup> Gregory Waters noted, at the beginning of April 2024, that the group appeared to have strengthened its network in the Badia desert since it resumed significant activity in January 2024. In March 2024, it expanded its area of

operations within eastern Hama, especially on the Hama side of the Bala'as mountains and Jubb Al-Jarah.<sup>588</sup>

# 2.3.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

Conflict between GoS forces and anti-GoS armed groups

Ground attacks by GoS forces in the northwest significantly escalated in October 2023,<sup>589</sup> with western Hama's Sahl Al-Ghab area among the areas witnessing a concentration of attacks<sup>590</sup> targeting civilian areas. The majority of these attacks were conducted using artillery and rocket launchers.<sup>591</sup> On 22 October 2023, GoS forces in the town of Jourien (western Hama) fired an artillery shell at the outskirts of Qarqour village (Ziyara sub-district), killing at least five children.<sup>592</sup> Meanwhile, Russian forces conducted aerial strikes<sup>593</sup> that repeatedly hit targets in the governorate during the reference period,<sup>594</sup> including HTS positions in the Hama countryside.<sup>595</sup>

While ground attacks by GoS forces significantly decreased across northwestern Syria after October 2023, they continued to strike areas of Sahl al-Ghab near the frontlines in the months following,<sup>596</sup> with a number of attacks on civilian areas in western Hama reported during the remainder of the reference period.<sup>597</sup>

According to Etana Syria, GoS attacks on opposition-held areas using machine-gun fire and missile and artillery strikes intensified in spring 2024. Over the first half of 2024, GoS and pro-Iranian militias increased their use of drones in northwestern Syria, striking civilian

areas<sup>600</sup> and HTS positions the Sahl al-Ghab area.<sup>601</sup> These drone attacks left several civilians wounded,<sup>602</sup> including along roads between Al-Zqoum and Al-Dqmaq and in the vicinity of Ziyara village,<sup>603</sup> as well as near Al-Hamidiya village<sup>604</sup> (all located in the Sahl Al-Ghab).<sup>605</sup>

Factions of the HTS-led<sup>606</sup> Fateh Al-Mubin operations room shelled pro-GoS sites in the governorate,<sup>607</sup> assassinated GoS soldiers<sup>608</sup> and, in April<sup>609</sup> and July 2024,<sup>610</sup> crossed frontlines and launched attacks on GoS forces stationed in the Sahel Al-Ghab area, killing and injuring several GoS troops.<sup>611</sup>

ISIL insurgency and attacks by unidentified actors

During the reference period, multiple attacks in eastern Hama were attributed to ISIL cells, notably in the Salamiyah countryside, including in the Ithriyah,<sup>612</sup> Tel Salamah<sup>613</sup> and Uqayribat areas<sup>614</sup> and in the vicinity of Duwaizan,<sup>615</sup> killing or wounding members of the SAA<sup>616</sup> (including

its 25th Special Tasks Division),<sup>617</sup> NDF militia,<sup>618</sup> Syrian Hezbollah,<sup>619</sup> and civilians.<sup>620</sup> A number of skirmishes were reported to have taken place between security forces and ISIL fighters.<sup>621</sup>

According to Gregory Waters, while the last four months of 2023 only saw six confirmed ISIL attacks in the governorate, <sup>622</sup> a total of 35 such attacks were recorded during the first six months of 2024, <sup>623</sup> with March accounting for more than one-third of these attacks (12 incidents). <sup>624</sup> On the other hand, Russian warplanes <sup>625</sup> and GoS ground forces <sup>626</sup> carried out raids against ISIL cells in the Hama desert.

Meanwhile, an IED attack of unidentified source killed the director of the Military Construction Institution in Hama city's al-Qosour neighbourhood in April 2024,<sup>627</sup> with sources including opposition websites suggesting that the incident may have been linked to internal conflicts within GoS structures.<sup>628</sup> Other attacks of unidentified origin led to the killing of an NDF member<sup>629</sup> and at least one sheep trader<sup>630</sup> in the Salamiyah area, while several civilian casualties were caused by other civilians opening fire on them.<sup>631</sup>

### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 500 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Hama governorate, of which 66 were coded as battles, 424 explosions/remote violence and 10 incidents of violence against civilians. <sup>632</sup> By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 564 security incidents (54 battles, 489 explosions/remote violence and 21 events coded violence against civilians) in Hama governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in the district of As-Suqaylabiyah. By comparison, very few incidents were recorded in the districts of Muhradah, Hama and Masyaf. According to ACLED data, GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were the main actor involved in around 65 % of all recorded security incidents (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') during the reference period, particularly in incidents coded as explosions/remote violence. Opposition armed groups (HTS and affiliated armed groups) were involved in around 20 % of all security incidents, particularly in incidents where GoS and affiliated armed groups were also an actor. Unidentified armed groups and ISIL were involved in around 11 % and 7 % of all security incidents, respectively.




Figure 7. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Hama governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.<sup>633</sup>

### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 23 civilian fatalities in Hama governorate.<sup>634</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded 30 civilian fatalities in Hama governorate.<sup>635</sup> In Hama governorate, SNHR documented 88 civilian fatalities in 2021,<sup>636</sup> 36 in 2022<sup>637</sup> and 77 in 2023.<sup>638</sup>

### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Attacks by GoS and allied forces resulted in the damage or destruction of at least one school (western rural Hama)<sup>639</sup> and civilian homes (northwestern Hama),<sup>640</sup> while artillery shells caused fire on agricultural crops.<sup>641</sup> Hama remains one of the governorates with the highest levels of unexploded ordnance contamination.<sup>642</sup> Multiple civilians were killed or injured by

remnants of war/landmines in eastern rural Hama,<sup>643</sup> including in the Salamiyah area<sup>644</sup> and in the northern<sup>645</sup> northeastern<sup>646</sup> and southern<sup>647</sup> rural parts of the governorate.

### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023, there were 212 582 IDPs in Hama governorate.<sup>648</sup> Between September and December 2023, UNOCHA recorded 194 IDP movements in the governorate. 128 of these IDP movements occurred from Hama to other governorates, while 66 IDP movements took place from other governorates into Hama.<sup>649</sup> No data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

Meanwhile, UNOCHA recorded around 83 IDP return movements between September and December 2023. 15 of these movements occurred within the governorate, while 53 occurred from other governorates into Hama and 15 occurred from Hama to other governorates.<sup>650</sup> The GoS has encouraged IDP returns from opposition-held areas to areas under GoS control in Hama. Many of those returning were 'motivated by the desire to return to their farmlands' and 'benefit from their produce', rather than staying in IDP camps, where conditions were harsh.<sup>651</sup> At the same time, GoS restrictions often prevented IDPs from returning to their areas of origin, while other IDPs feared arrest in reconquered or previously besieged areas, including Hama.<sup>652</sup>



# 2.4. Latakia governorate

# **2.4.1.** General description of the governorate

Latakia governorate is situated in northwestern Syria and shares borders with Türkiye to the north, Idlib governorate to the northeast, Hama governorate to the east and Tartous governorate to the south. In the west, Latakia governorate borders with the Mediterranean Sea. The governorate is divided into four administrative districts: Latakia (city), Al-Haffa, Al-Qardaha, and Jablah, which are further divided into altogether 22 sub-districts.

According to UNOCHA, the population of Latakia governorate was estimated to be 1 296 899 as of July 2023, including residents, returnees and IDPs. <sup>656</sup> Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Latakia governorate had 1 347 854 inhabitants. <sup>657</sup>

Most of Syria's Alawites live in the governorate's mountainous areas, but also in Latakia city, according to a report by USDOS published in June 2024. The weekly magazine The Week referred to Latakia governorate as one of the 'strongholds of Assad's own Alawi sect'.

# 2.4.2. Conflict background and armed actors

The Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) stated in a report of February 2024 that Latakia governorate is controlled by pro-government forces, except for some parts of eastern Latakia, which are under 'de-facto control and authority' of the so-called 'Syrian Salvation Government', the political wing of HTS. <sup>660</sup> In November 2023, NPA quoted a former opposition leader Muhammad Jamil as saying that while various 'key jihadist groups' had a strong presence in Idlib and surrounding areas like Latakia, they all were 'ultimately subject to the orders' of HTS. <sup>661</sup>

A January 2024 UN Security Council report indicated that the Eastern Turkistan Islamic Movement, also known under the name Turkistan Islamic Party (ETIM/TIP), aligned with and supported by HTS, was operating in Latakia. The same report stated that Ansar Al-Islam brigade of HTS, a group cooperating with Hurras Al-Din (HAD), and Khatiba Al-Tawhid wal-Jihad (KTJ), an ally of HTS, were among the most active groups in Latakia. 662

As of July 2024, several foreign forces had military positions in Latakia governorate, according to Jusoor for Studies: Iran (17 military positions), Türkiye (2 military positions) and Russia (15 military positions). 663 AFP noted that Russian forces were stationed in several GoS-controlled areas, including the Hmeimim airbase near Latakia city. 664 The Hmeimim airbase was

reportedly involved in assigning tasks to, planning operations for and supervising military units established and trained by Russia, such as the 25<sup>th</sup> Division, the 4<sup>th</sup> Corps and the 5<sup>th</sup> Corps.<sup>665</sup>

# 2.4.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

SOHR recorded shells and rockets fired by GoS forces in rural Latakia at the Al-Tuffahiyah frontline, the hills of Kabanah, Deir Al-Akrad and the Jabal Al-Turkman frontline in several reports between September 2023 and July 2024. 666 In October 2023, Syria Direct reported on daily bombardments of HTS-controlled parts in Latakia by GoS forces and Russian warplanes. The source noted that this increase in attacks followed an unclaimed drone attack on the Homs Military Academy on 5 October 2023, where at least 89 people were killed and 277 injured. The intensity of the bombardments - targeting, among others, schools and residential neighbourhoods - made October 2023 'the most violent month seen in the northwest in years', according to Etana Syria. 668

Strikes by Russian forces in coordination with the GoS against civilian and military targets were also recorded across Latakia in the first half of November 2023.<sup>669</sup> Strikes by GoS and Russian forces continued in January,<sup>670</sup> and in March 2024. GoS forces and Iranian-backed militias reportedly increased their use of suicide drones against sites in northern Latakia.<sup>671</sup> 'Regular barrages of machine-gun fire' as well as 'guided missiles and artillery strikes against opposition-held areas' in northern Latakia by GoS forces and allied militia reportedly continued in April<sup>672</sup> and May 2024.<sup>673</sup> SOHR similarly pointed to airstrikes by Russian forces targeting positions in the northern countryside of Latakia in May 2024.<sup>674</sup>

Attacks by HTS and allied groups on GoS forces continued throughout the reporting period: HTS forces killed at least 16 GoS forces in a raid on 1 September 2023, according to the International Crisis Group.<sup>675</sup> AP quoted other sources who put the number of soldiers killed in the same attack at 9 and 18, respectively.<sup>676</sup> Five GoS soldiers were killed in an attack by HTS

on 15 September 2023.<sup>677</sup> HTS reportedly also collaborated with ETIM/TIP in launching attacks on GoS forces in Latakia in October 2023.<sup>678</sup> Several sources mentioned an attack on GoS forces in Latakia province on 17 December 2023, including the International Crisis Group,<sup>679</sup> and the UNCOI.<sup>680</sup> SOHR – seemingly referring to the same event – reported that five GoS forces were killed in the context of an 'infiltration operation' by the Ansar Al-Islam brigade of HTS on the frontline of Tallat Shir Sahab in the Jabal Al-Akrad area in the northern Latakia countryside.<sup>681</sup> The same number of GoS forces was reportedly killed in another infiltration operation by the HTS-affiliated Othman Bin Affan brigade along the Al-Kabinah frontline in the northern countryside of Latakia in March 2024.<sup>682</sup> Etana Syria pointed to an increase in infiltration attempts by HTS and in raids by HTS and allied groups against GoS military points in northern Latakia in March 2024.<sup>683</sup> According to the Fateh Al-Mubin operations room quoted by Syria TV, they conducted 12 sniper attacks targeting GoS forces in Western Latakia governorate in April 2024.<sup>684</sup> Members of a Fateh Al-Mubin faction reportedly carried out an 'operation' on GoS-sites in the northern Latakia countryside in June 2024.<sup>685</sup>

### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 387 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Latakia governorate, of which 135 were coded as battles, 251 explosions/remote violence and 1 incidents of violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 277 security incidents (83 battles, 189 explosions/remote violence and 5 events coded violence against civilians) in Latakia governorate. During the reference period for this report, the highest number of security incidents were documented by ACLED in the districts of Al-Hafa and Latakia. By comparison, very few/no security incidents were recorded in the districts of Al-Qardaha and Jableh. According to ACLED, GoS and Russian forces (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') on the one hand and anti-GoS armed groups on the other hand were involved in the vast majority of all recorded security incidents during the reference period, particularly in incidents coded battles and explosions/remote violence.




Figure 8. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Latakia governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.<sup>687</sup>

### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented three civilian fatalities in Latakia governorate. 688 For the same period, UCDP recorded two civilian fatalities in Latakia

governorate.<sup>689</sup> In Latakia governorate, SNHR documented two civilian fatalities in 2021,<sup>690</sup> four civilian fatalities in 2022<sup>691</sup> and six in 2023.<sup>692</sup>

### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

As of September 2023, the Port of Latakia was 'inefficient' because of the ongoing conflict, according to Crisis24.<sup>693</sup> The port's operations reportedly decreased by 40 % and its exports by 60 %. The railroad linking Latakia to Aleppo had also been damaged.<sup>694</sup>

In November 2023, a man was reportedly killed by the explosion of a grenade he found in his olive grove in Daliyah village in southern Latakia governorate. The death was – despite allegations of suicide – reportedly recorded as 'unintentional mistake', according to NPA.<sup>695</sup> A man and his son were killed near Al-Kabbina in northern rural Latakia governorate when a shell from a previous bombardment, which the man reportedly tried to disarm, exploded.<sup>696</sup>

### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, there were 447 336 IDPs in Latakia governorate as of July 2023. Moreover, 1 437 persons returned to the governorate in 2023. <sup>697</sup> In October 2023, UNOCHA recorded 13 IDP movements from Latakia governorate. <sup>698</sup> In November 2023, UNOCHA recorded 11 IDP movements from and 20 IDP arrivals to the governorate. <sup>699</sup> One IDP arrival was recorded in December 2023. <sup>700</sup> No IDP movements were recorded in September 2023. <sup>701</sup> No data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

No further information on displacement and return could be found within the constraints of the research.

# 2.5. Tartous governorate

# 2.5.1. General description of the governorate

Tartous governorate shares borders with Latakia governorate to the north, the governorates of Hama and Homs to the east and with Lebanon to the south. To the west, Tartous governorate borders the Mediterranean Sea.<sup>703</sup> The governorate is divided into six

administrative districts, namely Banyas (Baniyas), Dreikish, Qadmous, Safita, Sheikh Badr and Tartous (city), which are further divided into 27 sub-districts.<sup>704</sup>

According to UNOCHA, the population of Tartous governorate was estimated at 939 889 as of July 2023, including residents, returnees and IDPs. Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Tartous governorate had 1220 252 inhabitants.

## 2.5.2. Conflict background and armed actors

Tartous governorate is under control of pro-government forces.<sup>707</sup> The Arab Center for Research & Policy Studies described Tartous governorate as a key Syrian government stronghold.<sup>708</sup>

As of mid-2024, two foreign forces had military positions in Tartous governorate, namely Iran with nine and Russia with two military positions.<sup>709</sup> Russia continued to operate a naval base at the port of Tartous,<sup>710</sup> which it reportedly had expanded since 2020.<sup>711</sup>

# 2.5.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

Israeli airstrikes reportedly targeted air defence units in Tartous governorate in mid-September 2023, killing two soldiers and injuring six.<sup>712</sup> According to SOHR, the strikes were targeting two warehouses near Al-Jamasah and Deir Hajar villages used by Hezbollah for storing arms, as well as a base of GoS air-defence forces in Kartu village.<sup>713</sup>

Since the beginning of 2024, SOHR recorded three attacks by Israeli forces in Tartous governorate.<sup>714</sup> In March 2024, Colonel Reza Zarei, a member of the IRGC, was killed in a suspected Israeli airstrike in the coastal city of Baniyas.<sup>715</sup> In May 2024, Baniyas city was hit

again by Israeli airstrikes,<sup>716</sup> reportedly targeting a residential building.<sup>717</sup> In July 2024, Israeli airstrikes targeted at least two buildings in Baniyas city, including one that reportedly belonged to an air defence battalion on Arab Al-Malik Beach in the Al-Qaloua area. According to SOHR, it was unclear whether the strikes targeted shipments of arms or Iran-affiliated militia members,<sup>718</sup> while NPA quoted reports by a Saudi TV channel claiming that the strike was targeting an air-defence system owned by Iranian-backed militia.<sup>719</sup>

### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 10 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Tartous governorate, of which one was coded as battles, five were coded as explosions/remote violence and four as incidents of violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 7 security incidents (1 battle, 3 explosions/remote violence and 3 events coded violence against civilians) in Tartous governorate. During the reference period for this report, unidentified armed groups were involved (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') in the incidents coded as violence against civilians, while Israeli forces were involved in the incidents coded as explosions/remote violence.<sup>720</sup>

### (c) Civilian fatalities

There were no civilian fatalities documented by SNHR in Tartous governorate between September 2023 and August 2024.<sup>721</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded one civilian fatality

in Tartous governorate.<sup>722</sup> SNHR did not document any civilian fatalities in Tartous governorate in 2021, 2022 or 2023.<sup>723</sup>

A suspected Israeli airstrike in May 2024 in Baniyas city reportedly killed one child and injured 10 civilians.<sup>724</sup>

### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

No information on explosive remnants of war in Tartous for the reporting period could be found.

Because of the population's general pro-government attitude, Tartous remained 'relatively untouched' by the conflict, according to Insecurity Insight.<sup>725</sup>

SOHR reported in July 2024 on the deteriorating security situation and 'proliferation' of weapons in Tartous governorate due to the lack of laws controlling the possession of arms by civilians.<sup>726</sup>

According to the UN Multi-Sectoral Needs Assessment of 2023, 9 % of shelters in Tartous governorate were damaged buildings (compared to 1 % the year before).<sup>727</sup>

### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA estimates, there were 171 149 IDPs and 998 returnees in Tartous governorate as of July 2023.<sup>728</sup>

In October 2023 UNOCHA recorded two IDP movements from Tartous governorate.<sup>729</sup> No IDP movements were recorded in September,<sup>730</sup> November<sup>731</sup> and December 2023.<sup>732</sup> No data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

According to UNOCHA data from February 2024, no IDP return movements were recorded in Tartous governorate in 2023.<sup>733</sup> No further information on displacement or returns could be found within the constraints of the research.



# 2.6. Homs governorate

# 2.6.1. General description of the governorate

Homs governorate is located in central Syria and has borders with Iraq to the east and Lebanon to the west. It has internal borders with Deir Ez-Zor, Raqqa, Hama, Tartous, and Rural Damascus governorates. <sup>735</sup> UNOCHA mentioned in a March 2024 report that Homs governorate comprises six administrative districts: Homs, Al Makhrim, Al-Qusayr, Ar-Rastan, Tadmor (Palmyra) and Tall Kalakh. <sup>736</sup> Homs was the largest governorate in Syria in terms of surface, and the third in terms of population, as of May 2014. The capital of the governorate is Homs city which is also the central city of Homs district. <sup>737</sup> According to UNOCHA, the population of Homs governorate was estimated at 1 500 351, including 290 269 IDPs, as of July 2023. <sup>738</sup> Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Homs governorate had 1 998 604 inhabitants. <sup>739</sup> For information on

the governorate's ethno-religious composition, see section 2.6.1 of the EUAA COI Report Syria - Security situation (July 2021).

### 2.6.2. Conflict background and armed actors

Different maps produced by various sources show that most of Homs governorate is under GoS control.<sup>740</sup> A map produced by the UN further shows some ISIL presence in the central and eastern parts of the governorate and a so-called US-declared 55-km deconfliction area<sup>741</sup> stretching between the southeast of the governorate and neighbouring Rural Damascus governorate around the village<sup>742</sup> of Al-Tanf,<sup>743</sup> where a military base is located.<sup>744</sup> US forces<sup>745</sup> and local US-supported forces, such as Free Syrian Army (FSA) forces, 746 formerly known as Mughawir al-Thawra<sup>747</sup> (MaT),<sup>748</sup> and remnants of the former local factions Martyr Ahmad al-Abdo Forces and Lions of the East Army, were reportedly located around the base. 749

According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Iran maintained 67 military sites in Homs governorate.<sup>750</sup> Sources reported a presence of the IRGC<sup>751</sup> and of Iranian-affiliated militia groups in Homs, such as the Quwwat al-Rida, 752 the Afghan Fatemiyoun Brigade (Liwaa Fatemiyoun), the Lebanese Hezbollah, Syrian militia forces trained by the Hezbollah, 753 the Iraqi Al-Nujaba movement and the Zainebiyoun Brigade. 754 In April 2024, the International Crisis Group reported that Iranian-affiliated forces are deployed 'in close proximity' to the Al-Tanf base and, like GoS-affiliated forces, had set up checkpoints in the area beyond the UScontrolled deconfliction zone.755 The SOHR in January 2024 reported that Iranian-affiliated militias and Lebanese Hezbollah forces were present 'in large spaces' of south-eastern rural Homs, where apart from a limited number of military checkpoints, GoS forces were not present. According to SOHR, Iranian-affiliated militias furthermore have been expanding in

2023 in broad areas throughout GoS-controlled areas in Tadmor (Palmyra) in eastern rural Homs. They have reportedly been positioned in areas east of the Tadmor fortress, previously dominated by GoS's intelligence branch, and in large parts of the Homs desert. In a July 2024 article, the non-governmental, non-profit Syrian media agency Damas Post reported with reference to a local source that Iranian 'hegemony' was particularly imposed on the areas of Al-Bayarat, Mahin and Hawarin in the eastern countryside of Homs. Furthermore, Damas Post assessed in its reporting that the city of Al-Sukhnah and large parts of the western surroundings of Palmyra city were fully controlled by Iran. Al-Sukhnah, which according to Damas Post is the main and largest stronghold of the Afghan Fatemiyoun Brigade, was held by Wagner forces up until September 2023, when these forces withdrew from Syria. The CTP and ISW noted in February 2024 that Iranian-affiliated militias are present at the Shayrat Air Base, which reportedly is the second largest Iranian air base in Homs governorate after the Tiyas T-4 Air Base. The T-4 Air Base, which lies between Tadmor and Al-Qaryatain, according to SOHR, was almost completely controlled by IRGC. SOHR further noted that GoS and Russian forces were also present at T-4.

SOHR noted in January 2024 that Al-Qusayr city was dominated by the Lebanese Hezbollah, who also dominated surrounding villages at the Syrian-Lebanese border strip. According to the report, the Hezbollah was trying to 'secure a popular base in these villages' by housing Shia families in the region and systematically displacing villagers. However, SOHR reported that as of June 2024, due to repeated Israeli attacks on Hezbollah positions in the region and heavy losses of members during attacks in 2024, the Hezbollah reportedly repositioned and removed 'any indications of its presence' in the areas close to the border to Lebanon, including in Al-Qusayr. According to SOHR, the Hezbollah maintained a military field in the Homs desert close to the village Marhatan, which lies about 40 kilometres from Palmyra city.

Sources reported a presence of GoS's Fourth Division<sup>765</sup> in Homs governorate in the reference period,<sup>766</sup> with concentration points in the eastern countryside of Homs.<sup>767</sup> In September 2023, it was reported that Fourth Division checkpoints were removed from western Homs countryside amid a series of removals of the division's checkpoints at roads connecting several Syrian governorates.<sup>768</sup> Reportedly, the numbers of checkpoints were reduced, while some were relocated towards border areas.<sup>769</sup> The GoS's 26<sup>th</sup> Division reportedly also had a presence in Homs governorate, near Al-Bayarat area.<sup>770</sup>

In October 2023, after a series of attacks, ISIL reportedly seized and temporarily held GoS positions south of Al-Sukhnah and the Wadi Doubayat gas field.<sup>771</sup> In early December 2023, GoS forces recaptured Wadi Doubayat, with ISIL cells quickly redeploying to the south and the west, according to research analyst Gregory Waters.<sup>772</sup> ISW and CTP, in October 2023, designated the Wadi Doubayat as one of the major ISIL support zones.<sup>773</sup>

According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Russia maintained four military sites in Homs governorate. <sup>774</sup> In a February 2024 report, ISW and CTP noted that Russian forces controlled the Tadmor Military Airport and were also present at the Shayrat Air Base. <sup>775</sup>

# 2.6.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

(a) Security trends during the reporting period

ISIL insurgency

Sources reported ISIL activity in Homs governorate in the reference period<sup>776</sup> in the Syrian desert, including in the desert of Al-Sukhnah.777 The attacks included ambushes, armed attacks and explosions in areas under control of GoS and GoS-affiliated forces,778 resulting in civilian casualties.<sup>779</sup> According to a July 2024 UN Security Council report, ISIL attacks in the governorate mostly aimed at GoS military positions around Al-Sukhnah and Palmyra. 780 After a series of attacks in central Homs governorate from early to mid-October 2023, ISIL seized and held a number of GoS positions south of Al-Sukhnah and the Wadi Doubayat gas field,<sup>781</sup> before they were recaptured by GoS forces in December 2023.<sup>782</sup> While ISIL operations in eastern Homs decreased the same month, the group's focus remained on Wadi Doubayat, as was the case in January 2024, when the group also expanded its activity south of Tadmor and Arak, eventually shifting its focus and concentrating on the Al-Sukhnah-Taybeh-Kawm axis up until May. ISIL's repositioning happened in the light of GoS operations in the area. 783 According to research analyst Gregory Waters, most of the ISIL attacks in June 2024 took place against the backdrop of GoS operations in eastern Homs governorate, which remained ISIL's hub of activity in the Badia desert. According to Waters, GoS forces seemed 'to have successfully established new defensive positions around several critical areas in Homs. particularly the Doubayat and Kawm axes', reducing ISIL activity along these lines as of June 2024.784 Russian airstrikes on ISIL targets in the Homs governorate desert were also reported throughout the reference period.<sup>785</sup> According to UNOCHA, 'insecurity emanating from ISIL's

unpredictability remained a threat for civilians' in Homs and several other governorates as of March 2024.

Infighting between pro-GoS armed groups, criminality, attacks by unidentified actors

Sources further reported several infightings among GoS-affiliated forces<sup>787</sup> and GoS forces in Homs governorate in the reference period.<sup>788</sup> An infighting between two GoS-affiliated groups in February 2024 in Al-Rastan in northern rural Homs reportedly resulted in two civilian casualties.<sup>789</sup>

Attacks by unidentified armed men or groups on GoS forces<sup>790</sup> or police officers<sup>791</sup> and on civilians, including shepherds, were also reported,<sup>792</sup> for example in Jub Al-Jarrah in eastern Homs countryside,<sup>793</sup> in the Wadi Ubeid area<sup>794</sup> and in southern Palmyra city.<sup>795</sup> Furthermore, recurring abductions were reported in the governorate.<sup>796</sup> Al-Araby Al-Jadeed in February 2024 reported recurring abductions in northern Homs countryside coupled with extortion by gangs. According to an interviewed journalist, the abductions happened in coordination with the military security.<sup>797</sup> In a June 2024 report, SOHR indicated that abductions in Homs and rural Homs governorate were operated by gangs affiliated with the Lebanese Hezbollah, such as the gangs Shujaa al-Ali, Jaafar Jaafar and Saleem Al-Najjar. An SOHR activist indicated that most abductions in northern and western Homs countryside were carried out by these gangs,

while the GoS did not take any measures to fight them.<sup>798</sup> SOHR further reported that the youth of Talbiseh city, north of Homs city, had self-organised to fight the abductions, for example by organising patrols to protect the Homs-Hama highway.<sup>799</sup> In April 2024, SOHR further reported that the deterioration of the security situation in Talbiseh city led to a fortification of the city by GoS forces.<sup>800</sup> In July 2024, Baladi News reported that a meeting was held in city of Talbiseh between representatives of the security forces and the city, during which the establishment of a settlement centre was announced, which reportedly led to demonstrations in the city.<sup>801</sup>

### Israeli airstrikes

Israeli airstrikes in Homs governorate were reported in the reference period, for example in February, 802 May 803 and June 2024, 804 including on Al-Qusayr, 805 the area around the town Al-Furqlus 806 and Homs city. 807 Attacks on 7th February 2024 reportedly struck the Shayrat air base and other Iranian-affiliated militia positions in Homs governorate 808 and resulted in civilian casualties, 809 which according to SNHR and UNCOI occurred in the Al-Hamra neighbourhood of Homs city. 810 The UNCOI in August 2024 noted that no party had claimed itself responsible for the attack and that the GoS had attributed it to Israel. 811

### Al-Tanf base

In light of rising tensions in the region due to the Israel-Gaza conflict, the Al-Tanf base in the US-controlled deconfliction zone was reportedly targeted by drones in the reference period.<sup>812</sup>

Between October 2023 and January 2024, SOHR had documented nine attacks on Al-Tanf carried out by Iranian-affiliated groups, mainly the Islamic Resistance in Iraq, 813 who were corroborated as perpetrators of attacks on Al-Tanf by other sources. 814 In September 2023, the GoS reportedly sent military reinforcements to the area 70 km northeast the Al-Tanf base. 815

### Attack on Homs military academy

On 5 October 2023, the military academy in Homs was reportedly attacked<sup>816</sup> by drones during a graduation event.<sup>817</sup> Reported civilian casualty numbers ranged between around 60<sup>818</sup> and 100 fatalities, including civilians, and 125<sup>819</sup> to 350 injured.<sup>820</sup> According to the International Crisis Group, the drones were suspected to have been operated by Hayat Tahrir Al-Sham (HTS), which 'may signal [a] new phase of HTS campaign' against the GoS.<sup>821</sup> The UNCOI reported in February 2024 that the GoS had attributed the attack to the Idlib-based Turkistan Liberation Party/Turkistan Islamic Party,<sup>822</sup> which is affiliated with HTS.<sup>823</sup> Similarly, the UN Security Council reported in January 2024 that several member states attributed the attack to 'HTS or its allied factions'.<sup>824</sup> However, as of March 2024, no opposition group had claimed responsibility for the attack according to a New Arab article.<sup>825</sup>

### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 372 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Homs governorate, of which 184 were coded as battles, 129 explosions/remote violence and 59 incidents of violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 221 security incidents (89 battles, 79 explosions/remote violence and 53 events coded violence against civilians) in Homs governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in the district of Tadmor. By comparison, very few incidents were recorded in the district of Tall Kalakh. According to ACLED, GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were involved in more than half of all security incidents recorded (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2'). ISIL was involved in almost half of all security incidents, particularly in incidents coded as battles. Unidentified armed groups participated in around 11 % of all recorded security incidents during the reference period; in more than half, civilians were also involved as an actor.




Figure 9. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Homs governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.

## (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 98 civilian fatalities in Homs governorate.<sup>827</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded 87 civilian fatalities in Homs

governorate.<sup>828</sup> The highest number of civilian fatalities was recorded in October 2023 (56 civilian deaths documented by SNHR<sup>829</sup> and UCDP, respectively).<sup>830</sup> In Homs governorate, SNHR documented 28 civilian fatalities in 2021,<sup>831</sup> 37 in 2022<sup>832</sup> and 121 in 2023.<sup>833</sup>

### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Within the time constraints of this report, no information on attacks on health facilities or civilian infrastructure and objects in Homs governorate in the reference period was found.

Homs remained one of the governorates with the highest levels of unexploded ordnance contamination.<sup>834</sup> During the reference period, several civilians, including children, were

reported to have been killed or injured in landmine detonations, 835 in eastern rural Homs, 836 in Al-Qusayr in western rural Homs, and in southern rural Homs.838

### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023 there were 290 269 IDPs in Homs governorate.<sup>839</sup> 18 of the 46 IDP movements recorded in the last four months of 2023 took place from Homs to other governorates, while 28 IDP arrivals to Homs from other governorates were recorded.<sup>840</sup> UNOCHA further noted that, between January and May 2024, 25 IDPs arrived at the Mahmoud Othman Shelter in Homs city from the Rukban IDP camp.<sup>841</sup> No further data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

During the last four months of 2023, around 905 IDP return movements occurred within Homs governorate, while about 27 return movements took place from other governorates into Homs. Report Information on reasons for return could not be found within the time constraints of this report.



# 2.7. Hasaka governorate

# 2.7.1. General description of the governorate

Hasaka Governorate (also known as Al-Hasakah, Al-Hasakeh) is situated in the northeast of Syria. It borders Raqqa governorate to the west and Deir Ez-Zor governorate to the southwest. The governorate also shares two international borders, with Türkiye to the north and with Iraq to the south.<sup>845</sup> Hasaka is divided into four districts: Hasaka, Qamishli, Ras Al Ain and Malikiya (Al-Malikeyyeh), which are further divided into 16 sub-districts.<sup>846</sup>

According to UNOCHA, the population of Hasaka governorate was estimated at 1 431 461 as of July 2023, including 1 078 796 residents and 342 701 IDPs. 847 Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Hasaka governorate had 1 922 561 inhabitants. 848

# 2.7.2. Conflict background and armed actors

As of October 2023, most of Hasaka governorate was controlled by the Kurdish-led SDF, a US-backed coalition of Kurdish, Syriac Christian and Arab Muslim armed groups, <sup>849</sup> and the de facto armed forces of DAANES, the Kurdish-led civil administrative body that had been established in north-eastern Syria in 2012. <sup>850</sup> In some areas of the governorate, however, including the cities of Hasaka and Qamishli, GoS forces were also present. A small strip of land (about 120km long and 32km deep<sup>851</sup>) along the border with Türkiye between Ras Al Ain in Hasaka governorate and Tal Abyad in Raqqa governorate (also referred to as Operation Peace Spring area<sup>852</sup>) was under the control of Turkish forces and Syrian allied groups. <sup>853</sup> These groups included Al-Jabha Al-Shamiya, the Sultan Murad Division, the Mutasim Division, Jaysh Al-Islam, and the Al-Hamza Division.

The GoS had 'a limited presence' in some parts of Hasaka city and Qamishli – so-called security squares or security enclaves – where they maintained some public offices, recruitment to the GoS forces and schools, according to a June 2024 report by the Danish Immigration Service (DIS) with reference to several sources, including DAANES representatives. Online news site The New Arab reported that GoS forces occupied an area in the Hasaka city centre known as 'security box'. Control over a kilometre-long street leading to the security square was reportedly split between the GoS and DAANES, with each entity controlling one side of the street.

According to a DAANES representative quoted by the DIS, the security square in Qamishli was somewhat smaller than the one in Hasaka and was surrounded by SDF checkpoints. Persons entering the area had to submit to identity checks by GoS forces at their own checkpoints.

do so.<sup>860</sup> Enabi Baladi, on the other hand, noted in an article of October 2023 that the security squares included several GoS security detachments, including one for criminal security.<sup>861</sup>

Researcher Ömer Özkizilcik from the Omran Center for Strategic Studies, which is a Türkiye-based research institution focused on Syrian affairs, noted that in Qamishli city, Kurds were predominantly living in the eastern and western parts of the city, while the city centre was shared between Kurds and Arabs, the latter mostly members of the Tayy tribe, a traditional ally of the ruling Baath Party, 862 and also supported by Iran. 663 GoS forces were present in the Tayy tribe neighbourhoods and at the city's airport. 664 Qamishli airport was also hosting a Russian army base, 865 which reportedly was also used by Iranian-backed militia. 866

According to Jusoor for Studies, there were 43 foreign military positions in Hasaka government as of mid-July 2024, including the US-led Global Coalition (17 positions), Russia (14 positions), Iran (8 positions) and Türkiye (4 positions), with the latter's positions all located in the Syrian-Turkish border region. Russia's military positions included Qamishli airport and a base east of Tal Tamr. US/Global Coalition positions included a military post near Hasaka city centre, bases at Tal Baydar, Shadadi, Malikiya, and the Kharab Al-Jir/Rmelan airbase. According to NPA, Iran's positions included military posts and training centres in the area between Zouri Roundabout (located at the entrance of Qamishli city.) and the villages of Hamo and Qusair (located in the southern countryside of Qamishli city.), as well as in Tartab, south of Qamishli. The same source reported that Hezbollah had established a recruitment office in the GoS-controlled part of Hasaka city in 2022.

ISIL continued to operate in the area south of Qamishli and launched several attacks in Hasaka governorate in 2023,<sup>875</sup> including attempts to free imprisoned group members.<sup>876</sup> ISIL reportedly also managed to increase its presence in several locations along the border to Iraq.<sup>877</sup>

# 2.7.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

Attacks by Turkish forces/Turkish-backed armed groups on SDF-controlled areas

Airstrikes and drone attacks by Turkish forces on SDF-controlled areas reportedly continued during the second half of 2023, targeting infrastructure and killing civilians. Referring to several incidents mentioned in its report of February 2024, UNCOI noted that they might constitute direct attacks on civilians, which might 'amount to war crimes'.<sup>878</sup> For more information on conflict-related infrastructure damage, see below, section 2.7.3(d).

Drone strikes and shelling by Turkish forces and the SNA against SDF targets – mostly in the region along the northern border – were recorded in September<sup>879</sup> and intensified in October 2023 following an attack on the Turkish Interior Ministry in Ankara.<sup>880</sup> Attacks were also recorded in November 2023.<sup>881</sup> In the second half of December and January, Turkish forces and the SNA continued their bombardment of SDF forces on a 'nearly daily basis', according to Etana Syria.<sup>882</sup> In May 2024, Turkish artillery attacks on several villages in the vicinity of Tal Tamr town in Hasaka countryside were recorded by the Omran Center for Strategic Studies,

as well as by NPA, and the Kurdish news agency ANHA. The area was reportedly also shelled in June  $^{884}$  and July 2024.  $^{885}$ 

### Operation Peace Spring Area

Mutual shelling along the frontlines between Turkish-backed forces and the SDF, especially around the Operation Peace Spring area, continued throughout the second half of 2023, 886 and in 2024.887 Persons entering the Peace Spring area with the aim of getting to Türkiye were arbitrarily detained by Turkish-backed factions, 888 or Turkish border guards (Gendarmerie), and in some cases also tortured and accused of collaborating with the SDF. 889

### Hasaka and Qamishli cities

An escalation in violence between the SDF and tribal groups in Deir Ez-Zor in August 2024 had repercussions in Hasaka governorate as well, with bans on access to the GoS-controlled parts of Hasaka and Qamishli cities. Access for water trucks was restricted, affecting at least 80 000 people. The supply of flour and other critical items was equally limited.

In January 2024, the SDF reported a missile attack by unidentified perpetrators on the Al-Sina prison in Hasaka city targeting the so-called 'Cubs of the Caliphate' section of the prison, <sup>892</sup> where children trained by ISIL fighters were being held. <sup>893</sup> An attempt by several detainees to escape following the attack reportedly failed. <sup>894</sup> According to NPA, about 3 500 ISIL detainees, and 700 minors were held in Al-Sina prison. Previously, DAANES officials had reportedly warned that an increase of attacks on the region by Turkish forces would create chaos in prisons holding ISIL members. <sup>895</sup>

SDF raids in Hasaka governorate were recorded throughout the first half of 2024, <sup>896</sup> including for the arrest of suspected ISIL members. <sup>897</sup> The SDF reported to have arrested 233 ISIL 'terrorists, suspects, and collaborators' in the first six months of 2024, including 85 in Al-Hol camp (see below) in January 2024. 40 ISIL members were arrested in the suburbs of Hasaka city in April 2024, <sup>898</sup> reportedly in the context of a counter-terrorism operation near Al-Sina prison. <sup>899</sup>

### ISIL Insurgency

According to a report by the UN Secretary-General of January 2024, ISIL – taking advantage of tensions between SDF and local tribes that emerged in August 2023 – managed to intensify recruitment and increase its presence of small mobile cells along the border to Iraq, including in Markadah in Hasaka governorate.<sup>900</sup> Throughout the first half of 2024, the group reportedly continued with 'hit-and-run-attacks' across the governorate.<sup>901</sup> ISIL attacks on SDF forces were recorded by Etana Syria and Kurdish media in September,<sup>902</sup> November<sup>903</sup> 2023, January<sup>904</sup> 2024, February<sup>905</sup> 2024, March<sup>906</sup> 2024, April<sup>907</sup> 2024, and June<sup>908</sup> 2024. The Omran Center for Strategic Studies recorded three attacks by ISIL in Hasaka governorate in January 2024.<sup>909</sup>

The security situation in Al-Hol camp remained 'volatile' and ISIL supporters inside the camp continued to instil fear in the residents, according to a February 2024 report by the UNCOI. The Combined Joint Task Force—Operation Inherent Resolve (CJTF-OIR), part of the US-led Global Coalition to Defeat ISIS, described the situation as 'a challenge for local security and humanitarian partners', and noted that security forces lacked the resources to reduce ISIL smuggling in and out of the camp, including the smuggling of children for being sent to training camps. Organisations operating in Al-Hol camp reportedly complained about being threatened and robbed by armed men, and 'IS ideology persists in the camp', targeting particularly younger residents.

The SDF conducted several raids in the AI-Hol Camp throughout the reporting period, conducting arrests of ISIL members, <sup>915</sup> but also of minors. <sup>916</sup> In September 2023, the SDF arrested several women and children involved in an ISIL-organised escape attempt. <sup>917</sup> A security campaign in January 2024 reportedly led to the suspension of almost all humanitarian activities, and in some parts of the camp to attacks on humanitarian teams, <sup>918</sup> who were perceived by the residents as linked to the security operation. <sup>919</sup> As of May 2024, these attacks reportedly continued. <sup>920</sup>

### Iranian-backed militia

Iranian-linked militias launched multiple attacks<sup>921</sup> on US positions in Syria, including in Hasaka governorate, in the period from October 2023 to February 2024. Most of these attacks were claimed by the group Islamic Resistance in Iraq (IRI), while two were claimed by Hezbollah Al-Nujaba and one attack was not claimed by a specific group.<sup>922</sup> Attacks on Global Coalition

bases within the period covered by this report were also recorded by other sources. <sup>923</sup> No civilian casualties were reported following these attacks.

### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 991 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Hasaka governorate, of which 176 were coded as battles, 527 explosions/remote violence and 288 incidents of violence against civilians. 924 By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 1 048 security incidents (150 battles, 637 explosions/remote violence and 261 events coded violence against civilians) in Hasaka governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in the districts of Hasaka and Ras Al Ain. By comparison, very few incidents were recorded in the district of Malikeyyeh. According to ACLED, Turkish forces and affiliated armed groups (SNA) were involved (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') in more than half of security incidents coded as explosions/remote violence and where SDF and affiliated armed groups were also an actor. SDF and affiliated armed groups were involved in the vast majority being coded violence against civilians. Unidentified armed groups and ISIL were involved in around 14 % and 6 % of all security incidents, respectively.

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


Figure 10. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Hasaka governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.

## (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 9 civilian fatalities in Hasaka governorate. <sup>925</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded 17 civilian fatalities in Hasaka

#### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Turkish and SNA forces attacked not only SDF positions, but also infrastructure, including power stations, <sup>930</sup> oil wells, <sup>931</sup> oil facilities, <sup>932</sup> and gas infrastructure. <sup>933</sup> The attacks reportedly caused electricity shortages (due to a lack of fuel for generators) in several locations, including in the cities of Amuda and Qamishli. <sup>934</sup> Turkish air strikes on oil infrastructure near Rmelan in January 2024 reportedly led to oil spills into local rivers, <sup>935</sup> thereby polluting the water and making it unusable for irrigating fields or feeding animals. <sup>936</sup> Attacks on power stations, interrupting the electricity supply to water power stations, led to water outages in the cities of Hasaka and Qamishli, <sup>937</sup> and in 'hundreds of villages' in the Gerki Lege and Malikiya. <sup>938</sup> As of May 2024, the governorate's main water station Alouk, which has been inoperative since October 2023, remained out of function. <sup>939</sup> Alouk is the main water source for more than 610 000 people living in Hasaka city and surroundings. <sup>940</sup>

Insecurity Insight mentioned three incidents involving the use of explosive weapons in Hasaka governorate in October 2023. The attacks, which were the first ones recorded by the source in Hasaka governorate in 2023, destroyed a Covid-19 hospital and a pharmacy in Qamishli district and killed a doctor in an unspecified location within the governorate.<sup>941</sup>

## (e) Displacement and return

As of July 2023, there were 342 701 IDPs living in Hasaka governorate. 76 176 IDPs were living in settlements or camps.<sup>944</sup>

UNOCHA recorded no IDP movements from nor arrivals to Hasaka governorate in the period September to December 2023.<sup>945</sup> No information regarding IDP movements from or arrivals to Hasaka governorate in 2024 could be found.

As of June 2024, there were 41 000 displaced persons living in Al-Hol camp, with 61 % of the residents being children. PAR pointed to about 2 000 IDPs living in 10 former school buildings and shelters in and around the city of Tal Tamr.

By the end of 2023, about 10 500 Syrian nationals - mostly children and women - are estimated to have been released from Al-Hol camp, according to the UNCOI. He in March 2019, Syrian nationals had constituted 43 % of then camp population of 73 041 persons.



## **2.8.1.** General description of the governorate

Raqqa (Ar-Raqqa) governorate is located in north-central Syria. The governorate borders Aleppo governorate to the west, Hasaka and Deir Ez-Zor governorates to the east, and Hama and Homs governorates to the south. It also shares an international border with Türkiye to the north. The governorate comprises three administrative districts: Raqqa, al Thawra (Ath-Thawrah) and Tall Abyad (Tell Abiad). The governorate's capital is Raqqa city.

According to UNOCHA, the population of Raqqa governorate was estimated to be 847 132 as of July 2023, including 152 955 IDPs. 955 Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the

During the reference period, the Kurdish-led<sup>957</sup> SDF, the GoS, and anti-GoS armed groups maintained their respective territories of control within the governorate.<sup>958</sup>

The SDF controlled approximately half of the governorate's territory, including Raqqa city. <sup>959</sup> SDF operations in Raqqa were supported by US-led Global Coalition to Defeat ISIL. <sup>960</sup> The SDF's Anti-Terror Units (YAT) carried out security operations against ISIL cells in cooperation with the coalition forces. <sup>961</sup>

The GoS controlled the governorate's southern portion. Horocover, along with Russian forces, GoS forces maintained presences along the frontline between the SDF-controlled territory and the Operation Peace Spring area. In March 2024, the GoS newly deployed several thousands of its troops across the Badia desert to curb ISIL attacks and deter the militants from attacking GoS forces. SAA units with a reported presence in the governorate included the 4th Division and the 17th and 25th Divisions. According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Russian forces operated eight military sites in the governorate, located in Ayn Issa and along the stretch of the river basin between the M4 motorway and Raqqa city. Further south, in the GoS-held part of the governorate, Iranian forces maintained 14 military sites, mostly located near the line of contact with the SDF-held territories.

Most of the northern section of the governorate was controlled by Turkish armed forces<sup>969</sup> and anti-GoS armed opposition groups<sup>970</sup> backed by Türkiye<sup>971</sup> as part of the so-called Operation Peace Spring area.<sup>972</sup> This approximately 120km long and 32km deep<sup>973</sup> Turkish zone of influence<sup>974</sup> was roughly delimited by Tall Abyad in the west and Ras al-Ayn (Hasaka) in the east, the Turkish border in the north and the M4 highway in the south.<sup>975</sup> The Turkish armed forces operated 10 military sites in the governorate, clustered around Ayn Issa and scattered inside the Operation Peace Spring area.<sup>976</sup> Meanwhile, Türkiye-affiliated armed groups under the umbrella of the SNA were exercising de facto control in this area,<sup>977</sup> including in the town of Tall Abyad.<sup>978</sup> SNA factions operating in the Operation Peace Spring area included the 20<sup>th</sup> Division, Faylaq Al-Majd, Ahrar Al-Sharqiya, and the Al-Hamza division.<sup>979</sup> The Türkiye-affiliated military police had sub-branches in the SNA-controlled cities and operated prisons and detention facilities, including in Tall Abyad.<sup>980</sup>

ISIL cells were present in pockets in southern Raqqa. 981 The group operated fake checkpoints it used to extort money from traders and shepherds in the Mansoura 982 and Resafa areas. 983 They also attacked GoS forces stationed around Resafa. 984 From January to April 2024, the group was temporarily in control of Zamleh Sharqi hamlet it had captured from the GoS and their tribal allies. 985

## 2.8.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

## (a) Security trends during the reporting period

Turkish forces/Turkish-backed armed groups on SDF-controlled areas

During the reference period, Turkish forces and the SNA continued to conduct drone and artillery strikes targeting SDF sites in the governorate, with an escalation in Turkish attacks on northern Raqqa seen between early October 2023 and mid-January 2024. Shelling by Turkish forces on villages near Tall Abyad caused several civilian casualties. Meanwhile, there were cases of deaths and injuries caused by SDF patrols opening fire on civilians, including in Raqqa city.

ISIL insurgency and attacks by unidentified actors

Raqqa governorate remained a core area of ISIL's regular operations. <sup>991</sup> The reference period saw multiple attacks in southern Raqqa that were attributed to ISIL cells, including attacks against GoS forces in the Bir Rahum, <sup>992</sup> Tabqa <sup>993</sup> and Zamleh areas <sup>994</sup> and particularly in the Resafa area, <sup>995</sup> as well as attacks targeting NDF militia. <sup>996</sup> Moreover, ISIL regularly carried out

assassinations of SDF members<sup>997</sup> and targeted a number of civilians, including shepherds<sup>998</sup> and truffle hunters.<sup>999</sup> As ISIL intensified its operations across central, eastern and northeastern Syria in January 2024,<sup>1000</sup> it launched a series of attacks on two main roads running south and west of Resafa in February 2024.<sup>1001</sup> According to Gregory Waters, while the last four months of 2023 only witnessed 11 confirmed ISIL attacks in the governorate,<sup>1002</sup> a total of 44 such attacks were recorded during the first six months of 2024,<sup>1003</sup> with peaks registered in March (14 incidents) and April (12 incidents).<sup>1004</sup> Since May 2024, when the number of attacks dropped down to four incidents,<sup>1005</sup> ISIL sustained 'a low-level but robust insurgency focused in the desert between Resafa and Jabal Bishri'.<sup>1006</sup>

After suffering losses in ISIL attacks on its troops, the GoS in June 2024 launched large-scale campaigns against ISIL in the Al-Tiani and Al-Tibni desert areas of Raqqa and Deir Ez-Zor in June 2024. Russian forces resumed their aerial campaign against ISIL in the Raqqa part of the Badia desert in late 2023, Carrying out multiple strikes against ISIL targets in western and southern Raqqa. However, Etana Syria noted that this campaign had limited

effect in terms of curbing ISIL activity.<sup>1012</sup> Meanwhile, SDF troops conducted several operations against ISIL cells in their areas of control that led to arrests<sup>1013</sup> and killings<sup>1014</sup> of ISIL members.

There were several instances of unidentified attackers killing civilians,<sup>1015</sup> including workers in the GoS-controlled eastern Badia desert area<sup>1016</sup> and civilian security guards in SDF-controlled areas in the western and northwestern Raqqa countryside.<sup>1017</sup> In March 2024, the GoS-controlled eastern Raqqa countryside witnessed an explosive device of unidentified origin killing 12 civilians who were travelling to harvest desert truffles<sup>1018</sup> (some media suggested that the attack may have been carried out by ISIL)<sup>1019</sup> and two other truffle hunters being found dead with gunshot wounds after having gone missing.<sup>1020</sup> Moreover, there were cases of killings occurring during armed disputes between tribal groups.<sup>1021</sup>

## (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 640 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Raqqa governorate, of which 145 were coded as battles, 360 explosions/remote violence and 135 incidents of violence against civilians. <sup>1022</sup> By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 707 security incidents (124 battles, 414 explosions/remote violence and 169 events coded violence against civilians) in Raqqa governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in the district of Tall Abyad. According to ACLED, SDF and affiliated armed groups were involved in around 36 % of all security incidents (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2'), the majority being coded as violence against civilians and explosions/remote violence. Turkish forces and affiliated armed groups (SNA) were involved in in the majority of incidents coded as explosions/remote violence and where SDF and affiliated

armed groups were also an actor. ISIL was involved in around 20 % of all security incidents, while GoS and affiliated armed groups and unidentified armed groups were each involved in around 20 % and 16 % of all security incidents, respectively.




Figure 11. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Raqqa governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.

#### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 67 civilian fatalities in Raqqa governorate. For the same period, UCDP recorded 64 civilian fatalities in Raqqa governorate. The highest number of civilian fatalities was recorded in March 2024 (32)

civilian deaths documented by SNHR $^{1025}$  and 26 by UCDP) $^{1026}$  most of them killed in an explosion of a landmine. In Raqqa governorate, SNHR documented 84 civilian fatalities in 2021, $^{1027}$  27 in 2022 $^{1028}$  and 17 in 2023. $^{1029}$ 

## (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Raqqa remained one of the governorates with the highest levels of unexploded ordnance contamination. Turkish bombardments in northern Raqqa resulted in a degradation of civilian infrastructure. Explosions of landmines resulted in multiple civilians being killed or injured, including in western and northern rural Raqqa and in the governorate's east, where several civilians were struck while harvesting desert truffles.

#### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023 there were 152 955 IDPs in Raqqa governorate. <sup>1035</sup> Between September and December 2023, UNOCHA recorded 7 IDP movements, all of them occurring from other governorates into Raqqa. <sup>1036</sup> No data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

Meanwhile, UNOCHA recorded 42 IDP return movements between September and December 2023, all of them occurring from Raqqa to other governorates.<sup>1037</sup>



# 2.9. Deir Ez-Zor governorate

## 2.9.1. General description of the governorate

Deir Ez-Zor governorate is located in eastern Syria. It shares internal borders with the governorates of Homs to the southwest, Raqqa to the northwest and Hasaka to the north as well as an international border with Iraq to the east. The Euphrates River divides the governorate into a western part (Al-Shamiya) and an eastern part (Al-Jazeera).

Administratively, Deir Ez-Zor comprises three districts: Deir Ez-Zor, Al-Mayadin, and Al-Bukamal (Abu Kamal).<sup>1041</sup> The governorate's capital is Deir Ez-Zor city.<sup>1042</sup>

According to UNOCHA's Humanitarian Needs Overview published in March 2024, the population of Deir Ez-Zor governorate was estimated to be 1 200 181 as of July 2023, including 166 041 IDPs. 1043 Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Deir Ez-Zor governorate had 1 305 538 inhabitants. 1044

## 2.9.2. Conflict background and armed actors

Deir Ez-Zor governorate is roughly divided into a western part controlled by the GoS and an eastern part held by Kurdish forces (SDF) supported by the Global Coalition to Defeat ISIL, <sup>1045</sup> with the Euphrates River delimiting the two zones. <sup>1046</sup> These separate areas of control have been described as zones of Iranian <sup>1047</sup> and US influence, respectively. Amid escalating US-Iranian tensions across the region, the banks of the Euphrates River became the scene of armed confrontations between GoS-/Iran-supported tribal fighters and the SDF, making this area distinct from other regions of the country like Hasaka and parts of Aleppo where SDF and GoS forces shared military points along frontlines and GoS forces maintained presences deep inside SDF-controlled territory. <sup>1048</sup> For more information on the governorate's conflict background, see section 2.9.2 of the EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (July 2021).

During the reference period, the GoS remained in control of the governorate's areas west of the Euphrates River,<sup>1049</sup> which included the cities of Deir Ez-Zor, Al-Mayadin and Al-Bukamal.<sup>1050</sup> It also controlled a small narrow strip of territory on the eastern Euphrates bank stretching south from the riverside opposite Deir Ez-Zor city towards the Euphrates/Khabour

confluence. $^{1051}$  GoS military units with a reported presence included the Russian-backed  $5^{th}$  Corps and the  $4^{th}$  Division of the SAA. $^{1052}$ 

The GoS exercised its control alongside Iran-backed militias, 1053 who maintained sites in the cities of Deir Ez-Zor (including near the Euphrates University and in the central Villas neighbourhood)<sup>1054</sup> and Mayadin and in Bukamal city and its environs.<sup>1055</sup> According to Jusoor for Studies, Iran operated a total of 77 military sites in the governorate. 1056 Iranian IRGC forces were positioned west of the Euphrates<sup>1057</sup> while an Iranian presence was also seen in seven villages on the eastern riverside that have been under the control of the GoS and Iran-backed militias since 2017.<sup>1058</sup> Al-Bukamal city, which hosted the Iran-backed 17th Division<sup>1059</sup> and Regiment 47,<sup>1060</sup> was considered a stronghold of pro-Iranian militias due to its close distance to the Syrian-Iragi border and its control over the Al-Qaim crossing, a corridor used by Iran to access Lebanon through Iraq and Syria. 1061 Other pro-Iranian militias in the governorate included the Afghan Fatemiyoun Brigade, whose fighters in the town of Al-Sabikhan received military reinforcements in February 2024, 1062 and Lebanese Hezbollah, 1063 whose presence was similarly reinforced to fight against the SDF.<sup>1064</sup> In the context of attacks by US forces, both Al-Sabikhan and Al-Bukamal saw extensive mobilization of pro-Iranian militias in February 2024, with commanders moved from Al-Bukamal to Deir Ez-Zor city and other members from positions near Syria-Iraq to Palmyra city<sup>1065</sup> in Homs governorate.<sup>1066</sup> Moreover, locations of the militias' weapons and ammunitions depots in Al-Mayadin and Al-Bukamal were shifted. 1067

Moreover, there were several anti-SDF tribal militias in the governorate, including the Akeidat Lions battalion<sup>1068</sup> and the newly-created Arab Tribal and Clan Forces (ATCF).<sup>1069</sup> According to the joint task force of the US-led global coalition, in late 2023, tribal militias emerged as a 'full-fledged resistance movement' supported by the GoS and Iran whose fighters resupplied and

rearmed on the western Euphrates bank to launch attacks in SDF-held villages on the eastern bank. 1070

Meanwhile, the SDF controlled most of the eastern Euphrates bank, <sup>1071</sup> while forces of the US-led Global Coalition to Defeat ISIL maintained nine military sites in the governorate, <sup>1072</sup> located on the eastern Euphrates bank. <sup>1073</sup> Although the SDF briefly lost the southern areas of its territory in Deir Ez-Zor<sup>1074</sup> following armed anti-SDF uprisings in late August and early September 2023, <sup>1075</sup> it soon regained its lost territory. <sup>1076</sup> About a year later, in August 2024, a wide-scale attack by tribal forces on SDF sites in several towns and villages in eastern rural Deir Ez-Zor<sup>1077</sup> again forced the SDF to temporarily withdraw from these positions before thwarting the attack. <sup>1078</sup> At the same time, the reference period saw the SDF stepping up raids to recruit young men into their ranks<sup>1079</sup> and, following the August 2024 tribal attacks, reinforcing its presence in eastern rural Deir Ez-Zor by bringing in troops from areas it controlled in northern Deir Ez-Zor and Hasaka. <sup>1080</sup>

ISIL remained active in the desert areas of Deir Ez-Zor,<sup>1081</sup> with the Jabal Bishri area likely serving as a core operations base for its cells across western Deir Ez-Zor, according to Gregory Waters.<sup>1082</sup> It has expanded the presence of mobile cells along the Syrian-Iraqi borders, including in Al-Mayadin. According to the UN, the group had 500 to 600 fighters across the central desert (Badia) in an area linking the governorates of Deir Ez-Zor, Homs and Sweida.<sup>1083</sup>

## 2.9.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

## (a) Security trends during the reporting period

Conflict between SDF and local tribal forces

Amid rising tensions between the YPG, the SDF's main component, and the Deir Ez-Zor Military Council<sup>1084</sup> predominantly composed of local Arab tribes, <sup>1085</sup> Ahmed Al-Khabil (Abu Khawla), emir of the Bakir tribe and commander of the Deir Ez-Zor Military Council, <sup>1086</sup> was arrested by the SDF in late August 2023 on suspicion of plotting to drive the SDF out of Deir Ez-Zor with GoS and Iranian support. His arrest triggered an armed uprising by his clansmen. <sup>1087</sup> Reports of indiscriminate SDF attacks and increasing civilian casualties, notably in Izbeh and Daman towns, soon triggered a more wide-scale mobilization of tribal fighters. <sup>1088</sup> On 31 August 2023, local Akeidat tribal head Sheikh Ibrahim Hifl joined the uprising, leading the militant group 'Arab Tribal Forces' with his revolt centering in the town of Dhiban. <sup>1089</sup> The Baqqara and Uqaydat tribes initially made considerable territorial gains, taking control of Deir Ez-Zor's southern areas before they were reconquered in an SDF offensive and the Arab tribes forces surrendered. <sup>1090</sup> Altogether, this wave of 'multifaceted clashes' lasted from 27 August until 6 September, causing 91 deaths, according to journalist Wladimir van Wilgenburg. <sup>1091</sup> Some further civilian casualties were reported as the SDF continued to shell and raid villages in September and October. <sup>1092</sup>

Late September 2023 saw renewed escalation of the conflict as tribal forces launched a series of lethal attacks against the SDF,<sup>1093</sup> followed by sporadic fighting in the next months.<sup>1094</sup> GoS forces and Iran-backed factions provided fire cover for the cross-river attacks carried out by fighters allegedly linked to Ibrahim Hifl.<sup>1095</sup> These attacks again resulted in several civilian casualties,<sup>1096</sup> with the UNCOI reporting that as of the end of 2023, the conflict had thus far caused at least 96 deaths.<sup>1097</sup> The conflict significantly lost momentum by December 2023<sup>1098</sup> but continued at reduced intensity, with sporadic fighting and security raids by SDF reported

in eastern Deir Ez-Zor during the first half of 2024,<sup>1099</sup> including in February.<sup>1100</sup> Against this backdrop, several civilians were killed or injured in encounters with the SDF and Asayish fighters.<sup>1101</sup>

In early August 2024, armed tribal forces launched another wide-scale attack on SDF sites in the towns and villages of Dhiban, Abu Hamam, Al-Khushkieh, Shuaitat, and Granij and other military positions in eastern rural Deir Ez-Zor,<sup>1102</sup> forcing SDF troops to withdraw temporarily.<sup>1103</sup> In this new flare-up of hostilities, dozens of deaths and injuries were reported<sup>1104</sup> on both banks of the Euphrates River<sup>1105</sup> as the SDF fought to repel the attacks<sup>1106</sup> and GoS forces shelled villages.<sup>1107</sup> Mutual exchanges of artillery fire resulted in the displacement of villagers on both sides of the Euphrates River.<sup>1108</sup>

#### Conflict between Iranian-backed militias and US-led Coalition forces

Following the beginning of Israel's war with Hamas in October 2024, rural Deir Ez-Zor became one of several areas of Syria witnessing a concentration of attacks by Iran-backed militias targeting positions of the US-led global coalition. Iran-backed militias, including groups operating on Iraqi territory, in late 2023 conducted multiple attacks on bases used by members of the US-led Global Coalition to Defeat ISIL, targeting them with missiles Iran-backed militia suicide drones, with several attacks targeting the Conoco and Al-Omar fields. Iran-backed to these attacks, the global coalition in early 2024 carried out waves of retaliatory airstrikes targeting militia sites in and around Al-Bukamal, Iran-backed militia groups and Hezbollah command centres in Deir Ez-Zor city, Iran-backed militia groups in Al-Mayadin, Al-Bukamal and Deir Ez-Zor city, including positions in Deir Ez-Zor's central Villas

neighbourhood,<sup>1117</sup> killing several Syrian members of pro-Iranian militias.<sup>1118</sup> Unidentified drones also attacked vehicles linked to Iran-backed militias, causing deaths among combatants.<sup>1119</sup>

## ISIL insurgency

Deir Ez-Zor governorate remained a core area of ISIL's regular operations<sup>1120</sup> and the group intensified its activities in January 2024.<sup>1121</sup> The reference period saw multiple attacks attributed to ISIL cells in the governorate, including in the Shoula,<sup>1122</sup> Tabni<sup>1123</sup> and Masrib areas<sup>1124</sup> as well as around Al-Mayadin.<sup>1125</sup> The group regularly attacked members of GoS forces<sup>1126</sup> (including at sites located near oil fields),<sup>1127</sup> the NDF militia members<sup>1128</sup> and the SDF.<sup>1129</sup> It also targeted local shepherds, leaving several of them dead or injured.<sup>1130</sup> Moreover, landmines planted by ISIL or other militia groups caused deaths among individuals hunting for truffles in the western Deir Ez-Zor desert.<sup>1131</sup> According to Gregory Waters, while the last four months of 2023 witnessed only 18 confirmed ISIL attacks in the governorate,<sup>1132</sup> a total of 53 such attacks were recorded during the first six months of 2024,<sup>1133</sup> with peaks registered in March (17 incidents) and April (13 incidents).<sup>1134</sup>

Russian forces resumed their aerial campaign against ISIL in the Badia desert in late 2023, 1135 carrying out multiple strikes against ISIL targets 1136 in western Deir Ez-Zor. However, Etana Syria noted that these airstrikes had limited effect in terms of curbing ISIL activity. 1137 Meanwhile, several security operations against suspected ISIL members were conducted by the SDF in northern 1138 and eastern Deir Ez-Zor 1139 and by GoS forces in the Deir Ez-Zor desert. 1140

Infighting between pro-GoS forces

Since September 2023, there have been recurring instances of mutual shelling between GoS forces and allied groups (NDF and Arab tribal militias) and pro-Iranian militias on the western Euphrates bank on the one hand, and the SDF on the eastern bank on the other.<sup>1141</sup>

## (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 2 140 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Deir Ez-Zor governorate, of which 1126 were coded as battles, 584 explosions/remote violence and 430 incidents of violence against civilians. 1142 By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 1 203 security incidents (694 battles, 247 explosions/remote violence and 262 events coded violence against civilians) in Deir Ez-Zor governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in the district of Deir Ez Zor. According to ACLED, SDF and affiliated armed groups were involved in more than half of all security incidents, mostly in incidents coded as battles and violence against civilians. ISIL was involved in around 20 % of all security incidents, the vast majority being coded as battles and violence against civilians. Tribal militias/actors were involved in around 20 % of all security incidents, mainly in incidents coded as battles. GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were involved (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') in around 15 % of all security incidents. Unidentified armed groups were involved in around 11 % of all security incidents, mostly in incidents coded as explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians.




Figure 12. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Deir Ez-Zor governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.

## (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 173 civilian fatalities in Deir Ez-Zor governorate.<sup>1143</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded 90 civilian fatalities in Deir Ez-Zor

governorate.  $^{1144}$  In Deir Ez-Zor governorate, SNHR documented 197 civilian fatalities in 2021,  $^{1145}$  125 in 2022 $^{1146}$  and 203 in 2023.  $^{1147}$ 

## (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Deir Ez-Zor remained one of the governorates with the highest levels of unexploded ordnance contamination.<sup>1148</sup> During the reference period, several civilians were killed or injured in explosions of landmines, including in the governorate's north<sup>1149</sup> and east.<sup>1150</sup> During the escalation of hostilities between the SDF and GoS forces/Arab tribes in August 2024, critical infrastructure was targeted on both banks of the Euphrates River,<sup>1151</sup> including nine health facilities, two schools and two water treatment plants.<sup>1152</sup>

## (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023 there were 166 041 IDPs in Deir Ez-Zor governorate. As the UNCOI indicated, fighting between local tribes and the SDF resulted in 6 500 families being displaced to GoS-controlled areas over the second half of 2023. Meanwhile, UNOCHA recorded around 20 800 IDP movements between September and December 2023, all of them occurring in the month of September and taking place within Deir Ez-Zor governorate itself. Further displacement of civilians occurred in the SDF-controlled town of Dhiban and the GoS-controlled village of Tayba in August 2024 as a result of mutual shelling between GoS forces and the SDF. According to the UN, these clashes resulted in the displacement of an estimated 3 500 families between 6 and 28 August 2024. No further data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.



Meanwhile, UNOCHA recorded 1882 IDP return movements between September and December 2023. The overwhelming majority of these (1816) occurred within the governorate, while 54 movements occurred from other governorates into Deir Ez-Zor and 12 occurred from Deir Ez-Zor to other governorates. Information on reasons for return could not be found within the time constraints of this report.

## 2.10. Damascus governorate

## 2.10.1. General description of the governorate

Damascus governorate, which includes Syria's capital, is located in the south-western part of the country and is completely surrounded by Rural Damascus (Rif Damashq) governorate. 1160

The governorate is divided into two districts: Damascus city and Yarmouk. Damascus city itself comprises 15 sub-district-level areas: Midan, Dummar, Al-Qadam, Burza, Ash Shaghour, Rukn Eddine, Mezzeh (Mazzeh), Salhiyeh, Qaboun, Saroujah, Kafar Soussa (Kafr Sousa), Muhajerin, Al-Qanawat, Jowbar (Jobar), which is partly administered by Rural Damascus governorate, and Old Damascus. 1163

According to UNOCHA, the population of Damascus governorate was estimated to be 1 812 911 as of July 2023, including 589 880 IDPs. 1164 Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Damascus governorate had 2 168 118 inhabitants. 1165 Damascus city's population was estimated by the CIA at 2 585 000 as of 2023. 1166

## 2.10.2. Conflict background and armed actors

For information on Damascus governorate's conflict background, see the respective sections 2.10.2 of the EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (July 2021), the EUAA COI Report Syria – Security situation (September 2022), and the EUAA COI Report: Syria – Security situation (October 2023). Sources concurred that Damascus governorate remained under the control of the GoS and affiliated groups during the reference period. According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Iranian forces maintained seven military sites in Damascus city, while Russian forces had two military sites.

The district of Kafr Sousa, located in central Damascus<sup>1169</sup> adjacent to the districts of Mezzeh, Midan, Al-Qanawat, and Al-Qadam,<sup>1170</sup> comprised a security square<sup>1171</sup> and was subject to tight surveillance.<sup>1172</sup> It was home to GoS military and security headquarters<sup>1173</sup> and was marked by a

convergence of branches<sup>1174</sup> of GoS intelligence, including Branch 215 and Branch 227<sup>1175</sup> of the Military Intelligence Directorate,<sup>1176</sup> also known as Military Security.<sup>1177</sup> Kafr Sousa also hosted Iranian security headquarters and a key Iranian 'cultural centre'<sup>1178</sup> and individual residential buildings were frequented by IRGC members and Iran-backed groups.<sup>1179</sup> Military checkpoints and security detachments were also deployed around the building of the Syrian National Security Administration in the Rawda area, which formed a security square of its own.<sup>1180</sup>

Western Damascus's Mezzeh district,<sup>1181</sup> home to the Iranian embassy and consulate,<sup>1182</sup> was another an area subjected to tight security controls.<sup>1183</sup> At least one residential building was reportedly being used by the IRGC or Iran-backed groups during the reference period.<sup>1184</sup> Damascus governorate also witnessed a presence of the SAA's Fourth Division,<sup>1185</sup> including around the Al-Hajar Al-Aswad area, where pro-GoS militias and paramilitary forces were also operating.<sup>1186</sup> The Military Intelligence Directorate and the NDF militia forces exercised de facto control in the southern Al-Tadamun neighbourhood.<sup>1187</sup>

## 2.10.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

## (a) Security trends during the reporting period

After the 7 October 2023 attack in Israel and the ensuing intensification of the Gaza conflict, Israeli attacks on targets in Syria increased, with aerial strikes reported in Damascus city, 1889

Damascus International Airport<sup>1190</sup> (causing at least two civilian deaths)<sup>1191</sup> and on air defence systems at Mezzeh military airport. 1192 While the overall frequency of Israeli strikes in Syria decreased by January 2024, attacks by Israeli forces in response to attacks by Iran-backed militia increasingly focused on targets in Damascus city and southern Rural Damascus. 1193 In these two governorates, SOHR documented 30 Israeli attacks in 2023<sup>1194</sup> and 23 Israeli attacks between January and late August 2024. 1195

In 2024, Israeli missile attacks destroyed a residential building that reportedly housed a IRGC intelligence unit in Mezzeh district in January, 1196 killing at least five IRGC members. 1197 In a further escalation, 1198 an attack destroyed a building in the same district in early April 2024 1199 that allegedly housed the Iranian consulate, reportedly killing over a dozen people. 1200 According to Iranian state media, seven IRGC members and six Syrians were killed in the April attack, 1201 including senior Quds force commander Brigadier General Mohammad Reza Zahedi and his deputy General Mohammad Hadi Haj Rahimi. 1202 The attack allegedly targeted a secret meeting held between Iranian intelligence representatives and Palestinian militants over the war in Gaza. Accounts as to the function of the targeted building differed, with Iran claiming that it belonged to its diplomatic mission in Syria, while Israel's military declared that it was being used by the IRGC as 'a military building of Quds Forces disguised as a civilian building'.1203

In Kafr Sousa district, Israeli aerial strikes hit residential buildings in February 2024, killing at least two individuals<sup>1204</sup> (including at least one civilian), <sup>1205</sup> and again in July 2024. <sup>1206</sup> In May

2024, Israeli forces targeted a military position in the vicinity of Mezzeh military airport, injuring several soldiers. 1207

Apart from Israeli attacks, there were several explosions in Damascus city that were possibly perpetrated by individuals within the GoS forces. An explosion in the central Shaalan neighbourhood in April 2024 resulted in the death of an individual holding the explosive device. An unclaimed IED explosion in Mezzeh district the same month hit a car parked in an area frequented by GoS security and military personnel and pro-Iranian figures, with no reports of casualties. A similar attack in the same district caused the death of one person in May 2024.

## (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 28 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Damascus governorate, of which 10 were coded as battles, 10 as explosions/remote violence and 8 as incidents of violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 38 security incidents (13 battles, 8 explosions/remote violence and 17 events coded violence against civilians) in Damascus governorate. During the reference period for this report, GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were involved in 69 % of all security incidents (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2'). Unidentified armed groups and Israeli forces were involved in most incidents coded as battles an explosions/remote violence. GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were involved in the majority of incidents coded violence against civilians.

#### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented eight civilian fatalities in Damascus governorate. <sup>1211</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded four civilian fatalities in

Damascus governorate. $^{1212}$  SNHR documented one civilian fatality in 2021, $^{1213}$  three in 2022 $^{1214}$  and six in 2023. $^{1215}$ 

#### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

In July 2024, an Israeli aerial strike hit an eight-storey residential building in Kafr Sousa district, damaging its façade, creating a 30-metre-long and 10-metre-wide crater in the ground and leaving some 30 vehicles around the site charred or damaged. Moreover, a war-damaged five-storey residential building in Al-Tadamun neighbourhood collapsed in November 2023, leaving 14 injured. No information on incidents relating to explosive remnants of war could be found within the time constraints of this report.

## (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023, there were 589 880 IDPs in Damascus governorate. UNOCHA recorded 65 IDP movements between September 2023 and December 2023. The majority of these (44) occurred from other governorates into Damascus, while 21 movements occurred from Damascus to other governorates.

Meanwhile, UNOCHA recorded 220 IDP return movements between September 2023 and December 2023. Of these movements, 105 occurred from other governorates into Damascus (all of them in October 2023) while 115 occurred from Damascus to other governorates. According to OHCHR, interviewees who had returned to Damascus city largely indicated that they found their homes intact, unlike those returning to other governorates such as Rural Damascus who 'often found their houses destroyed or irreparably damaged, confiscated or



looted.'1221 Information on reasons for return to Damascus could not be found within the time constraints of this report.

The SAA's Fourth Division and pro-GoS militias and paramilitary forces targeted IDPs attempting to enter the Al-Hajar Al-Aswad area to check on their homes they had once inhabited. GoS was requiring individuals wishing to check on or return to their former homes in this area to submit a request for security clearance to the Damascus Governorate council or the local branch of the Military Intelligence Directorate.<sup>1222</sup>

## 2.11.1. General description of the governorate

Rural Damascus (Rif Dimashq in Arabic) is a largely agricultural governorate surrounding Damascus city. It is located in the southwestern part of Syria and shares internal borders with the governorates of Homs to the north and Quneitra, Dar'a and Sweida governorates to the south. It also has international borders with Jordan and Iraq to the south and east and Lebanon to the west. Phe governorate is divided into nine administrative districts: Rural Damascus, Douma (Duma), Al-Qutayfah, An-Nabk, Yabroud (Yabrud), At-Tall, Az-Zabadani, Darayya, and Qatana. The governorate's territory is further subdivided into a total of 36 subdistricts.

According to UNOCHA, the population of Rural Damascus governorate was estimated to be 3 386 173 as of July 2023, including 985 957 IDPs. Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Damascus governorate had 3 398 432 inhabitants. Inhabitants.

Sources reported that the SAA's Fourth Division was present in the town of Zakiya<sup>1231</sup> and in the Jdeidat Yabous area<sup>1232</sup> on the Damascus-Beirut road.<sup>1233</sup> The presence of GoS forces was reinforced in Zakiya in late August 2023.<sup>1234</sup> The presence of GoS troops was also strengthened at checkpoints near Kanaker in July 2024, a town which saw troops of the 112<sup>th</sup> Brigade<sup>1235</sup> and the 121<sup>st</sup> Brigade<sup>1236</sup> stationed in its vicinity.

According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Iranian forces maintained 109 military sites in Rural Damascus, while Russian forces had eight military sites in the governorate. Iranian forces reportedly maintained an operational centre around Al-Sayyida Zainab, located south of Damascus city and west of Damascus International Airport in a densely populated area that included Shia communities and has hosted thousands of Iran-backed pro-GoS militia fighters from Lebanon, Iraq and Afghanistan. Lebanese Hezbollah were reportedly heavily present in this neighbourhood, where they operated their main headquarters and a string of bases located underground. Lebanese Hezbollah and Iran-backed militias were also stationed at Damascus International Airport and ran sites near Yabroud in the Qalamoun Mountains (northeast of Damascus) and in the Al-Qutayfah area, which together formed part of a continuous stretch of territory marked by a deep entrenchment of Hezbollah forces.

Various pro-Iranian militias led by Lebanese Hezbollah dominated several suburbs around Damascus city, <sup>1242</sup> occupying strategic military positions, warehouses, and checkpoints near scientific research centres. <sup>1243</sup> Between April and July 2024 there were reports of evacuation of positions held by Iran-backed militias and Hezbollah <sup>1244</sup>, including towards secret facilities in the western Qalamoun Mountains, located 55km from Damascus city. <sup>1245</sup>

The governorate also witnessed the presence of local militias opposed to the GoS, including the 'Thuwar Kanaker' group and the Al-Furqan brigades in Kanaker town. <sup>1246</sup> While no specific information on ISIL activity in the governorate could be found during the reference period, a report presented by the UN Security Council indicated that during the second half of 2023, ISIL cells in Dar'a and Sweida governorates aimed to 'expand towards the outskirts of Damascus to establish a stronger foothold'. <sup>1247</sup>

## 2.11.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

## (a) Security trends during the reporting period

#### Israeli airstrikes

According to the Omran Center for Strategic Studies, Rural Damascus governorate, while ostensibly a secure region, faced some security challenges. Against the backdrop of an escalation in Israeli attacks in Syria following the 7 October 2023 attack in Israel and the subsequent intensification of the Gaza conflict, Israeli forces carried out 22 aerial strikes in the governorate in 2023 according to data collected by scholars Armenak Tokmajyan and Kheder Khaddour, while SOHR recorded 30 such attacks in Damascus and Rural Damascus governorates that year. Israeli missile attacks targeted multiple sites in the governorate during November and December 2023, including Damascus International Airport. While the overall frequency of Israeli strikes in Syria decreased in early 2024, the attacks increasingly focused on targets in Rural Damascus and Damascus city. Between January 2024 and late August 2024, SOHR documented 23 Israeli attacks in these two governorates.

Several Israeli attacks during the reference period targeted the Sayyida Zainab area, including strikes in December 2023 targeting positions in the vicinity of residential areas (leaving three civilians injured)<sup>1256</sup> and killing senior Iranian general and IRGC adviser Sayyed Razi Mousavi,<sup>1257</sup> as well as strikes in 2024 hitting the headquarters of Lebanese Hezbollah<sup>1258</sup> and a building used by GoS forces.<sup>1259</sup> Further Israeli strikes in 2024 hit a residential building west of Damascus city,<sup>1260</sup> Hezbollah facilities north of the capital near Yabroud and Al-Qutayfah,<sup>1261</sup> a scientific research centre in the Jamraya area,<sup>1262</sup> a SAA military site in the vicinity of Mount Qasioun west of Damascus city,<sup>1263</sup> and a military headquarter at an unspecified location south of Damascus.<sup>1264</sup> Presumed Israeli airstrikes also targeted specific vehicles on the Damascus-Beirut road,<sup>1265</sup> killing individuals involved in weapons transports, including a Hezbollah official<sup>1266</sup> and a businessman with strong ties to the GoS.<sup>1267</sup>

#### Clashes between local actors and pro-GoS forces

Apart from Israeli attacks, clashes at communal level erupted in early September 2023 in the town of Zakia between residents and militiamen linked to the SAA's Fourth Division. These clashes, reportedly triggered by the killing of a local resident by a member of a group affiliated to the Fourth Division, left at least five people dead, including two armed town residents. In later months, the same town witnessed clashes between residents and an armed group led by a man allegedly affiliated with Hezbollah, and the killing by the Fourth Division of a civilian opposed to the GoS. 1272

In July 2024, GoS troops from the 121<sup>st</sup> Brigade shelled the town of Kanaker<sup>1273</sup> in response to attacks by locals on GoS positions following the arrest of a local resident, leaving five civilians



dead and a number of others injured.<sup>1274</sup> In August 2024, several people were injured in attacks by unidentified gunmen targeting a GoS-affiliated militia group in the Qalamoun area of western Rural Damascus<sup>1275</sup> and a family with ties to the GoS during a wedding ceremony in the town of Ma'arba<sup>1276</sup> north of Damascus city<sup>1277</sup>.

## (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 216 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Rural Damascus, of which 64 were coded as battles, 62 as explosions/remote violence and 90 as incidents of violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 213 security incidents (78 battles, 46 explosions/remote violence and 89 events coded violence against civilians) in Rural Damascus governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in the districts of At Tall and Rural Damascus. According to ACLED, GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were involved (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') in around 35 % of all security incidents, particularly in incidents coded as 'battles' and 'violence against civilians'. Unidentified armed groups were involved in around 25 % of all security incidents, particularly in incidents where GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were also an actor. Israeli forces were involved in around 25 % of all security incidents, mostly in incidents coded as battles and explosions/remote violence, where GoS forces and affiliated armed groups were also an actor.

#### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 15 civilian fatalities in Rural Damascus governorate.<sup>1279</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded 16 civilian fatalities in Rural Damascus governorate.<sup>1280</sup> SNHR documented 13 civilian fatalities in 2021,<sup>1281</sup> 80 in 2022<sup>1282</sup> and 17 in 2023.<sup>1283</sup>

## (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Clashes between local residents and GoS-linked local militants in Zakia town in September 2023<sup>1284</sup> and June 2024<sup>1285</sup> caused destruction and damage to several houses, <sup>1286</sup> water tanks,

and solar panels.<sup>1287</sup> Meanwhile, several civilians were killed or injured in explosions of landmines in eastern<sup>1288</sup> and western<sup>1289</sup> Rural Damascus.

#### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023 there were 985 957 IDPs in Rural Damascus governorate. The same source recorded 97 IDP movements between September and December 2023, including 74 movements from Rural Damascus to other governorates, 18 movements from other governorates into Rural Damascus, and 5 movements occurring within Rural Damascus governorate itself. Page 1291

Meanwhile, UNOCHA recorded 185 IDP return movements between September and December 2023, including 21 movements from other governorates into Rural Damascus, 141 movements from Rural Damascus to other governorates, and 23 movements occurring within Rural Damascus governorate itself.<sup>1292</sup> Information on reasons for return could not be found within the time constraints of this report. Many individuals returning to areas in Rural Damascus found their houses destroyed, damaged beyond repair, looted or confiscated.<sup>1293</sup> GoS restrictions often prevented IDPs from returning to their areas of origin, while other IDPs feared arrest in reconquered or previously besieged areas, including Rural Damascus.<sup>1294</sup>



# 2.12. Dar'a governorate

## **2.12.1.** General description of the governorate

Dar'a governorate is located in the southern part of Syria, below Damascus, sharing internal borders with the governorates of Quneitra to the west, Rural Damascus to the north, and Sweida to the east and an international border with Jordan to its south.<sup>1296</sup> Dar'a governorate

is comprised of the three administrative districts of Dar'a, Izra' and As-Sanamayn. The city of Dar'a is the governorate's capital. According to UNOCHA, the population of Dar'a governorate was estimated as of July 2023 at 1 075 114, including 66 868 IDPs. Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Dar'a governorate had 989 831 inhabitants.

Information on the strategic importance of Dar'a and its role in cross-border drug trafficking is available in the <u>EUAA COI report: Syria - Security situation (September 2022)</u>.

## 2.12.2. Conflict background and armed actors

Since 2018,<sup>1301</sup> Dar'a governorate has been nominally under the control of the GoS,<sup>1302</sup> while the GoS reportedly 'failed to fully reassert government authority'.<sup>1303</sup> Following Hamas' 7 October attack on Israel, the GoS transferred hundreds of troops from the north-west to Dar'a and Quneitra governorates, according to Etana Syria.<sup>1304</sup> According to a July 2024 SOHR report, Dar'a ranked highest among the Syrian governorates regarding the presence of illegal armed groups and drug traders and hosted a high number of local factions.<sup>1305</sup> They included factions of former pre-2018-settlement opposition forces,<sup>1306</sup> such as the Eighth Brigade<sup>1307</sup> led by Ahmed Al-Awda (also Ahmad Al-Awdeh),<sup>1308</sup> as well as armed groups such as Hay'at Tahrir al-Sham (HTS).<sup>1309</sup> Administratively belonging to the GoS's military security after Russian support for the local faction ended,<sup>1310</sup> namely to the Fifth Corps, the Eighth Brigade acts semi-autonomously, leading to conflicts and clashes with GoS-affiliated forces.<sup>1311</sup> According to a January 2024 Enab Baladi article, it is the only faction that possesses medium weapons since the withdrawal of heavy weapons and armour from all factions in Dar'a under the 2018

settlement agreement. 1312 A May 2024 Syria Direct article elaborated that HTS has returned to Dar'a province, six years after having left it, 'in the form of small groups made up of former fighters and new local recruits' present in cities and villages across the governorate. According to local sources interviewed by Syria Direct, the group was concentrated in the north, east and west and received some protection from the Eighth Brigade. 1313 The so-called Central Committees, which emerged in 2018 after the GoS took control of Dar'a and incorporated 'the leadership of former factions, chiefs, and notables', are regarded as the largest military force among the non-GoS armed groups in the governorate. 1314 According to a leader of the Eighth Brigade interviewed by Enab Baladi for an August 2024 article, the Eight Brigade 'firmly manages' the eastern area of the governorate, whereas the Central Committees maintained a 'solid' control over the governorate's western rural area. In addition, the article noted that the Central Committees' control reached as far as the northern rural areas 'through connections between local groups for each village, town, and city', while they were 'are also connected with the Eighth Brigade east of Daraa'. A former opposition faction leader with a 'military position in the Eighth Brigade' reportedly further indicated that both the Eighth Brigade and the Central Committees were 'managed by the Military Security'. 1315

According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Iran maintained 16 military sites in Dar'a governorate. In December 2023, NPA, referring to a consulted researcher, reported that Iranian military posts in the Southern governorates of Dar'a, Quneitra and Sweida were operated by the IRGC, IRGC-affiliated militias and Hezbollah. They were reportedly concentrated in rural Dar'a. Hezbollah reportedly maintained a shared headquarters with GoS's State Security in the city of Al-Sanamayn. Island

ISIL cells reportedly existed in Dar'a governorate in the reference period.<sup>1319</sup> A July 2024 UN Security Council report noted that, while the group maintained 'an unassuming low-profile' in Dar'a governorate, it still posed 'a threat that could transcend borders'.<sup>1320</sup> ISIL activity was reported for example in Al-Sanamayn city,<sup>1321</sup> which Etana Syria described as a 'hotbed' for the

group's local activities.<sup>1322</sup> According to a February 2024 NPA article, ISIL sought to establish 'a foothold' in the governorate 'by taking advantage of the fragile security situation'. The article further noted that the ISIL leader for southwestern Syria, Osama Shahada al-Azzizi (also: Al-Shaib), was killed during a raid on a house in Nawa city by Central Committee and Eighth Brigade forces.<sup>1323</sup> The same month, SOHR reported 'a massive security deployment' by GoSaffiliated local groups in Jasem city during a search operation for ISIL cells.<sup>1324</sup> However, in its August 2024 report, the UNCOI reported an 'increased Da'esh [ISIL] presence' in the governorate.<sup>1325</sup>

According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Russia maintained three military sites in Dar'a governorate. Etana Syria reported that Russian forces carried out regular and increasingly frequent patrols in Dar'a governorate in the reference period, seeking to bring a sense of security to the region. However, the source noted in March 2024 that the operations have been largely ineffectual.

Information on the conflict background and armed actors in Dar'a prior to September 2023 is available in the EUAA COI reports <u>Syria – Security situation (October 2023)</u>, <u>Syria – Security situation (September 2022)</u> and <u>Syria – Security situation (July 2021)</u>.

### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

In July 2024, Dar'a governorate, including Dar'a city, 1331 was described to be in a security 'chaos'. 1332 SOHR assessed that there was a security vacuum in the governorate and the GoS failed to control the security situation. The source further noted that the presence of high numbers of local factions in Dar'a governorate and frequent conflicts among them, add to a deterioration of the security situation. 1333 Dar'a city reportedly hosted a number of 'prominent figures' of combatting factions and in the area of drug trafficking. 1334

Sources reported that the security situation in Dar'a governorate was characterised by daily or almost daily security incidents, including attacks on civilians. <sup>1335</sup> In a July 2024 report,

researcher Abdullah Al-Jabassini identified five sets of causes and patterns of violence in Dar'a governorate. First, military escalation by the GoS against areas under the control of local armed groups; second, vigilante operations by local armed groups against ISIL elements and drug traffickers; third, rivalries between local armed groups that escalate into confrontations and assassinations; fourth, disputes between members of different clans and tribes; and fifth, criminality, including abductions, robberies, and murders. According to Al-Jabassini, violence in Dar'a governorate 'has become increasingly widespread' ever since GoS's return to the country's south in mid-2018. He indicated that the perpetrators of many violent incidents remained unknown, which made a distinction between private and public conflicts difficult. Al-Jabassini noted that an important number of violent incidents happened in central and western Dar'a governorate, whereas Busra Al-Sham and its surroundings in eastern Dar'a governorate enjoyed 'comparatively greater security'. 1337

Assassinations, kidnappings, attacks with explosive devices

SOHR reported recurrent security-related incidents in the reference period, primarily armed attacks, throughout the governorate, resulting in civilian fatalities, including of children. 1338 The UNCOI noted that assassinations and violence 'targeting Syrian security officials, progovernment public figures, "reconciled" opposition fighters and civilians' continued to be reported between July 2023 and December 2023.<sup>1339</sup> SOHR further noted that 'violence, attacks and assassinations have dramatically escalated' in the period leading up to July 2024. The month of June reportedly saw a significant increase in killings and abductions that affected civilians, often including persons opposing the GoS and critical of Iranian presence in the region, and security personnel alike. Syria TV noted that, while it was characteristic that no party claimed responsibility for the killings in the governorate, governorate residents and activists accused GoS- and Iranian-affiliated forces to stand behind the killings. 1341 According to Al-Jabassini, there were no indications of a decrease of nearly daily 'assassinations, kidnappings, roadside explosive devices' and 'drive-by shootings'. 1342 In its August 2024 report, the UNCOI noted that the 'situation in Dar'a remained marked by unrest and high levels of insecurity, with mutual attacks between pro-government forces and opposition armed groups in western Dar'a, assassinations, attacks with improvised explosive

devices, drug trafficking, increased Da'esh [ISIL] presence, and ongoing security operations by pro-government forces.'1343

Cases of civilians killed by shooting by unidentified armed men were reported for example in eastern rural Dar'a, 1344 in Al-Yadouda city in western Dar'a, 1345 in Al-Sanamayn, 1346 in Jasem city 1347 as well as in the cities of Inkhil 1348 and the neighborhood Dar'a Al-Balad. 1349 Furthermore, cases of civilians injured by shooting from unidentified armed men, including of children, 1350 were reported, for example in the cities Al-Harak, 1351 Dar'a 1352 and Nawa. 1353 In addition, several cases of attacks on former opposition faction members, including their shooting, were reported in the reference period. 1354

Several attacks with explosive devices were reported in the reference period, 1355 including attacks with hand grenades on or near the houses of individuals in eastern rural Dar'a, such as the house of the head of the agricultural association in the town Nahta, 1356 and western rural Dar'a, 1357 such as an attack on the head of the water unit in the city of Nawa 1358 and on a shop

for agricultural needs in Tafas city.<sup>1359</sup> Some of the attacks led to civilian casualties,<sup>1360</sup> including of children.<sup>1361</sup> Furthermore, attacks on wedding halls with explosive devices were reported in mid-2024 in the cities Inkhil<sup>1362</sup> and Jasem.<sup>1363</sup>

The scholars Armenak Tokmajyan and Kheder Khaddour reported in a March 2024 article that abductions for ransom were a 'common practice' in Dar'a governorate, where over 126 abductions were recorded in 2023.<sup>1364</sup> Sources reported recurrent abductions of civilians,<sup>1365</sup> including of children,<sup>1366</sup> throughout the reference period,<sup>1367</sup> including cases where abductors demanded ransom in exchange for the release of abductees.<sup>1368</sup> Abductions of civilians by unidentified armed men were reported for example in Nawa city in western rural Dar'a,<sup>1369</sup> in Dar'a city, <sup>1370</sup> in the Lajat area<sup>1371</sup> and Deir Al-Bakht in northern rural Dar'a<sup>1372</sup> and in Al-Harak city in eastern rural Dar'a.<sup>1373</sup> In a March 2024 article, the NPA reported that the GoS was

accused of 'turning a blind eye' towards abduction incidents. In other cases, Iranian and GoS-affiliated forces were accused of carrying out abductions themselves.<sup>1374</sup>

Clashes between local armed groups and GoS affiliated forces

A number of clashes between armed groups were reported, for example north of Dar'a city, <sup>1375</sup> in the Lajat area, <sup>1376</sup> and in Mahajjah city in northern rural Dar'a, <sup>1377</sup> some resulting in civilian fatalities. <sup>1378</sup> Clashes also occurred between two armed groups in Al-Sanamayn in early April 2024. <sup>1379</sup> According to the UNCOI, these clashes involved pro-GoS and armed opposition groups. The UNCOI reported that more than 100 pro-GoS fighters 'targeted an armed opposition group leader during raids on at least three houses' in the city, killing ten civilians, including children. <sup>1380</sup> Reportedly, the attack occurred in retaliation of a previous IED attack in the same town, which had killed a number of children. <sup>1381</sup> Clashes were also reported between forces affiliated with the Eighth Brigade and the Central Committees and local groups, such as in Al-Yadouda city in western rural Dar'a. <sup>1382</sup> or in Al-Harak city in eastern rural Dar'a. <sup>1383</sup> Clashes between GoS and GoS-affiliated groups and local groups were reported, <sup>1384</sup> for example in Al-Sanamayn city<sup>1385</sup> and Inkhil in northern rural Dar'a. <sup>1386</sup> In the first half of 2024,

clashes between local armed groups in the city of Jasem were reported, 1387 resulting in civilian casualties and the imposition of curfews on parts of the city. 1389

According to a June 2024 Syria Direct article, local factions in Dar'a, for several months, have resorted to a strategy that has been used in Sweida governorate for years. The strategy includes 'encircling military checkpoints and security headquarters in the province, or kidnapping regime personnel, to force the release of detainees.' 1390

Security incidents related to drug trafficking

During the reporting period, raids were carried out by groups affiliated to the Eighth Brigade on tents belonging to Bedouin tribes in eastern rural Dar'a, 1391 on various accusations, 1392 including drug trafficking 1393 and abductions. 1394 In the abovementioned July 2024 report, Al-Jabassini noted that local armed groups 'planned and executed' anti-drug-trafficking operations in Dar'a governorate. For example, in January 2024, raids were carried out in the vicinity of Tafas city, during which members of a group involved in drug trading were arrested and one of their leaders was killed. In another incidents the same month, raids were carried out in 'farms between the cities of Tafas, Da'el and 'Atman', leading to the arrest of the brother of a well-known drug trafficker in Dar'a governorate with ties to the Lebanese Hezbollah. 1395

### Israeli airstrikes

In the light of the Israel-Hamas conflict, a number of Israeli attacks on Dar'a governorate were reported, <sup>1396</sup> for example on sites of GoS forces <sup>1397</sup> in Al-Sanamayn, <sup>1398</sup> Jbab <sup>1399</sup> and Jasem <sup>1400</sup> and on sites of Iranian forces. <sup>1401</sup> In October 2023, Iranian-affiliated forces were suspected of having fired artillery shells at northern Israel, which reportedly prompted a number of Israeli retaliatory strikes. <sup>1402</sup> Several other Israeli retaliatory strikes were reported in central <sup>1403</sup> and western Dar'a, <sup>1404</sup> including in the vicinity of Tel Al-Jabeya, Tel Al-Jomou' and Tel Ashtara. <sup>1405</sup>

### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 699 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Dar'a governorate, of which 231 were coded as battles, 166 as explosions/remote violence and 302 as incidents of violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 743 security incidents (236 battles, 155 explosions/remote violence and 352 events coded violence against civilians) in Dar'a governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in Dar'a and Izra districts. As-Sanamayn recorded significantly lower number of security incidents than the other two districts. According to ACLED, unidentified armed groups were the main actor involved in security incidents (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') during the reference period, accounting for around 75 % of all documented security incidents. In most of security incidents featuring unidentified armed actors, the other parties involved were civilians (more than half of all documented security incidents) and GoS forces and affiliated armed groups. Israeli forces were involved in around 7 % of all reported security incidents.




Figure 14. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Dar'a governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.

### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 214 civilian fatalities in Dar'a governorate. For the same period, UCDP recorded 90 civilian fatalities in Dar'a

governorate. In Dar'a governorate, SNHR documented 204 civilian fatalities in 2021, and 2021, and 225 in 2023. In 2023 in 2023

Daraa 24, a media network focused on southern Syria that describes itself as politically and militarily independent, documented 245 civilian fatalities and 213 civilian injuries between September 2023 and July 2024.<sup>1412</sup>

### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Attacks on wedding halls with explosive devices were reported in mid-2024 in the cities Inkhil<sup>1413</sup> and Jasem,<sup>1414</sup> causing material damage.<sup>1415</sup> Within the time constraints of this report, no further information on attacks on civilian infrastructure and objects in Dar'a governorate in the reference period was found.

Dar'a remained one of the governorates with the highest levels of unexploded ordnance contamination.<sup>1416</sup> During the reference period, civilians, including children, were reported to

have been killed or injured in ERW detonations.<sup>1417</sup> Such incidents occurred throughout the governorate, including north of the city Dar'a,<sup>1418</sup> northern rural Dar'a,<sup>1419</sup> eastern rural Dar'a,<sup>1420</sup> including in the Lajat area,<sup>1421</sup> and western rural Dar'a.<sup>1422</sup>

### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023, there were 66 868 IDPs in Dar'a governorate. <sup>1423</sup> 28 of the 185 IDP movements recorded in the last four months of 2023 took place from Dar'a to other governorates, while 30 IDP arrivals to Dar'a from other governorates were recorded. <sup>1424</sup> In July 2024, sources reported displacements within and from the city of Jasem towards safer areas due to clashes. <sup>1425</sup> No data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

During the last four months of 2023, around 144 IDP return movements occurred within Dar'a governorate, while about 62 return movements took place from other governorates into Dar'a. Information on reasons for return could not be found within the time constraints of this report.



# 2.13. Quneitra governorate

# 2.13.1. General description of the governorate

The governorate of Quneitra is situated in southern Syria and it borders Lebanon, Jordan, and Israel. To the east, Quneitra governorate borders Dar'a and Rural Damascus governorates. The governorate is divided into two districts: the district of Quneitra, which comprises the subdistricts of Quneitra, Masaada, Khan Arnaba and Al-Khashniyyeh. The second district, Al-Fiq, is divided into the sub-districts of Fiq and Al-Butayhah. Parts of the governorate are under

Israeli control or administered by UNDOF (UN Disengagement Observer Forces). <sup>1430</sup> Especially Masaada is almost entirely under Israeli or UNDOF administration. Al-Butayhah is reportedly completely under Israeli control, while only a small part of Fig is still under Syrian control. <sup>1431</sup>

The city of Quneitra remained abandoned after it was destroyed by Israel in 1974 and is part of the demilitarised buffer zone between Syria and Israel under the supervision of UNDOF. The new provincial administrative centre is Baath city (Madinat Al-Baath). Madinat Al-Baath).

According to UNOCHA, the population of Quneitra governorate was estimated as of July 2023 at 149 326, including 3 373 IDPs. 1434 Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Quneitra governorate had 127 600 inhabitants. 1435

# 2.13.2. Conflict background and armed actors

During the reporting period, Quneitra governorate east of the UNDOF-administered buffer zone was under the control of the GoS.<sup>1436</sup> According to a March 2024 report by the scholars Armenak Tokmajyan and Kheder Khaddour, the GoS 'failed to fully reassert government authority'.<sup>1437</sup> Much of the Golan Heights is occupied by Israel, while part of it belongs to Syrian-controlled Quneitra governorate.<sup>1438</sup> UNDOF is present in a demilitarized area separating parts of the Golan Heights and Syrian-controlled Quneitra governorate.<sup>1439</sup> GoS's 90<sup>th</sup> Brigade was reportedly present in the governorate near the border with the occupied Golan.<sup>1440</sup>

According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Iran maintained 20 military sites in Quneitra governorate. The source further reported that the IRGC withdrew from around 14 positions in Quneitra governorate to be replaced by Russian and GoS forces.<sup>1441</sup>

During the reference period there were reports of Iranian and Hezbollah forces reportedly withdrawing from the governorate or redeploying to other positions in the governorate as a result of alleged Israeli attacks. According to the International Crisis Group, 'Iranian forces reportedly repositioned around 300 Syrian and Lebanese fighters to Quneitra' following the conflict's outbreak in October. October. October 2023 near the border to the Golan. In December 2023, NPA, referring to a consulted researcher, noted that Iranian military posts in the Southern governorates Dar'a, Quneitra and Sweida were held by the IRGC, IRGC-affiliated militias and Hezbollah. According to the researcher, there were '27 military sites in Quneitra, including 10 for the Hezbollah, five for the IRGC, and 12 shared sites between them'. It is a Syria further reported that 'some minor Hezbollah deployments' were observed in rural Quneitra in January 2024.

According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Russia maintained 13 military sites in Quneitra governorate. The source further reported that Russia in early 2024, for the first time redeployed forces to Quneitra governorate after Iranian militias had withdrawn from there. Sources reported that Russia had established a number of new military posts in the reference period in Quneitra governorate's border region with Israeli-occupied Golan, including in the villages of Muallaqa and Ghadir Al-Bustan. Etana Syria reported that Russian forces carried out regular and increasingly frequent patrols in the governorate in the reference period. However, the source noted, in March 2024, that the operations have been largely ineffectual. In a January 2024 report, the UN Security Council noted that ISIL, HTS and HAD had 'established a footprint' around Quneitra governorate.

# 2.13.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

Conflict between Israel and Iranian-backed militias

In light of the escalating violence in the Israel-Gaza conflict, Etana Syria reported that in October 2023, 'cross-border hostilities have continued to intensify in southern Syria, with the border strip between Quneitra and the Israeli-occupied Golan Heights experiencing regular instances of 'tit-for-tat violence' between Israeli forces and Iranian-backed militias', while Israeli reconnaissance aircraft were flying over parts of Quneitra governorate daily. Etana Syria further reported that the GoS 'transferred hundreds of troops' from the north-western governorates to Quneitra and Dar'a governorates in October 2023 and 'tightened security measures around Quneitra' governorate to prevent people from outside entering the governorate. In September 2023, SOHR reported that Israeli tanks repeatedly crossed into Syrian territory in Quneitra governorate, while the GoS and UNDOF did not intervene. Israeli attacks, including alleged drone attacks, helling and airstrikes, were reported throughout the reference period against Iranian-affiliated groups and GoS positions.

In several cases, Israeli attacks on Quneitra were reportedly carried out in retaliation of previous attacks by Hezbollah and other Iranian-affiliated forces, <sup>1463</sup> as well as attacks claimed by the so-called Islamic Resistance in Iraq group into the Israeli-occupied Golan. <sup>1464</sup> According to the Israeli Defence Forces (IDF), an airstrike conducted in April 2024 was due to the presence of the SAA in the demilitarized puffer zone. <sup>1465</sup> Etana Syria reported that Israeli forces continued to cross into northern Quneitra in May 2024, 'occasionally firing on civilians

in the border area'.'<sup>1466</sup> SOHR reported several cases of civilian injuries and fatalities, including of sheep herders,<sup>1467</sup> in the reference period as a result of Israeli attacks.<sup>1468</sup> In July 2024, SOHR reported that Israeli forces crossed into the village Al-Zatariyah in southern rural Quneitra via the Golan border and arrested a civilian for unknown reasons, before they returned to the occupied Syrian Golan.<sup>1469</sup>

In January 2024, Enab Baladi reported that the Russian military had announced to start military air patrols along the so-called 'Bravo-Line' dividing the Golan Heights between Syria and Israel to monitor the situation in the demilitarized area. 1470

Several incidents of IED blasts across Quneitra governorate targeting GoS forces were reported in the reference period. In a March 2024 report, the scholars Armenak Tokmajyan and Kheder Khaddour reported that abductions, assassinations and attacks against GoS representatives occurred in Quneitra governorate.

### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 417 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Quneitra governorate, of which 13 were coded as battles, 394 as explosions/remote violence and 10 as incidents of violence against civilians. <sup>1473</sup> By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 49 security incidents (16 battles, 24 explosions/remote violence and 9 events coded violence against civilians) in Quneitra governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in the district of Quneitra. According to ACLED, Hezbollah was involved in around 86 % of all recorded incidents (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') and in almost all incidents coded explosions/remote violence. Israeli forces were involved in almost all security incidents where Hezbollah was the other actor, the vast majority being coded as explosions/remote violence.




Figure 15. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Quneitra governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.

### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented one civilian fatality in Quneitra governorate. <sup>1474</sup> For the same period, UCDP recorded one civilian fatality in Quneitra

governorate.  $^{1475}$  In Quneitra governorate, SNHR documented 10 civilian fatalities in 2021  $^{1476}$ , one in  $2022^{1477}$  and five in 2023.  $^{1478}$ 

### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

Within the time constraints of this report, no information on attacks on civilian infrastructure and objects in Quneitra governorate in the reference period was found.

During the reference period, civilians, including children, were reportedly killed or injured in ERW detonations in the village of Jaba. 1479

### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023, there were 3 373 IDPs in Quneitra governorate. <sup>1480</sup> 35 of the IDP movements recorded in the last four months of 2023 took place within Quneitra governorate, while 30 IDP arrivals to Quneitra from other governorates were recorded in October 2023. <sup>1481</sup> No further data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

During the last four months of 2023, around 10 IDP return movements occurred within Quneitra governorate, while about 81 return movements took place from other governorates into Quneitra. Information on reasons for return could not be found within the time constraints of this report.



# 2.14. Sweida governorate

# **2.14.1.** General description of the governorate

Sweida (also Suwayda) governorate is the southernmost governorate of Syria. It shares internal borders with the governorates of Rural Damascus to the north and north-east and Dar'a to the west as well as an international border with Jordan to its south. It is governorate comprises three administrative districts: As-Sweida, Shahba, and Salkhad. It is governorate is the governorate's capital.

According to UNOCHA the population of Sweida governorate was estimated as of July 2023 at 446 493, including 70 842 IDPs. Population estimates for mid-2023 issued by the Syrian Central Bureau of Statistics indicated that Sweida governorate had 540 657 inhabitants.

The residents of Sweida governorate are predominantly Druze. Further information on the governorate's religious composition as well as information on its societal structure and the prevalence of armed gangs and crime, including drug trafficking, are available in the EUAA COI report: Syria – Security situation (September 2022).

## 2.14.2. Conflict background and armed actors

Since 2011, Sweida remained formally under GoS control,<sup>1491</sup> but 'experienced periods of relatively lax governance', according to a December 2023 report by Syrian journalist and author Mazen Ezzi.<sup>1492</sup> Ezzi also noted that in 2022-2023, 'widespread armament, and the presence of armed civil groups' were prevailing. Druze militiamen known as 'Men of Dignity' (Rijal al-Karama) reportedly were 'the primary and most significant organized vigilante force in the region' controlling 'smaller gangs under a civil guise'.<sup>1493</sup> In a February 2024 article, London Chatham House researcher Haid Haid noted that local militias, such as the Rijal al-Karama, the Sheikh Al-Karama and the Fahad Forces, 'protect their communities from security threats' in Sweida governorate. According to Haid, some of them aligned with GoS security 'for influence', while a few engaged 'in illicit activities'.<sup>1494</sup>

Sources reported that the GoS sent reinforcements between late-April<sup>1495</sup> and early May 2024 to Sweida governorate. According to SOHR, reinforcements deployed in early May 2024 included 'soldiers, tanks, military armoured vehicles and dozens of heavy vehicles'. Etana Syria assessed in late-April 2024 that some 1 200 GoS forces were sent to Sweida governorate, including Republican Guard forces, Air Force Intelligence and Military

Intelligence forces. The source further noted that the April reinforcements were 'unusual' and could have been an attempt to contain ongoing protests and intimidate the protesters. For further information on the correlation between GoS reinforcements and protests in the governorate during the reference period, please see section 2.14.3(a). Based on information obtained from local sources, an article by Al-Quds Al-Arabi, a London-based daily newspaper, noted that the reinforcements also included Iranian and Iranian-affiliated forces, such as from the Fatemiyoun brigade, the Zainabiyoun brigade and the IRGC. An April 2024 article in The New Arab noted that the Republican Guard brigade carried tanks in the Khalkhala airport in the northern part of Sweida governorate. In May 2024, it was reported that members of the GoS's 15th Special Forces Division were present west of Sweida.

According to Jusoor for Studies, as of mid-2024, Iran maintained 13 military sites in Sweida governorate, <sup>1502</sup> including Lebanese Hezbollah points <sup>1503</sup> and Russia maintained two military sites in the governorate. <sup>1504</sup>

According to a January 2024 UN Security Council report, ISIL cells existed in Sweida governorate. A July 2024 UN Security Council report furthermore noted that, while the group maintained 'an unassuming low-profile' in Sweida governorate, it still posed 'a threat that could transcend borders'. 1506

# 2.14.3. Recent security trends and impact on the civilian population

### (a) Security trends during the reporting period

The security situation in Sweida governorate was described as chaotic in the reference period. In a May 2024 report, Etana Syria elaborated that the road connecting western Sweida governorate and eastern Dar'a governorate was 'becoming a notable hotspot for ambushes and clashes with militant groups', while observing an increase of armed attacks against GoS forces. In June 2024, sources reported clashes between local factions and GoS forces in Sweida governorate due to the establishment of a new army checkpoint. According to SOHR, local armed groups, in that context, attacked GoS-security centres in Sweida city leading to clashes on the street. Syria Direct reported that an agreement was 'negotiated by civil and religious leadership in communication with local armed factions' to convert the checkpoint positioned at the northern entrance of the city Sweida 'to an ordinary military position, with no involvement in civilian movement'. In mid-August 2024, tensions were reportedly sparked by another attempt to establish a checkpoint at the northern entrance to the city.

### Kidnappings and assassinations

Several cases of civilians being injured<sup>1513</sup> or killed,<sup>1514</sup> including by shooting by unidentified armed men, were reported,<sup>1515</sup> for example in Sweida city.<sup>1516</sup>

The scholars Armenak Tokmajyan and Kheder Khaddour noted in a March 2024 article that abductions for ransom were a 'common practice' in Sweida governorate, where some 50 abductions were recorded in 2023 by non-GoS actors.<sup>1517</sup> Abductions, including of a child<sup>1518</sup>

and to demand ransom, <sup>1519</sup> were also reported in the first half of 2024, <sup>1520</sup> for example in eastern rural Sweida, <sup>1521</sup> in northern Sweida in Sweida city. <sup>1523</sup>

Protest movement against the GoS

Beginning in August 2023,<sup>1524</sup> protests in Sweida governorate continued throughout the reference period.<sup>1525</sup> The GoS reportedly refrained from cracking down on the demonstrations.<sup>1526</sup> However, in mid-September 2023, GoS forces reportedly opened fire on demonstrators at the Baath Party headquarters in Sweida city, injuring three people.<sup>1527</sup> The UNCOI reported one lightly injured person as a result of armed men shooting at protestors that same day.<sup>1528</sup> One demonstrator was killed in February 2024,<sup>1529</sup> when GoS forces again fired on protesters attacking a government building.<sup>1530</sup> Another man was injured<sup>1531</sup> and the incident led to clashes between local armed groups and GoS forces the same day.<sup>1532</sup> GoS reinforcements were reportedly sent to Sweida governorate after the arrest of a number of Syrian officers by armed groups as a means to pressure the release of a student from Sweida governorate, arrested by the GoS for his protest support. The reinforcements were reportedly sent to the governorate although the student and the Syrian officers were released at the end of April.<sup>1533</sup> According to SOHR, reinforcements deployed in early May 2024 'followed massive

demonstrations' in Sweida city against GoS military build-ups in the governorate one week after the capture of the Syrian officers. 1534

In July 2024, sources reported the killing of Marhaj Jarmani (also: Merhej Al-Jarmani), the leader of the armed group 'Liwa Al-Jabal' and a 'key figure' in the anti-GoS protests. His faction reportedly played an important role in the protection of the protesters. Al-Jarmani was reportedly killed by unknown gunmen. <sup>1535</sup> However, Al-Sharq Al-Awsat in July 2024 noted that protesters suspected the involvement of the GoS in his killing. <sup>1536</sup> Early August 2024, sources reported the killing of Jarmani's wife by unknown perpetrators. <sup>1537</sup> According to a report by the Alma Research and Education Center, a non-profit, bipartisan organisation with a focus on research and analysis of developments in conflicts along Israel's border, the protests in Sweida city intensified in July 2024. <sup>1538</sup> The arrest of individuals, including of protestors or protest leaders, by security forces prompted armed group members to detain members of GoS forces in at least four instances in the reference period. <sup>1539</sup> According to a June 2024 Syria Direct article, this strategy has been used in Sweida governorate for years. <sup>1540</sup> The protests were ongoing at the time of finalising this report.

### Security incidents related to drug trafficking

In the reference period, clashes between Jordanian forces and drug traffickers were reported at the Syrian-Jordanian border in Sweida governorate.<sup>1541</sup> Several sources reported an affiliation of drug traffickers in the governorate with Iranian-linked groups,<sup>1542</sup> including the Lebanese Hezbollah.<sup>1543</sup> The UNCOI noted an increase in clashes between Jordanian forces and drug traffickers between July and December 2023.<sup>1544</sup> Jordan reportedly stepped up its

campaign against drug traffickers in January 2024,<sup>1545</sup> following clashes with suspected Iranian-linked smugglers of drugs, weapons and explosives in December 2023.<sup>1546</sup> Jordanian<sup>1547</sup> or alleged Jordanian airstrikes on areas in Sweida governorate, where drug traffickers were reportedly active, were reported in the reference period,<sup>1548</sup> including in December 2023<sup>1549</sup> and January 2024.<sup>1550</sup> Some airstrikes resulted in civilian fatalities,<sup>1551</sup> including of children.<sup>1552</sup>

Israeli airstrikes on military positions in Sweida governorate were reported in November<sup>1553</sup> and December 2023.<sup>1554</sup>

### (b) Security incidents

For the period between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024, there were 112 security incidents recorded by ACLED in Sweida governorate, of which 36 were coded as battles, 36 as explosions/remote violence and 40 as incidents of violence against civilians. By comparison, for the same period one year prior (from 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023), ACLED recorded 99 security incidents (30 battles, 25 explosions/remote violence and 44 events coded violence against civilians) in Sweida governorate. During the reference period for this report, security incidents were recorded by ACLED in all governorate districts, with the highest number being documented in the district of Sweida. According to ACLED, unidentified armed groups were involved (coded as either 'Actor1' or 'Actor2') in around 54 % of all security incidents, mostly in incidents coded as violence against civilians. Local armed groups were involved in around 30 % of all security incidents, mainly in security incidents coded 'battles'. Military forces of Jordan were involved in around 19 % of all security incidents (mainly against smugglers), the vast majority being coded as explosions/remote violence.




Figure 16. Security events coded as battles, explosions/remote violence and violence against civilians in Sweida governorate between 1 September 2023 and 31 August 2024. Breakdown by district based on ACLED data.

### (c) Civilian fatalities

Between September 2023 and August 2024, SNHR documented 42 civilian fatalities in Sweida governorate. For the same period, UCDP recorded four civilian fatalities in Sweida governorate. Most civilian fatalities were recorded by SNHR in January 2024 (13) following

airstrikes attributed to Jordan. $^{1558}$  In Sweida governorate, SNHR documented 13 civilian fatalities in  $2021^{1559}$ , 32 in  $2022^{1560}$  and 24 in 2023. $^{1561}$ 

Suwayda 24, an online media platform with focus on Sweida governorate run by Syrian activists, documented 101 civilian fatalities and 62 civilian injuries between September 2023 and July 2024. 1562

### (d) Conflict-related infrastructure damage and explosive remnants of war

In the alleged Jordanian airstrikes in January 2024, several homes in the city of Arman were reportedly destroyed. <sup>1563</sup> Within the time constraints of this report, no further information on attacks on civilian infrastructure and objects in Sweida governorate was found.

Sweida remained one of the governorates with the highest levels of explosive contamination.<sup>1564</sup> During the reference period, civilians, including a child, were reported to have been killed or injured in ERW detonations,<sup>1565</sup> including in southern rural Sweida<sup>1566</sup> and north of Sweida city.<sup>1567</sup>

### (e) Displacement and return

According to UNOCHA, as of July 2023, there were 70 842 IDPs in Sweida governorate. No IDP movements were recorded in the last four months of 2023 within Sweida governorate,

while 30 IDP arrivals to Sweida from other governorates were recorded. No further data could be found on numbers of IDP movements in 2024.

During the last four months of 2023, around 39 IDP return movements occurred within Sweida governorate, while about 50 return movements took place from other governorates into Sweida. <sup>1570</sup> Information on reasons for return could not be found within the time constraints of this report.
